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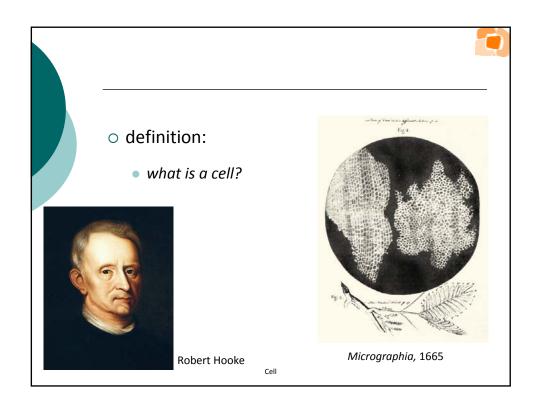


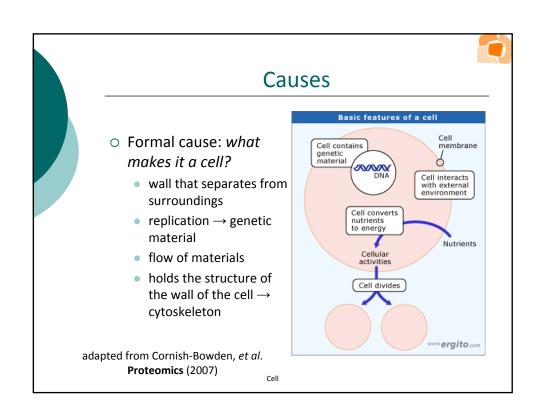

Classical Cell Theory (1840-60)

- O Who? Schleiden, Schwann, Virchow
- All organisms are made up of one or more cells
- Cells are the basic unit of life and structure
- All cells come from pre-existing cells
 - Omnis cellula e cellula

Modern cell theory

- The cell is the fundamental unit of structure and function in living things
- All cells come from pre-existing cells by division
- Energy flow (metabolism) occurs within cells
- Cells contain hereditary information which is passed from cell to cell during cell division
- All cells are basically the same in chemical composition
- All known living things are made up of cells
- Some organisms are unicellular, made up of only one cell; others are multicellular, composed of countless number of cells
- The activity of an organism depends on the total activity of independent cells

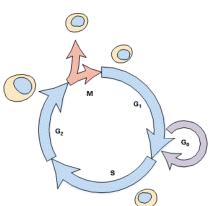
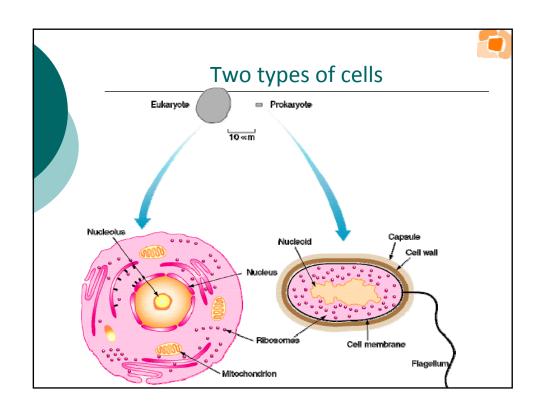
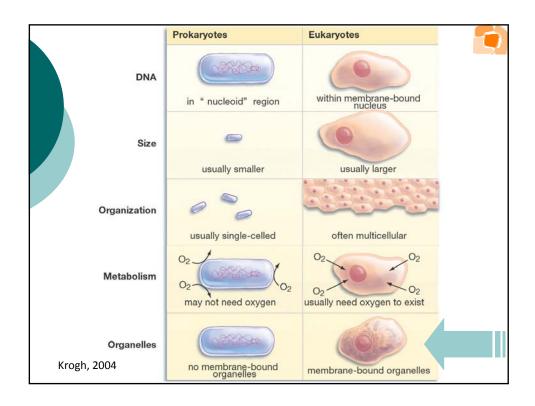
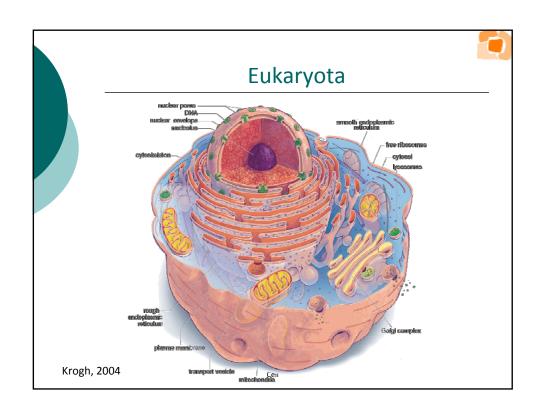
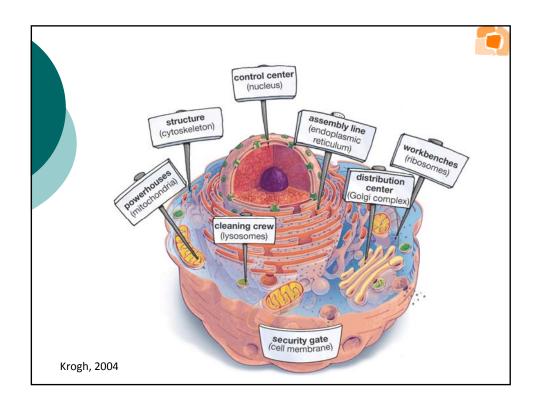


