Bible Lesson Text—Mark 2:1-12; 3:1-6; John 5:30-39; 8:31—9:41 **Lesson Aims**

- 1. To prepare students to study the Book of Acts by reviewing the life of Jesus.
- 2. To establish the cultural and historical setting in which Jesus lived.
- 3. To teach students that sin is an issue each of them must face, for "all have sinned."
- 4. To teach that Jesus is the Son of God and that He is the only way to salvation.

Inspiration for the Teacher

Those of us who have been Christians for many years may have forgotten how hopeless we felt when the Holy Spirit first began to show us how sinful we were—or how impossible it seemed that we could ever be worthy of God's love. For some of your young students, these feelings of unworthiness and despair may be daily companions.

We did not remain without hope, though, and neither must our students. God has condescended to enter our world and make a way of escape for us—though the details of that condescension seem almost too impossible to be true.

Gather the Supplies You Will Need

- Photocopied Optional Worksheet for each student from page 83 if you decide to use it
- Map of the Middle East for introducing the setting of this course
- If you choose to use Optional Lesson Introduction # 2, you will need a smudged hand mirror, paper towels, and two spray bottles labelled "glass cleaner." Fill one bottle with water and vegetable oil. Fill the other with actual glass cleaner. Make sure you know which is which!

Welcome Your Pupils

As the students enter the room, welcome them warmly. Establish firm but friendly control of the class from the start. Explain the schedule and your rules.

Praise and Worship God

Pray with your students.

Introduce the Student Workbook and the Course

Hand each student a workbook. Tell them this workbook contains lessons taken from the first fourteen chapters of Acts. If they are not familiar with the Bible, show them the Acts of the Apostles in your Bible.

Show the students a map of the Middle East. Tell them that this is where the events described in this course took place.

Optional Lesson Introductions

- 1. Ask students to name famous people who have greatly influenced our country. What problems did they solve? Can they name someone who has had a powerful influence on the entire world? Jesus Christ has had a more powerful effect on the world than any other person. This lesson introduces us to Jesus and the main problem of the world that He came to solve.
- 2. Have a student spray water and oil on a hand mirror and attempt to clean it with a paper towel. Then have another student spray the mirror with glass cleaner to clean it. Relate this to our need to have sin removed from our lives. Many people have attempted to cure their sin problem in ways that don't work. Only one Man—Jesus Christ—was able to cleanse people from the sins which separate them from a holy God. We will learn about this Man in this lesson.

The Bible Lesson

(See The Bible Lesson on page vi for three different ways to present the lesson.)

Discussion Guide

- Give your students a brief overview of Creation, the Fall of man, and our inadequacy to please God without atonement for our sins. Romans 3:10-12; 1 John 1:8.
- Explain that because God loves everyone, He promised a Saviour to rescue us from sin and its consequences. Matthew 1:21-23
- When Jesus came, He taught the people, healed the sick, and raised to life some who had died. All this had been prophesied years before. These miracles were signs so people would know Jesus was the Saviour God sent.
- Read Mark 2:1-12 the story of Jesus for-

Jesus, God's Remedy for Sin

MARK 2:1-12: 3:1-6: JOHN 5:30-39: 8:31-9:41



Many Scriptures foretold the coming of Jesus, God's Son, to earth as a human being. Mankind had disobeyed God ever since the Garden of Eden. So God planned a way for all of us to have our sins forgiven and have our relationship with Him restored. You'd think that the Jewish people would have felt honored when the Messiah,

Jesus, came to live among them and teach them about His Father. Sadly, this was not so.

The expected king and deliverer of the Jews. God had foretold He would send His anointed One

Jesus was the kindest man who ever lived, but He still had enemies. News about Him spread as He traveled through the country healing sick people and preaching about God. Things He said and did got the attention of the Jewish religious leaders. Eventually they turned against Him.

For example, one day some men brought their paralyzed friend to Jesus. Jesus recognized their faith. He said, "Son, your sins are forgiven."

Some scribes overheard Jesus forgive the man's sins. They immediately questioned, "Who can forgive sins but God?" Even when Jesus miraculously healed the man and he was able to walk, they couldn't believe that Jesus was the Son of God.

The Jews had strict rules about what people were allowed to do on the Sabbath Day, their day

Scribes

Educated Jewish men who studied, copied, and edited the Scriptures. They taught what they felt was the best interpretation of God's Word. of worship. The scribes and Pharisees watched Jesus closely to see if He would heal anyone on the Sabbath. They thought this would be against the Sabbath laws. Jesus told

them it was lawful to do good on the Sabbath, and then He healed a man with a crippled hand. The leaders went away determined to find some way to stop

A group of Jews especially strict in observing God's laws and adding many more of their own

Jesus and the Roman Empire.

The Romans did many good things for the nations they conquered, such as building excellent roads. But the Jews hated this foreign government. When the Jews read the prophecies of the coming Messiah, many hoped that He would lead them in a rebellion against the Romans. Since Jesus refused to fight against the Romans, but taught love and kindness to everyone, many Jews refused to accept Him as the promised One.

Rejecting the truth.

Jesus tried many times to show the religious leaders that God had sent Him. He told them, "My miracles and other deeds prove that God My Father has sent Me. Search the Scriptures, for they tell about Me." The scribes and Pharisees sent educated men to try to trap Jesus into saying something wrong, but they failed each time because Jesus always knew what to say.

Jesus told the Jews, "If you follow Me, you will know the truth, and the truth shall set you free.' Instead of following Jesus, many Jews chose to become slaves of the devil.

