THE HISTORY OF PROSPECT METHODIST CHURCH

The history of Prospect Methodist Church has been a long and difficult one. But with the help of God it has grown as fast as the modern world.

The first official record was found on the tomb stone
of Dr. Jess G. Carr. Born December 27, 1804, died December 21,
1884 a member of Prospect Methodist Church for 45 years; he
united with the church in 1835. Which would make the Prospect
Church 116 years old.

The first Church was built on the hill in front of the church that now stands. There arose a dispute between the Southern and Northern Churches and the church was burned. They then built an arbor.

It was once a Camp Ground. People would prepare generous baskets of food and go in carriage, ox-carts and on foot, to camp for weeks at a time, sewing for the Confederate Army vand worshiping Gad. They had their prayer meetings on the week ends, Saturday and Sunday and would go into the woods to pray. "And may we remind you again that it is night time in this dark world? Likewise we would remind you that the dawn of a new day is at hand, Christ is coming back for His church and if you are not prepared, it will then be too late. Why not

wake up now, for it is "High time to awake out of sleep" for now is our salvation nearer than when we believed (Rom. 13:11).
"I am the light of the world; he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness but shall have the light of life" (John 8:12).

Among the first records that I have are the deeds to the property where the church now stands. The deeds were made on the Twenty-first day of October in the year 1851. Between William Mathis of the first part who owned the property at that time and the following Trustees of the second part:

Asbury A. Comer, William J. Comer, William James, James Hughess James Duval, William Carr, and Harrison Camp, Trustees for the Georgia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South.

This site contains six acres, more or less.

After the church was burned a frame church was built and some years after that, the present church was erected on the site.

The first one that was built was used for a schoolhouse, we until it was burned. Then the school was moved to the building in front of the church then to Fairview Consolidated school and now Coosa in the year 1928.

In the early days of the church, most of the people \angle were Cherokee Indians.

Colonel Hart organized his command for the Confederate
Army on the site where the church now stands.

Dispite all the difficulties and handicaps of the church it is growing rapidly and today it has 200 members and one of the oldest churches in the county.

"For when you trust Christ as your Saviour, you are "born again" born into the family of God and you have eternal life and a home awaiting you in God's Heaven" (John 3:3).

At the present their are no record of all the Pastors who have served the Prospect Church. On record it showes fifteen Presiding-Elders names dating from the year 1902, through 1951. I also have the record of fifty Pastors names who served from the year 1856 through 1951.

The present Pastor Rev. John M. Minter is the youngest pastor to ever serve Prospect Church and the Rome Circuit. He was licensed to preach in 1950 and held his first Revival and Quarterly Conference at Prospect Church, August 29, 1950. His first District Conference was held at the First Methodist Church in Cedar Town, Ga. January 11, 1951.
