Clause Review

(75-79)

A *phrase* is a group of related words that does not contain a subject and verb. Like a phrase, a *clause* is a group of related words; but a clause contains a subject and a verb.

phrase: In the 1800s, thousands of people traveled west to Oregon and California.

clause: There were several major routes ^S that these pioneers ^V followed.

Lesson 1

There are two kinds of clauses. An *independent clause* contains the main thought of the sentence. It can stand alone because it has a complete thought.

Jason interviewed his neighbors who had fled their home in Nigeria.

A *dependent clause* has a subject and a verb, but it *depends* on the independent clause. By itself, a dependent clause is a fragment: it cannot stand alone as a sentence. Dependent clauses are introduced and connected to the independent clause by relative pronouns and subordinating conjunctions. They are the clauses your LightUnit will always mean unless it specifically says *independent clause*.

Adjective Clauses

(76, 77)

An *adjective clause* is a dependent clause that modifies a noun or pronoun. Adjective clauses are introduced by relative pronouns—*who*, *which*, or *that*. An adjective clause immediately follows the noun or pronoun it modifies and answers the questions *which one*, *what kind*, *how many*, or *whose*.

He [that believeth on the Son] hath everlasting life.

Mark has an uncle [who is refurbishing a Model T.]

Lesson 3

Adverb Clauses

(77-79)

A dependent clause that modifies a verb, adjective, or adverb is an adverb clause. Adverb clauses most often modify verbs. They are introduced by subordinating conjunctions.

Annie and Betsy collected flowers **as** they walked beside the wagon].
 Teresa took the children to the park **so** Mother could rest].

Like adverbs, adverb clauses answer the questions *where, when, how, why, or to what extent*. Also like adverbs, adverb clauses can come anywhere in the sentence. When an adverb clause comes at the beginning of a sentence, it should be followed by a comma.

[Since it was foggy], we left for school fifteen minutes early.
