The Cities of the Levites Bible Passage – Joshua 20:1—21:45

The Levites were the only tribe that did not inherit any land. Their inheritance was to serve in the tabernacle as priests and helpers of priests. But God also knew that His people, once they had moved to their territories, would be far from the tabernacle. They might forget Him; so He commanded Moses to choose cities throughout Canaan for the Levites to live in. The Levites could then teach the people God's laws and lead them in worshiping the Lord.

Now that the land had been divided, Joshua set aside forty-eight cities in Canaan for the tribe of Levi. Thirteen cities would belong to the priests. The other thirty-five cities were for the rest of the Levites. Each city was to give some land outside its city walls to the Levites, who could till the land and raise their cattle on it.

During most of the year, the priests lived in these cities, where they served God and His people. The rest of the year, they took turns going to Shiloh to perform the priestly duties at the tabernacle.

Joshua also chose six Levite cities to be cities of refuge. The custom of the ancient

world said that when a man was murdered, a relative should **avenge** his death. A close relative of the slain man was required to take the life of the one who had killed him. This relative was called an "avenger of blood."

But this custom did not always work. People sometimes killed each other only because

Class Starter

- Is there anything God cannot do? We have been studying about the miraculous ways God helped the
 - Israelites conquer Canaan. But this lesson tells us there is something that God cannot do.
- God cannot lie. When He makes a promise, He cannot fail to keep it. Numbers 23:19 says God is not a man, that he should lie; neither the son of man, that he should repent: hath he said, and shall he not do it? or hath he spoken, and shall he not make it good?
- Ask the children to quote their favorite promises. Spend some time praising God for His faithfulness.

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they wanted revenge. An angry avenger of blood might kill a man even though that man had accidentally killed another. Sometimes, the killing would then go on and on for many generations between families, as they killed each other to get even for past killings. There seemed to be no way to end the bloodshed.

The LORD gave Israel a new law in place of the old custom. His law told the people of Israel that they could only punish someone who had murdered another, and the new law provided "cities of refuge," places to find safety from an avenger of blood. If a man—whether an Israelite, a foreigner, or a sojourner—accidentally killed another, he could flee to the nearest city of refuge and be safe.

Joshua chose three cities of refuge west of the Jordan River and three cities east of the river. West of the Jordan were Kedesh in the territory of Naphtali, Shechem in Ephraim, and Hebron in Judah. On the east side of the Jordan were Bezer in Reuben, Ramoth-Gilead in Gad, and Golan in Manasseh. These cities were located in the north, central, and southern parts of Canaan. A man could reach one of these cities within a day. Most cities of refuge were built on a hill, so they could be seen from far away. The roads to these cities were broad, well-marked, and kept in good repair.

When a man accidentally killed another he was called a manslayer. He would run as quickly as possible to the nearest city of refuge. The avenger of blood might pursue him, but as soon as the manslayer arrived at

the city, he would tell the elders sitting at the gate what had happened. They would let the manslayer enter the city, but would not allow the avenger to pass through the gate.

The manslayer would then stand before an assembly for questioning. If he was found innocent because he had slain someone accidentally, he was allowed to remain in the city of refuge. But if the man was found guilty of murder, he was released at once to the avenger of blood.

As long as a manslayer stayed within the boundaries of the city of refuge, he was safe. If he ventured outside the city limits, he was no longer safe, and the avenger could kill him. The manslayer was to remain in the city of refuge until the death of the high priest; then he was free to return to his own city and he could not be killed. It was as if the high priest had died in his place.

This new law taught the people to be more just in their dealings with each other. It taught the Israelites to control themselves—not to yield to sudden anger. It taught them to protect the innocent and to love justice.

Once the land had been divided among the tribes, Joshua blessed the people. Then he sent them away—each tribe to its new homeland. Now God's promise to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob was fulfilled. The Israelites possessed Canaan, their promised homeland. God had kept every word of His promise. Not one of the promises God had made to them failed—everything came to pass. The children of Israel were home; they rested from war.


