Goals:

- Set up the flow-cell
- Determine HPLC procedure to identify the different compounds in our honey stock solutions
- Create honey mediated gold nanoparticles

Division of tasks among group members:

- Sanuja and Pauline set up the flow-cell
- Casey and Raquel found existing literature that used HPLC to test honey. The procedure from this literature will be used on 2/6/18 to prepare solutions needed for HPLC. The HPLC will be run on 2/7/18.
- All four group members prepared honey and gold samples.
- HPLC Procedure and Notes
 - This procedure was obtained from Linda Stubbs' *Sugars in Honey by HPLC and Titrimetry* report.

 - Step 1: Prepare Mobile Phase
 - 75% Acetonitrile: 25% DI water solution in a 1L beaker
 - Filter through a vacuum filtration system using a 0.45 um PTFE membrane filter
 - Step 2: Prepare Sucrose Stock Solution
 - About 8g/L
 - Use parts of this solution to make up the required sucrose solution in the standard solutions
 - Step 3: Prepare Mixed Calibration Standards at the Following Concentration Ratios
 - o 1:1:0.2 g/L Fructose: Glucose: Sucrose
 - o 2:2:0.4 g/L Fructose: Glucose: Sucrose
 - o 5:5:1 g/L Fructose: Glucose: Sucrose
 - Prepare by accurately weighing appropriate masses of fructose and glucose and adding accurately pipetted volumes of sucrose stock solution
 - Step 4: Prepare Honey Solutions
 - Honey samples were prepared at 10g/L
 - Step 5: For Recovery Check Analysis
 - Solutions of about 5g/L were prepared by accurately weighing about 2.5g of honey and adding an accurately weighted mass of glucose of about 0.5 g and making up to 500 mL
 - Step 6: All samples were filtered by a vacuum filtration system through celluloseacetate membrane filter

- Notes
 - $\circ~$ Standards were injected into the HPLC at 0.6 mL/min flow rate and at 0.9 mL/ min flow rate.
 - Once optimum flow conditions had been established, repeated injections of standards were performed to obtain reproducible elution times and peak heights.
 - Average peak heights were used to construct calibration graphs for fructose and glucose.
 - Using the same conditions samples and recovery check samples were injected and calibration graphs were used to determine the fructose and glucose content of the honey sample.
- Honey-mediated Gold Nanoparticle Procedure
 - This procedure was obtained from Daizy Philip's *Honey mediated green synthesis of gold nanoparticles* report.

 - Step 1: Prepare HAuCl4 stock solution
 - 50 mg HAuCl4 was dissolved in 120mL DI H2O
 - Step 2: Prepare Honey stock solution
 - o 20g honey was diluted to 70mL
 - Step 3: Prepare **g**₃
 - $\circ~$ 20 mL from honey stock solution was mixed with 30 mL from the gold stock solution
 - Step 4: Prepare **g**₄
 - 25 mL from honey stock solution was mixed with 30 mL from the gold stock solution
 - Step 5: Prepare **g**₅
 - 30 mL from honey stock solution was mixed with 30 mL from the gold stock solution
 - Step 6: Leave all three samples at room temperature for 3 hours for gold nanoparticles to form
 - \circ The samples were monitored for all three hours to determine if and when the gold colloids would form. We hypothesis that all three will form gold nanoparticles, but the g₅ sample will form the nanoparticles fast than the other two samples.
 - Notes:
 - The honey used throughout this experiment was obtained from the American University Beekeeping Society. It is unfiltered, raw, and treatment-free. The honey was from the July 2017 harvest.

- Results of the Honey and Gold Samples

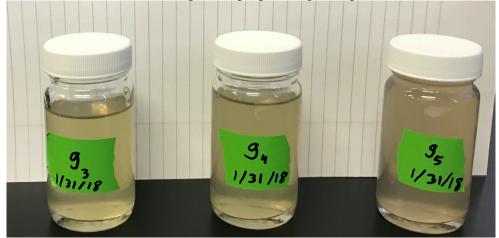


Figure 1: g₃, g₄, and g₅ Samples

 - Figure 1 below shows no change in any of the samples. According to the literature, if gold nanoparticles formed, the samples would have changed to a light purple. Thus, it is unlikely that any samples formed gold nanoparticles.
 - There are multiple reasons why the solution did not form nanoparticles. For example, we might have used the wrong HAuCl₄ that did not have a trihydrate. Our first step to address this issue is to check the HAuCl₄ we used. Our second step forward is to double check the literature procedure.