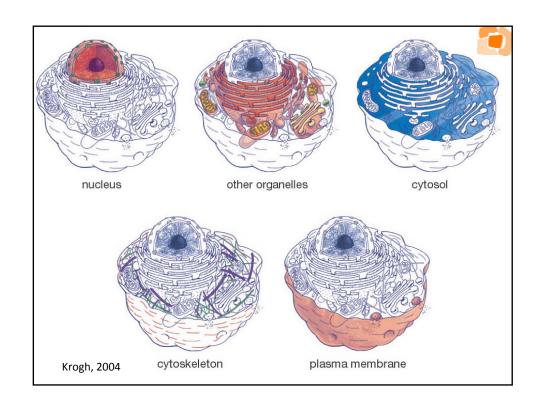
Figure 1-9. The eukaryotic cell cycle. (Lodish *et al*, 2000)

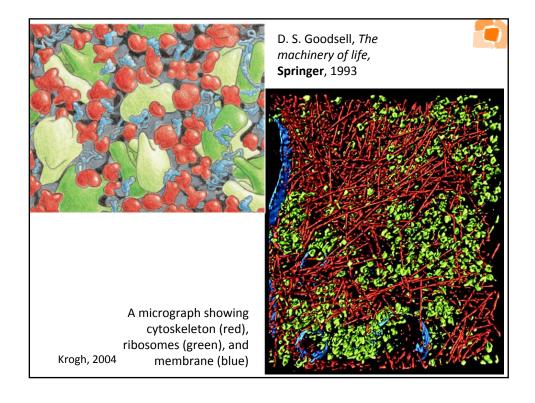


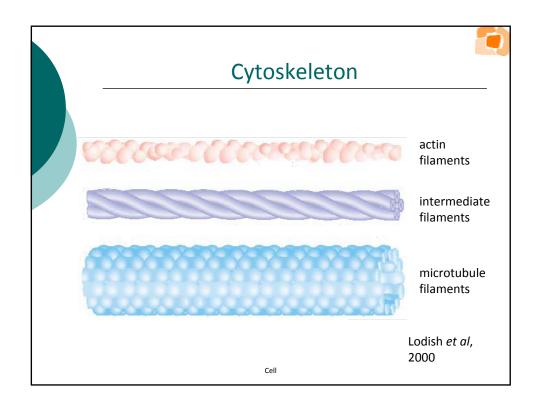


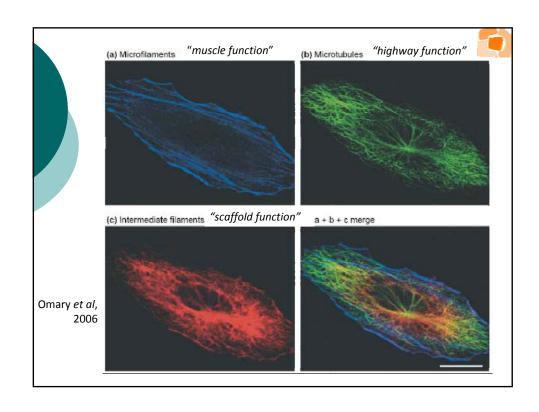




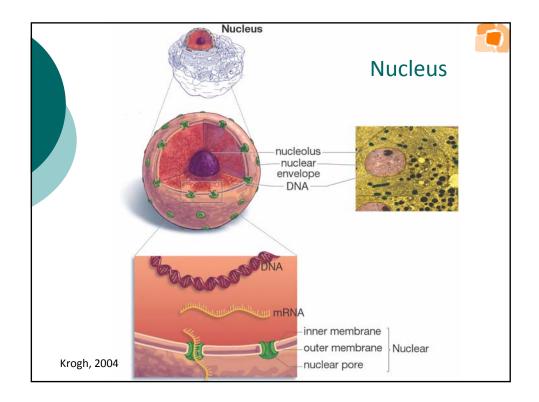


