



This is how you get what you want in bed.

As a sex coach, the two issues I encounter most often with my clients are difficulty experiencing optimal pleasure and lack of confidence around pleasuring one's partners. Both issues tend to stem from a difficulty in knowing the best way to ask a question – that is,



asking for more information in a way that:

- 1. Doesn't hurt anyone's feelings
- 2. Provides useful information
- 3. Doesn't generate an automatic answer (such as when someone asks "How are you?" and we reply "I'm fine thanks, you?" even when we're not fine at all)

I've been told again and again that implementing this one technique has dramatically changed my clients' ability to communicate with their partner, and ultimately their sex lives! Rather than asking your partner "closed questions" that only have a yes or no answer, give your partner options.

The problem is that most yes-or-no questions elicit either a false positive answer - one of you trying to appease the other's ego - or an answer that hurts the other's feelings.

Consider the following examples:

- "Does that feel good?"
- "Was I good?"
- "Did you come?"

Can you see how these kinds of questions - and answers! - end up causing some problems in communication for couples?

Instead, use this type of question as a way to get and give more pleasure:

"Would you	uprefer	or	S,,
		OI .	ē.

There's no wrong answer to this type of question! That is, you won't hurt your partner's feelings by answering, and they won't hurt yours when you ask them. In fact, you're both more likely to feel comfortable saying, "Actually what I would really love is if you did ______!"

Adopting a framework that focuses on options can go a long way to helping couples get the sexual pleasure they desire and deserve. I invite you to give it a try and let me know how it goes!
