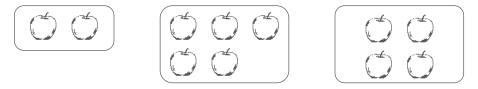

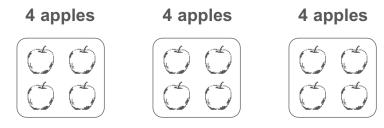
We add to join unequal groups.

Meters and Millimeters

You know that millimeters and centimeters are used for small measurements. Meters are used to measure larger things. There are 1,000 millimeters in 1 meter.

Use millimeters to measure very tiny things, like the length of an apple seed, the width of a pencil point, or the thickness of a coin.



Use meters to measure the width of your classroom, the length of a table, or the height of a window.

Meter Measurements

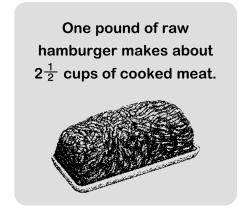
100 centimeters = 1 meter 1,000 millimeters = 1 meter

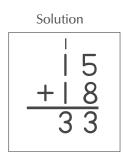

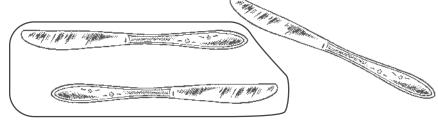