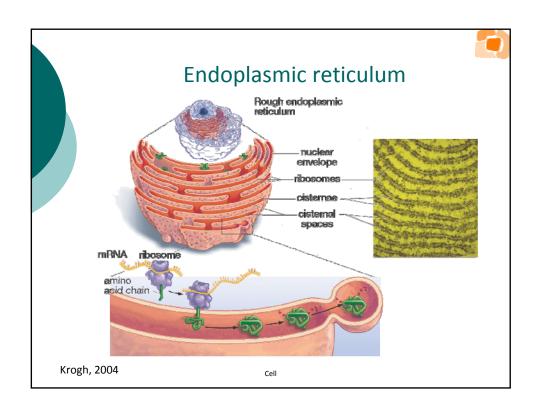


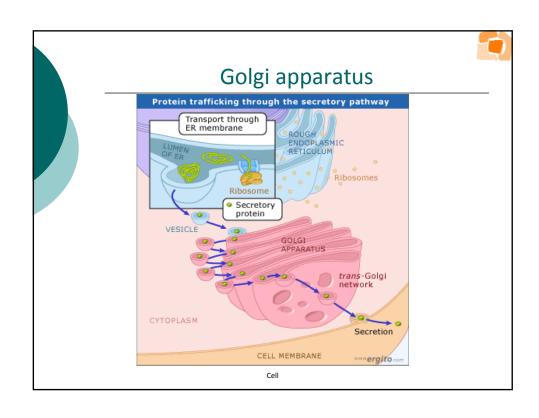


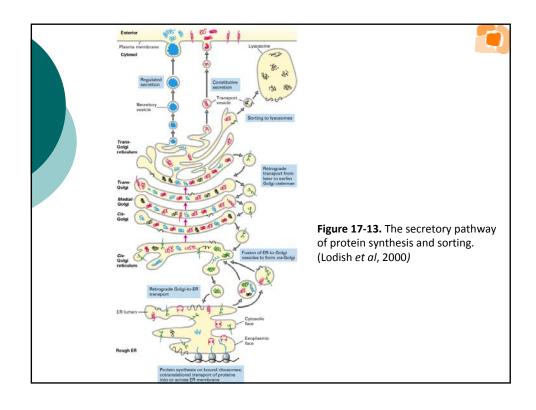


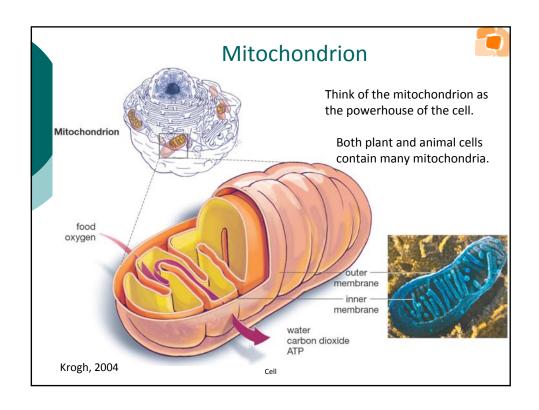


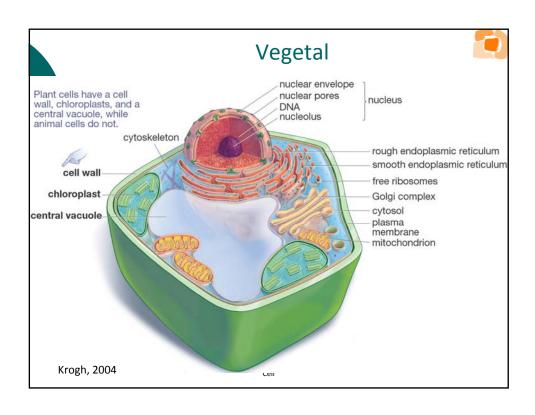


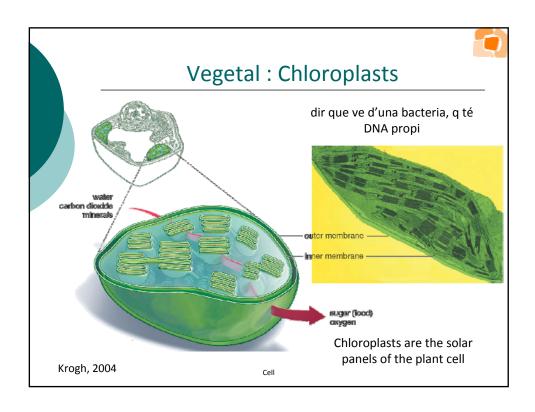


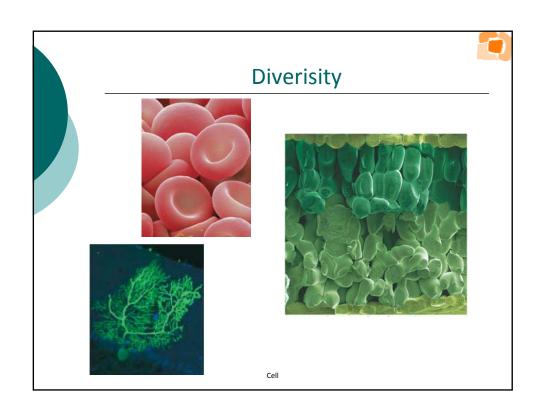


