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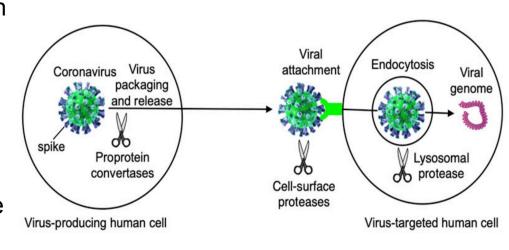

Outline

- The SARS-CoV-2 spike D614G mutation increases viral transmissibility, giving it a fitness advantage.
- The G614D mutation has quickly become the dominant SARS-CoV-2 genotype in the United States.
- Tracking spike protein mutations and exploring epidemiology of SARS-CoV-2 will allow for better development of therapeutic strategies.

SARS-CoV-2 is dangerous due to the way it penetrates cells

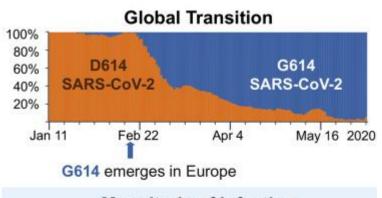
- Over 1 million global deaths and over 28 million infections
- SARS-COV-2 receptor binding domain (RBD) has a substantially higher affinity that SARS-COV.
- SARS-COV-2 is activated by furin protease which allows it to be more infectious in the lungs.
- As of July 3, 2020, 216 countries have reported COVID-19 cases, with more than 10 million confirmed cases and approximately 518,000 deaths.

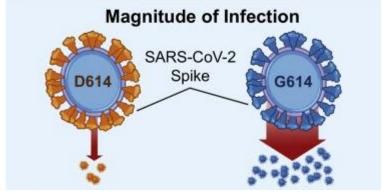

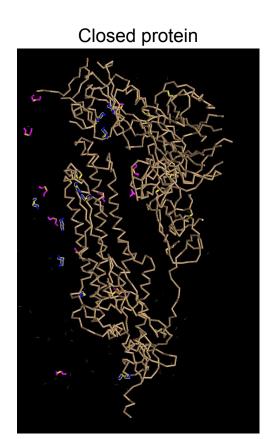
G614 is more transmissible than D614, causing an increased prevalence of the mutation

- G614 mutant is 31% (28-34%) more transmissible than the D614 wild type.
- 17,760 D614G mutations were found in the GISAID database by June 2, 2020.
- A SARS-CoV-2 variant with Spike G614 has replaced D614 as the dominant pandemic form.
- The consistent increase of G614 at regional levels may indicate a fitness advantage.

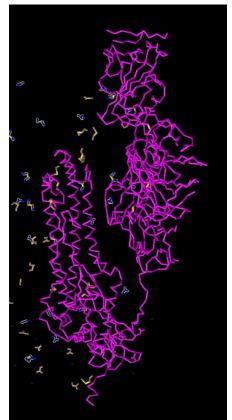




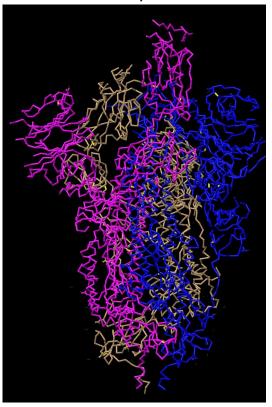
Structure of the SARS-CoV-2 Spike Glycoprotein



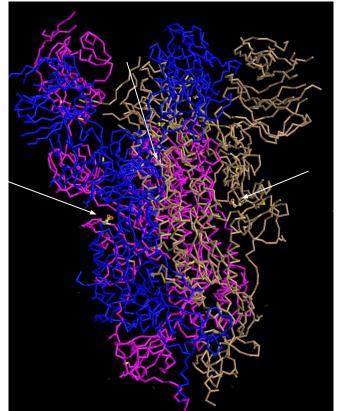
Open protein

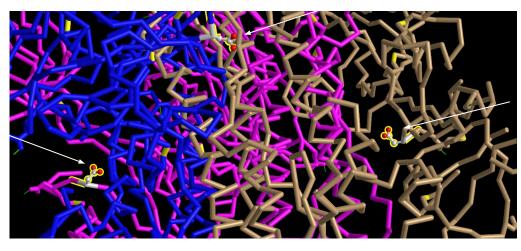


Full spike



Location of the D614G mutation in the SARS-CoV-2 Spike Glycoprotein

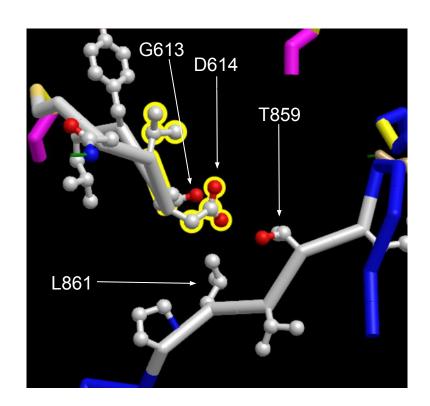




Interactions around the D614G mutation

- Both sequences are closely surrounded by polar sidechains
- Switching to the uncharged glycine reduces the interaction with other side chains

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Mutation G614 became more prevalent than D614 in the United States

- 2 amino acid positions showed high conservation (5 and 243).
- Amino acid 614 is the only position that shows weak conservation.
- Alignment indicates that the D614G mutation became more prevalent in the United States around March or April.

