## FORUM NEXT TUESDAY

SCRAP PAPER COLLECTION SCHEDULED FOR JUNE 22

The Boy Scouts of Richland will conduct another scrap paper drive on next Thursday, June 22.

IMPORTANT -DO NOT REMOVE
GRADING STAKES

The Layout Department is making an urgent plea to Village residents to refrain from removing engineers' grading stakes placed along streets, around homes, and in other locations to be graded throughout the Village

Removal of grading stakes doubles the cost involved, since stakes must be reset before grading can be done, and also delays the completion of this important work.

On Tuesday evening, June 20, Dr. C.O. Johnson, Professor of American Government at Washington State College, will address the first of the series of Forums scheduled for Richland this summer. The meeting will be held at 8:30 p.m. in Room 112 of the new Columbia High School. Dr. Johnson's subject will be "Obligations of Citizenship."

A special Forum bus will leave the Richland bus depot at 8:20 p.m. for the High School, and will make the return run from the school at 10:20 p.m. The school may also be reached by riding the Symons Street bus to the corner of Stevens Drive and Williams Boulevard and walking two blocks southwest on Long Ave.

RICHLAND MEDICAL CLINIC

The Richland Medical Clinic is located in the south section of the second wing of the Richland Hospital. The Medical Department asks that appointments to see the physicians be made as early in the day as possible by calling Richland 600. Appointments in the evening and on Sunday are for emergencies only.

There is a marked shortage of doctors and nurses here, as in other parts of the country; and all residents are asked to help in this situation by placing calls for doctors early in the day and by going to the Clinic for treatment when possible. House calls should be reserved for emergencies.

The Medical Department also announces that the Hospital Pharmacy, located near the main (east) entrance to the hospital, is open from 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. for prescription service.

DISCARDED CLOTHING WANTED FOR WAR-TORN COUNTRIES

Clean used or discarded clothing to be sent to the needy peoples of war-torn countries will be collected by women workers of the United Protestant Church of Richland on Tuesday morning, June 20. Clothing contributed is to be sent to the American Friends Relief Society in Seattle.