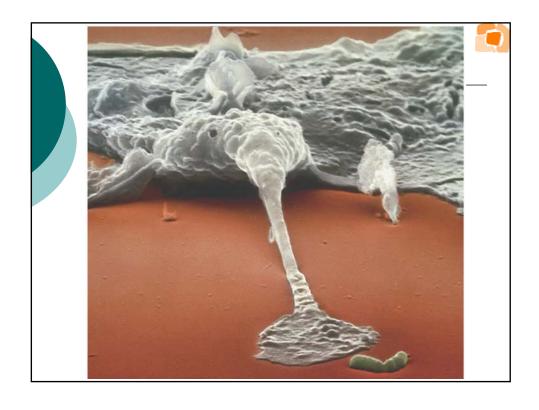


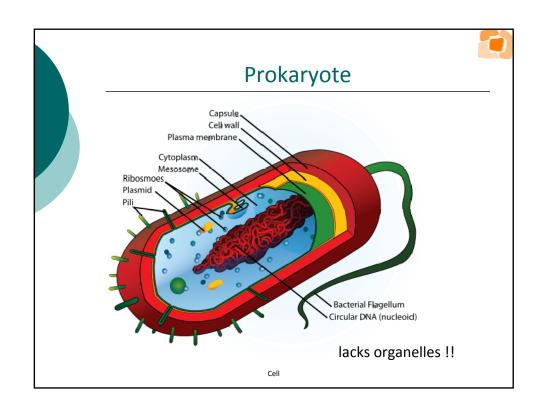


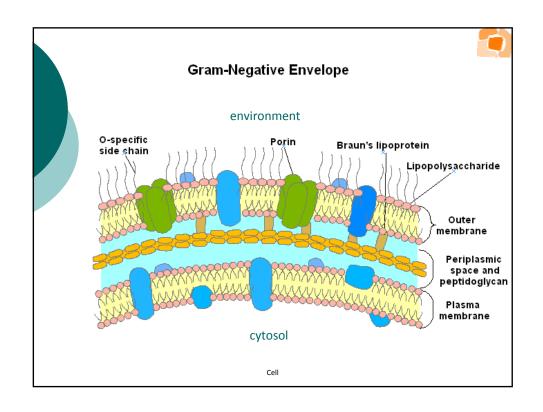


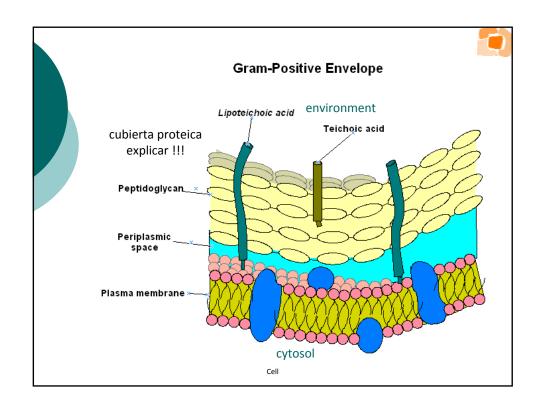


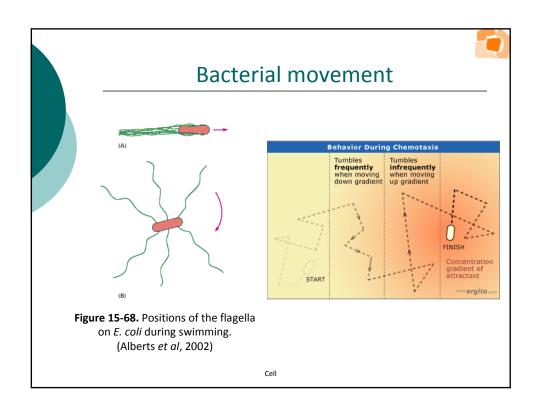


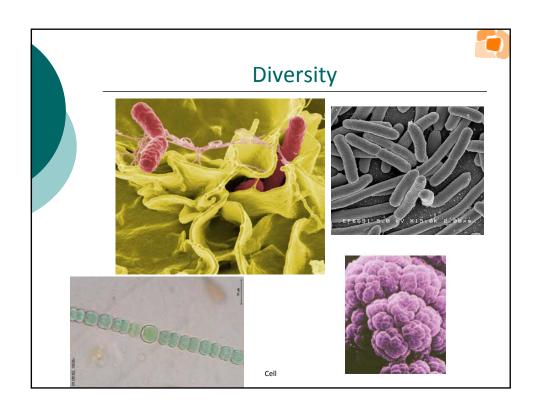


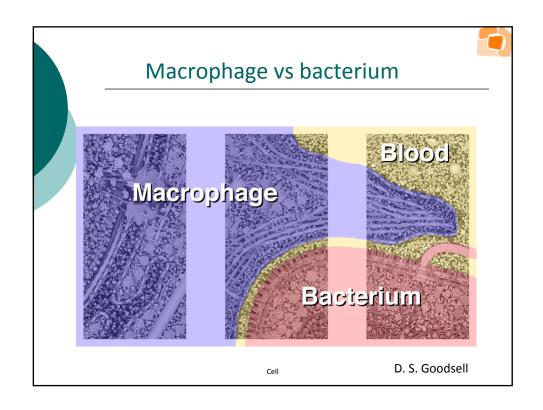