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Mutation G614 became more prevalent than D614 in the United States

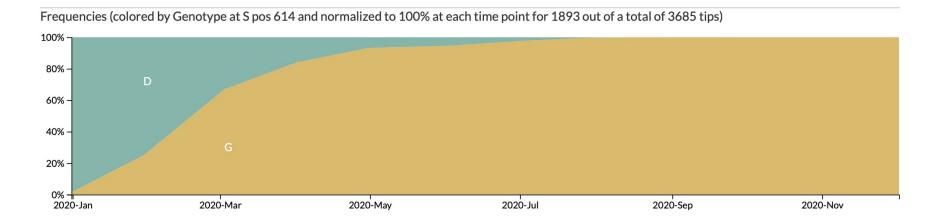
- Sequences with the D614G mutation were being reported to GISAID as early as February.
- The prevalence of G614 surpassed that of D614 by March.

G614 has become the dominant genotype in the United States

 The database Nextstrain, which utilizes sequences from GISAID, indicates that prevalence of G614 surpassed D614 by early March.

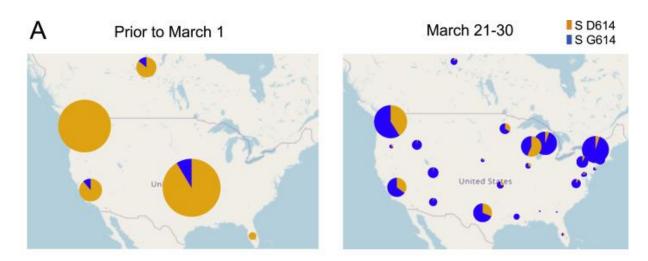

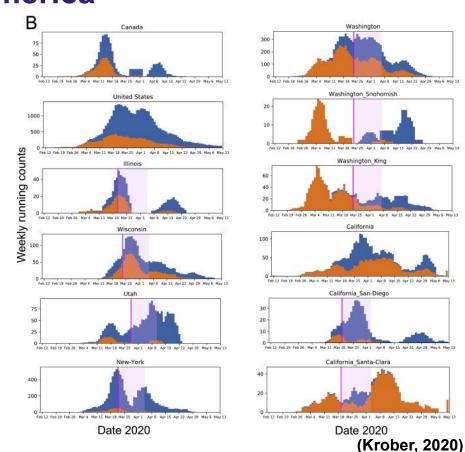
G614 has become the dominant genotype in the United States

 Maps of the relative frequencies of D614 and G614 in North America in two different time windows



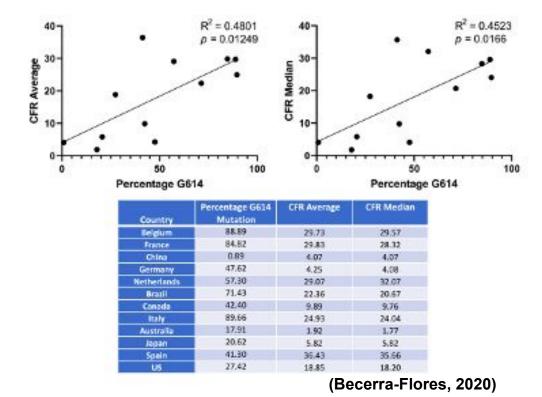
G614 has become the dominant genotype in North America

- Blue represents G614.
- Orange represents D614.
- Weekly running counts of G614
 illustrating the timing of its spread
 in North America.
- Stay-at-home order date is shown as a pink line.
- The introduction of G614 led to the decline in D614 cases.



Case Fatality Rate (CFR) and percentage of virus exhibiting G614

- Linear regression of average case fatality rate with percentage of viruses exhibiting a glycine (G) at amino acid position 614.
- China exhibiting G614 was less than 1% and this country exhibited the second lowest average or median CFR.



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An understanding of the epidemiology of SARS-CoV-2 may further explain the dominance of the G614 mutation

- Because viral transmission is dependent on whom it infects, it is important to further explore the epidemiology of SARS-CoV-2.
- Increased infectiousness may be solely responsible for the increased prevalence, but it is uncertain if other factors play a role.
- Tracking mutations in the spike protein, especially in the RBD region, is important during the development of therapeutic strategies.
