PREPARE SOIL FOR LAWNS NOW

September is the ideal time to plant a new lawn or make repairs to those which are established.

The initial step is to prepare the ground by loosening the soil through spading to a depth of not less than 3 to 4 inches and pulverize it thoroughly to eliminate any hard clods or air pockets. After this, the ground should be raked carefully to remove rocks, sticks, and smooth the surface to eliminate all low spots that will not drain.

Work outlined above should be well under way in August. A well prepared and properly graded seed bed is essential in making a good lawn. The top soil should be kept moist until the seed is planted with a good raking just before seeding. At seeding time in September, divide the seed into two parts, seeding half in one direction and half at right angles to the first. After seeding, rake very lightly to cover the seed.

Hand watering is preferred to use of the sprinkler, while the grass seed is germinating and getting started. It is absolutely essential that the top soil of a newly seeded lawn be kept moist at all times as the young grass plants will burn and die if allowed to become dry. Run off water indicates that the soil is saturated or too heavy an application is being applied.

The newly planted grass seed will respond to an application of fertilizer worked into soil at the time the ground is spaded up or applied as a mulch after seeding.

Requests for grass seed orders will be received and seed issued from the small garage to the south of the Barber and Beauty Shop on Lee Boulevard, Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. A trained man will be on duty to advise with reference to lawn planting and care at this time.

It will be necessary for tenants to supply own containers for grass seed.