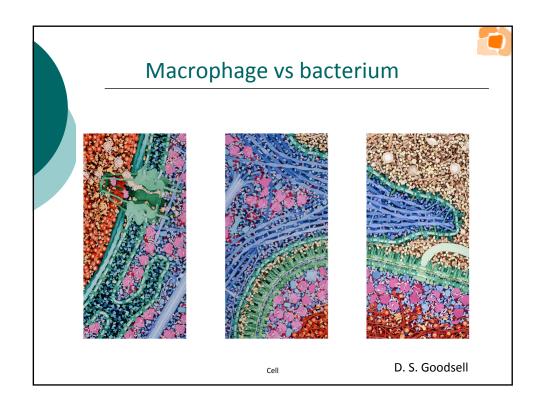


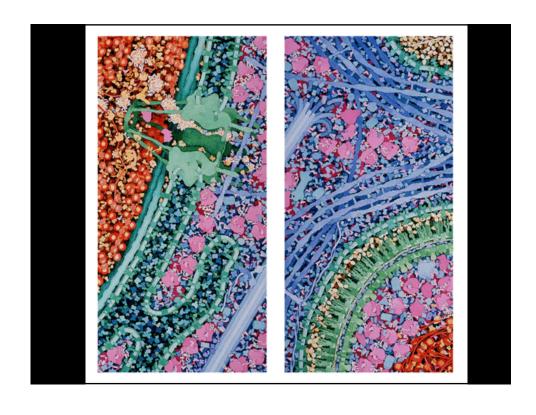


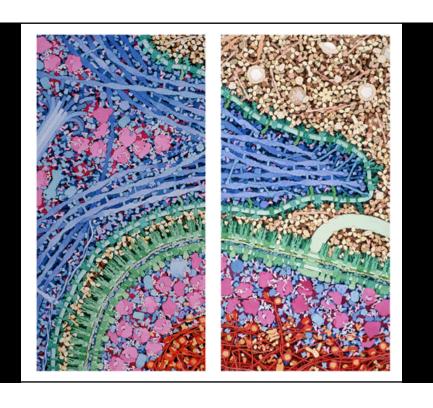










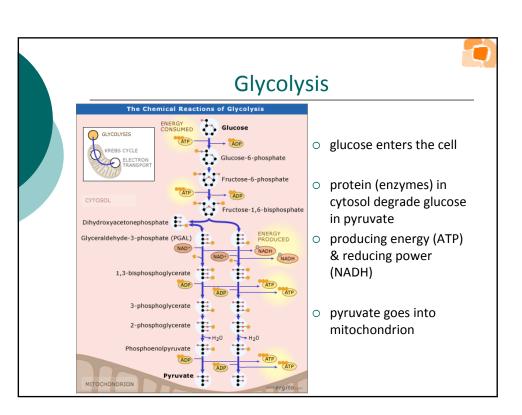






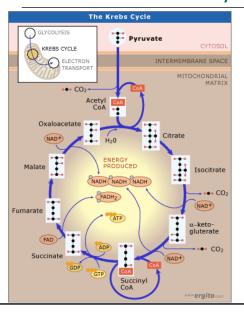
Metabolism

 - o industrial applications

