

Identification



The American Academy of Religion is a society of college and university professors and others engaged in teaching and research in the field of religion. Its purpose is to stimulate scholarship, foster research and promote learning in the complex of disciplines that constitute religion as a field of inquiry.

Publications of the Academy and the convening of annual national and regional meetings implement these aims. Publications include the quarterly Journal of the American Academy of Religion, monographs in the Studies in Religion Series, and the Dissertation Series. The structure of the annual meeting of the Academy reflects the varied scholarly concerns of its members and provides for the development of both special interests and cross-disciplinary conversations in the general sessions, sections, groups and seminars. These program units, formed in response to interests of the members, change to keep pace with movement in the field of religion.

The Academy is also a professional society keeping its membership informed of developing programs, newly available materials, and opportunities for study grants and research funds. The Academy is affiliated with the Council on the Study of Religion and cooperates in the publication of its Bulletin, a professional news magazine, and also in the publication of a job registry in the field of religion.



COLLEGE THEOLOGY SOCIETY (Chicago Region)

The College Theology Society is a professional organization of college and university professors of religion in the United States and Canada. Of the professional societies, CTS members teach more students for more courses and have more out-of-classroom contacts.

The purpose of the College Theology Society is to improve the quality of the teaching of religion: by stimulating and sharing scholarly research; by developing programs of theology and religious studies which meet student needs and interests while being genuinely intellectual in content; and by exploring, evaluating, and encouraging effective ways of teaching which are interdisciplinary and ecumenical. It has a pastoral concern in relating faith to life, and in purifying and deepening the life of faith.

Membership in the College Theology Society is open to those who teach religious thought in college or on postcollegiate faculties, who have been awarded their first graduate degree in the field of religious studies.

Associate membership in the College Theology Society is open to those who are engaged in university studies in pursuit of degrees in theology and to those who are engaged in college teaching in the field but have not had the opportunity to do the appropriate graduate study.

AMERICAN ORIENTAL SOCIETY (The Middle West Branch)

The American Oriental Society was founded in 1842 for the promotion of research and publication in Oriental languages, literatures, history and art. Its field embraces the entire Orient from the Mediterranean to the Pacific.

According to the constitution, the purposes of the society shall be:

- to promote studies of the civilizations and languages of Asia, Northern Africa, and the Pacific islands, such studies being hereinafter referred to as 'oriental studies.'
- to hear and discuss communications of scholarly interest and to promote in such other ways as may be practicable the exchange of information within the field of oriental studies.
- to publish at regular intervals a journal of oriental studies and to publish occasionally memoirs, translations and reference works in that field.
- to collect and maintain a library of oriental studies for the use of members of the Society and other accredited scholars.
