Rhythm in Poetry

Rhythm in Poetry

rhythm (ri' thəm): a repeated pattern of accented and unaccented syllables

iambic (ī am' bik): a rhythm pattern of one unaccented syllable followed by one accented syllable

Rhythm is a repeated pattern of accented and unaccented syllables. Your heart has rhythm. Listen to your heartbeat. Hear the *thump-THUMP*, *thump-THUMP*, *thump-THUMP*? That is rhythm.

Many poets use a pattern of accented and unaccented syllables to give their poems rhythm. One common rhythm pattern is **iambic** rhythm. It is a pattern of one unaccented syllable followed by one accented syllable.

lambic marches with a steady beat.

The iambic rhythm pattern may remind you of your heartbeat. You can read the rhythm pattern of a poem by saying "down" for unaccented syllables and "UP" for accented syllables. Iambic rhythm would be "down-UP, down-UP, down-UP."

down UP down UP down UP down UP lambic marches with a steady beat.
