3. Why did Abram and Lot move away from each other? (They had so much livestock that they didn't have enough land, and their servants began to fight.)

Activity Page

Read and apply the Bible verse. "Now the Lord had said unto Abram, Get thee out of thy country, and from thy kindred" (Genesis 12:1).

Do the lesson.

Students follow Abram's path as he travels to the Land of Canaan. Start with the first stone and color every other stone to find what God told Abram. Answer: "Abram, leave your country; leave your family. Go to a land I will show you. I will make a great nation of you."

Lesson 6: Two New Names

Genesis 17:1-8, 15-17; 18:1-15

Teacher's Story 6

Attribute: God is Faithful

Teacher Meditation: Many years before, God had given Abram several promises. Now God met with Abram in the form of a man. He not only gave them new names, He also told Abraham and Sarah when they could expect their promised son. This special mission with its special message still speaks to us today.

While God isn't likely to meet us in human form, He will meet each of us as we open our hearts to Him. Not only has God given each of us a new name, He has also given each one a special mission with a special message to share. Are you sharing yours? "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord" (Colossians 3:16).

Complete Story to Read

Abram now lived in the Land of Canaan. That was the first step in God's great plan to save the world from sin. When God called Abram to go to the Land of Canaan, He had promised him some things. At different times after that the LORD had added more promises to the first ones. God had kept some of those promises, but some others had not yet come to pass.

Of course, God had not told Abram when those things would come to pass, so he just had to wait. But as the years rolled by, sometimes Abram couldn't help wondering how God could ever do what He said.

For example, God had said He would make a great nation of Abram. One night He called Abram to come outside. He said, "Look up at the stars. Count them if you can. That is how many descendants you will have."

Another time He told Abram that no one would be able to count his descendants. They would be as the sand of the sea, innumerable.

Abram found that hard to believe, because he was almost a hundred years old and he and Sarai did not have one child.

When Abram turned ninety-nine years old, God appeared to him and said, "I am going to change your name to Abraham because you are going to be a father of many nations." 
- 1. Why was it hard for Abram to believe he would have many descendants? (He and Sarah had no children and they were getting old.)

Teacher's Story 7 Attribute: God is Good

Teacher Meditation: As time moves on, we see God's plans moving ahead. Abraham's servant could have fretted and worried, worried and fretted, but that would not have accomplished much. Instead he committed his problem to his heavenly Father, and the details simply fell into place. What a beautiful picture of God's grace and goodness! Are you trusting your heavenly Father to work in spite of problems that you may be facing? "Commit thy way unto the LORD; trust also in him; and he shall bring it to pass" (Psalms 37:5).

Complete Story to Read

At last God's promise came true. After waiting so long, Abraham and Sarah had a little son. They named him Isaac, as God had said.

Now Sarah laughed for joy at God's goodness. And Abraham could see God's plan beginning to work. The LORD had promised that Abraham's descendants would be as the stars of the sky—innumerable. God would make that promise come true through Isaac.

Perhaps Isaac was rather lonely, for he grew up without brothers or sisters to play with. But we know his parents taught him about the true God. The Lord had chosen Abraham in the first place because He knew Abraham would teach his children to love the God of heaven. And Abraham did that.

But how about Isaac? Would he teach *his* children about God? Isaac had no children. He was not even married yet. He seemed perfectly happy living with his father and mother. God's plan was not moving ahead very fast.

Then when Isaac was thirty-seven years old, his mother died. How sad and lonely it was without Sarah. And Abraham began thinking.

In those days the parents often chose whom their children married. So it was not strange that Abraham began thinking about a wife for Isaac. He could think of no one in Canaan who would make a good godly wife for his son, for the women there were wicked and worshiped idols. Where could he find a woman who knew the true God?

Then Abraham thought of Haran. That is where he had lived so many years ago. When God called him to leave Haran and come down to Canaan, Abraham's brother had stayed there. His brother's family knew the true God. Maybe he could find a good wife for Isaac in Haran.

But Abraham was far too old to make the long hard trip to Haran. And he didn't want Isaac to go. Perhaps he was afraid that something would happen, and Isaac would not come back. Abraham talked to the head servant of his household. He told him to go to Haran and see if he could a find a good woman who would come back to Canaan and marry Isaac.

The servant loaded ten camels with provisions for the trip and expensive gifts, and started for Haran.
