
TRAVELERS OF THE WEEK

She has been here since January 3rd, having come from Seattle.





Ration Board Has Problems

Due to the decreased gasoline quota available for civilian use, it has become necessary for all Rationing Boards to comply strictly with OPA regulations.

The Plant Transportation Committee, which is responsible for the

handling of all ration applications, has received instructions to make a complete check of all applications. This requires that much more time be spent in review of these applications than at any time in the

The Plant area board, which is located in Kennewick, is also charged with the responsibility of making a thorough review of all applications and all previous applications before the issuane of any court applications before the issuane of any court applications before the issuane of any court applications. pons or ration certificates. This also requires considerable more time than the processing which has

time than the processing which has been done before.

It is believed that everyone concerned with this program is doing everything possible to speed things up; but, since it was necessary to secure and train additional personnel to handle this work, it may be sometime before faster service can be provided. can be provided.

Meanwhile, please help the Rationing offices speed up service to the employees by complying with the following:

(1). REQUEST YOUR RATIONS 10 DAYS IN ADVANCE IF POS-SIBLE. Please do not wait until you are completely out of gaso-line, fuel oil or other rationed

you are completely out of gastoline, fuel oil or other rationed items before applying.

(2.. PLEASE DO NOT INQUIRE AS TO STATUS OF YOUR APPLICATION FOR AT LEAST ONE WEEK. This should not be done before 7 days unless you are completely out of stove gasoline, fuel oil or are unable to get to work due to lack of gasoline or tires. Each inquiry that is made just takes up someone's time who could be processing other applications. Telephone calls should not be made to the Area Ration Offices or to the Kennewick Board except in cases of extreme emergency. of extreme emergency.

(3). Applications should be turned into the ration office most con-

venient to the employee.

(4). All remaining old-type "E" and "R" coupons should be turned in for exchange at the Han-ford Ration Office immediately. Please do not ask for emergency stove gasoline except in case of extreme hardship.

Careless Smoking Caused One-Third of March Fires

As in February, approximately one-third of the fires in Hanford in

March were from careless smoking.

This is revealed in the monthly fire report summary for March. Apparenty, smokers are still not aware of the seriousness of this

So far, only the quick action of the fire department has prevented serious consequences, as the fires have been reported immediately. Any one of them, however, could have destroyed a building, threat-ened the surrounding ones, and caused loss of life

caused loss of life.

Smoking in bed is especially hazardous. In spite of continued warnings, some employees continue to do so, thus endangering their own lives and those of others.

Other tips for smokers: Use your ash tray, not the floor. Never leave. car.