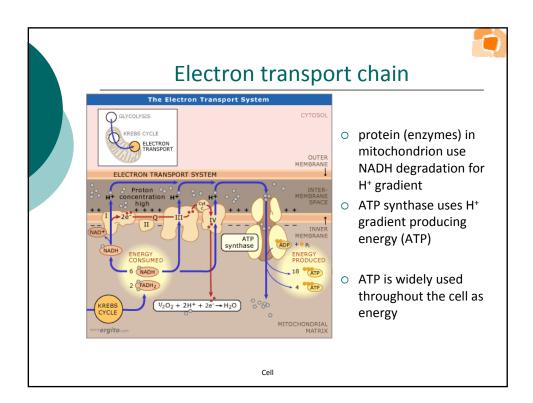




TCA cycle

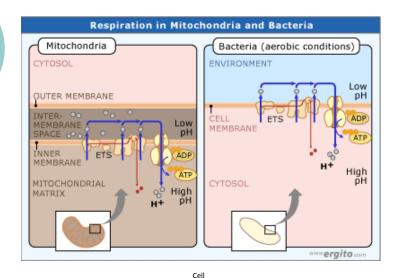


- protein (enzymes) in mitochondrion degrade pyruvate completely
- producing energy (ATP)
 & reducing power
 (NADH)
- NADH goes into electron transport chain
- ATP is widely used throughout the cell as energy