"A person who obeys God listens to God's words, but you reject God's words because you do not really follow God," Jesus said. The Jews were so angry they picked up rocks to throw at Jesus, but He escaped.

giving a man's sins and then healing his body.

- Read Mark 3:1-6. Not everyone believed that Jesus was God's Son and the promised Saviour. Many Pharisees hated Him and planned to kill Him.
 - How did the Pharisees find fault when Jesus healed the man's withered hand?
- Read John 5:30-39. Jesus openly declared who He was and explained His purpose for coming to earth. This passage was His reply to the Jews who wanted to kill Him because He said that God was His Father.
 - (v. 30) Whose will did Jesus do?
 - (v. 34) What was Jesus' purpose for saying these things?
- Read John 8:31—John 9:41.
 - (8:31-36) What did Jesus mean when He said that the truth would make people free?
 - (9:3) What reason did Jesus give for the man's blindness?
 - (9:30-33) How did the man explain the miracle of his healing?
 - (9:41) Why did Jesus tell the Pharisees they were blind?
- Briefly recount Jesus' arrest, crucifixion, and resurrection. Tell students that the rest of the lessons in this book tell the story of what happened to believers after Jesus had finished the work God had sent Him to do.

Workbook Activities

What the Bible Says

Explain the context of this verse from the last part of John 6. Many of the Jews argued about who Jesus really was. When Jesus told them things they didn't want to hear, many turned away from Him. (John 6:66.)

Read John 6:67-69 and ask the students who said the words of verse 69. (*Peter.*) To whom was he speaking? (*Jesus.*) Have the students do the exercises on page 3.

Envy and hatred.

When Jesus healed a blind man on the Sabbath day, the Pharisees investigated. They tried to convince the blind man that Jesus was a sinner, but he disagreed. "It is unheard of for a man to cure the eyes of someone born blind," he said. "If this man weren't from God, He wouldn't be able to do it." That made the Pharisees angry.

The religious leaders envied Jesus because so many people believed Him. When Jesus brought a dead man back to life, the leaders said, "If we don't do something, everyone will believe in Him." They watched for a chance to kill Him. Jesus knew His death was part of God's plan. He didn't try to fight back when He was arrested by the jealous Jews who hated Him.

Death-Life!

The Jewish leaders gave Jesus a quick trial and persuaded the Roman governor Pilate to sentence Him to death. The Son of God, who loved all people, was whipped and mistreated. He was nailed to a Roman cross, where He died.

Jesus' eleven faithful disciples grieved for three days until Jesus proved His power over death and came back to life. He will never die again, and those who believe in Him will live forever too.

The following stories come from the book of the New Testament called The Acts of the Apostles. They tell the exciting story of what happened to God's people after Jesus' death and resurrection.

Disciples

Lesson 1

It's hard to explain or imagine, but Jesus is at the same time both *fully human* and *fully God.* No one else has been or ever will be such a God-man. For this reason, we call Him the only Son of God.

- Discuss the miracle of Christ being fully human and fully God at the same time.
- Why didn't Jesus' miracles convince the Pharisees that He was God's Son?

Remember This?

Allow time for the students to do the exercise on their own. Or do it together as a class.

When the exercise is completed, have the students take turns reading the complete sentences as a summary of the lesson facts.

Also discuss the fact that although Jesus' life as a man is past, He is still alive in Heaven with God, and the work He did on earth still saves us.

Jesus lived as a man. Then explain that during Jesus' time on earth, the Roman Empire had swallowed up all the countries surrounding the Mediterranean Sea. At one time the Jews had claimed Palestine as their own, but by the time Jesus was born, they had lost their right to govern themselves. Most of the Jews hated the pagan Romans and wanted to be free of Roman power. They hoped that the Messiah God had promised would help them destroy their enemies and give them back their historical lands.







Why Jesus Came

When the exercise is completed and the verse is revealed, tell the students that the Apostle Paul wrote these words to his young fellow minister Timothy.

Before Paul began to follow Jesus' way, he was an arrogant, hypocritical, religious persecutor of Christians. (Acts 8:3; Acts 9:1, 2.) He thought he lived a good life and obeyed the Jewish Scriptures. But like everyone else, he had to repent of his sinfulness before he could find salvation in Jesus.

This former persecutor of innocent people became a powerful witness, missionary, and writer for God. But Paul always admitted that he was merely a sinner in need of Christ's work of salvation.

Insights From Culture and History

Jesus was born over 2,000 years ago in Bethlehem, Judea, one of the lesser provinces of the Roman Empire. His development into manhood took place in insignificant rural villages. He lived a short life by modern evaluation—thirty-three years. He taught in Jewish synagogues and towns a mere three years before being delivered for execution at the will of His own people, to be tortured and crucified by the imperial Roman government.

Had Jesus been an ordinary man it would have ended there. No history books, legends, or folk tales would have extended the story more than a few years, at best. Most of the world would have never noticed then—or now. He'd have ended up as nothing more than a forgotten statistic.

But Jesus was not an ordinary man. He was the Son of God Almighty—moderator of eternity, Creator of the universe, and lover of His own created mankind.

Three days after His crucifixion, Jesus rose miraculously out of a guarded sepulcher, just as He had predicted. The wickedest act that men could inflict had miserably failed.

Jesus was alive, never to die again! Hallelujah!

Since then, the world has changed immensely, but its need for a Saviour never ends. Envy, hatred, jealousy, rejection of truth, and hypocrisy still prevail. The world mocks, but Jesus is still God's remedy for the sin of the whole world.
