HISTORY OF BETHANY CHURCH GAINESVILLE DISTRICT JEFFERSON CIRCUIT

Bettern

The year of 1870, on land given by J. L. Harris, about 1/2 mile east of the present location, a school house was prected. A Sunday School was organized and occasionally preaching services were held. Uncle Billy Deabors, C. C. Carey, R. A. Seale, Henry Cranford and possibly others were doing the preaching.

Those taking part in the organization of the first Sunday School were Frank Dowdy, Joe Freeman, Dick England, Edd Sharpe, Ezekiel Boggs and others.

A short time before Bethany Church was organized, a protracted meeting was held under a brush arbor near the Venable Old Home. Much interest was manifested at this meeting and the people of the community began to advocate building a church.

Mike Williamson proposed to give \$50.00 toward the erection of a building provided five other men would each do the same. This amount was quickly subscribed by J. L. Harris, Ezekiel Boggs, Joe Freeman, Martin Venable and Edd Sharpe. A number of others subscribed a smaller amount, either in cash, material or work.

On January 5, 1878 Bethany Church was organized in the School v house, the Church building not being completed at the time.

"Copy of Minutes of Organization" January 5, 1878

A meeting was held this day at Harris School House to organize a New Methodist Church. Brother C. C. Cary preacher in charge preaching, meeting was opened with a song and prayer by the preacher. The following names were enrolled as members:

Brother J. L. Harris was on motion elected Secretary, when the preacher pronounded the church organized and ready for business. On motion the church was named Bethany. Brother Boggs and J. S. Freeman appointed class leaders by the preacher in charge. On motion the 1st. Saturday at 11000 0)clock and Sunday following were fixed for the days of preaching. On motion Brother E. Boggs was appointed to assist Brother Dowdy in the Sunday School at this place.

After the organization the church building was soon completed and on April 28, 1878, Uncle Henry Cranford preached the dedication sermon. The ground on which the church stands and also the ground for cemetery south of the public road, was given by J. L. Harris, Sr. The ground for the cemetery north of the road was given by J. L. Harris, Jr. The first wedding held in the church was that of Bruce Smith and Georgia England
