Jesus Teaches Who He Is

Jesus was the Son of God, and He had many important things He wanted to tell people. He told them about God His Father, and about the kingdom of heaven. He also taught the people about Himself. He gave Himself different names to describe who He was and what He could do.

Jesus told a story about a shepherd who had one hundred sheep. One evening the shepherd realized that one of his sheep was missing. Although he still had ninety-nine sheep, the shepherd did not want to lose even one.

Leaving his flock, the shepherd went looking for the sheep that was lost. He wanted to find it before some hungry animal did.

In the story, the shepherd found the sheep and brought it back to safety. He called his neighbors and told them, "Celebrate with me, for I've found my lost sheep."

Jesus told the people that He was the Good Shepherd. Like the shepherd who cares for his sheep, Jesus cares for us. Like the shepherd who went looking for his lost sheep, Jesus doesn't want us to be lost in sin or lonely without Him. Jesus said that as our Good Shepherd, He would give His life to help us.

In those days, a shepherd kept his sheep in a sheepfold during the night. The sheepfold had walls that kept the sheep safe from hungry animals like wolves. "I am the Door of the sheepfold," Jesus told the people.

Jesus is like a door because no one can enter the safety of the sheepfold unless they know Jesus. No one can be in the kingdom of heaven unless they believe in Jesus.

One time Jesus took five loaves of bread and two fish and made them into a meal that fed a crowd of over 5,000 people. After that miracle, the people wanted to make Jesus into a king. Jesus didn't let them; He slipped off to be alone.

The next day, crowds of people searched for Jesus. When they found Him, Jesus

told them, "You're looking for

Me only because you got a good meal yesterday." He knew that most of them were not serious about learning from Him.

Jesus kept talking.
He told the people, "I came down from
Heaven to give life to the world. I am the
Bread of Life. He that comes to Me will never get hungry. Everyone who believes in Me will live forever."

Many of the people listening didn't understand Jesus. At first they thought Jesus meant

He would give them a special kind of bread that would enable them to live forever. But Jesus didn't mean that.

All of us need food to live, and Jesus was saying that He is like bread because He brings life. Just like food gives us energy, Jesus gives us

strength to do what is right. And without Jesus, we would not be able to have the life that lasts forever. We would not be able to live forever in Heaven.

Later, Jesus met a man who had been blind from the day he was born. This man had lived in darkness all his life. Jesus brought light to the man by healing his eyes. Jesus told His disciples, "I am the Light of the world."

Jesus taught that wrong and evil are like darkness. A person who does things he knows is wrong is like a person walking in darkness. Walking in the dark makes it easy to become lost and afraid, because there is no light to see by.

When we obey Jesus, He brings light to our hearts. Like light chases away the dark, the sin in our hearts is taken away. Instead of doing wrong things, we now love to do good for other people. When we do good things, there is less darkness and more light in the world. That is what Jesus wants.

There are many names for Jesus in the Bible. Jesus told us these names to help us understand Him better. As we understand more about Him, we can better follow Him.



Jesus Warns About Money and Possessions

Jesus was always kind and helpful to the needy, but in His wisdom He didn't always offer the kind of help people wanted.

One time a man wanted Jesus to help him get some money from his brother who had just received an inheritance. Jesus refused to get involved. Instead, He told the man to watch out for jealousy and selfishness. "Your life is not valued by how much you own," Jesus said.

Jesus went on to tell a parable. With the parable He showed that there is something more important than money.

The main character of the parable was a rich man whose farm had yielded a plentiful harvest. The farmer's barns weren't big enough to hold all the crops. "What should I do?" the man wondered.

He decided to tear down his old barns and build bigger ones. With so much stored up, he looked forward to living a life of ease and pleasure.

But God told the rich man, "You are a fool. Tonight you will die, and what good will your riches be to you then?"

Jesus ended the parable by saying, "If you lay up treasure for yourself, but are not rich toward God, you are like the rich man." The selfishness of the farmer showed that he was not obeying God.

Many times Jesus talked about money and possessions with His followers. He taught that money and the other things we own are gifts from God to share with others.



To show us that we do not need to worry about having enough, Jesus talked about nature. "God feeds the birds, and you are much more valuable than birds to God," Jesus said. "And look at the lilies," Jesus added. "They don't work for a living, yet God gives them life and beauty. How much more will God care for you?"

Jesus reminded His listeners that God cares about them. "Do your best to obey kingdom rules and God will give you everything you need."

Jesus instructed the people to give money to the poor. He said that was a way to gain rewards in Heaven. That kind of reward can never be stolen like money can be. "It will be a treasure in Heaven that never fails," Jesus said.

Another time, Jesus told about another rich man who neglected to help a poor man who lived nearby. The rich man wore expensive clothes and ate fine food every day.

A beggar, whose name was Lazarus, lay outside the gates of the rich man's estate every day

to beg for food. Lazarus was a sick man, and dogs came and licked his sores.

One day Lazarus died. Angels carried him to Heaven, where he rested in comfort.

Soon afterward, the rich man died and was buried. Instead of being carried away by angels, he found himself in a terrible place of torture. Looking up from Hell, he saw Lazarus far away, safe with Abraham—a man who lived for God long before.

"Father Abraham, have mercy on me," the rich man cried. "Send Lazarus here, that he may dip the tip of his finger in water, and cool my tongue, for I am tormented in flames."

Abraham refused. "Son," he replied, "remember how rich you were all your life, and the good

things you enjoyed, while Lazarus suffered and begged for crumbs at your gate? Now he is comforted and you are tormented. Besides all

> that, there is a great gulf between us, and we are unable to cross and help you." The sad fate of the rich man who didn't care about

other people warns us that we should always be ready to share the good things we have with people who need them.

Jesus said that anyone who gives up wealth or possessions for the kingdom of God will be repaid with far greater things in Heaven. A heavenly treasure is worth far more than a treasure on earth.
