Repatriation and Reconstruction

Just as prophesied, God ended the seventy-year Captivity by having Cyrus decree the **repatriation** of interested Jews and the reconstruction of the temple at Jerusalem. Under the leadership of King David's descendant Zerubbabel and Aaron's descendant Jeshua, close to 50,000 Jewish exiles returned to Jerusalem.

Words to Know

repatriation (re' pā' trē ā' shən): the return or restoration of a person to his country of origin

Lesson 6

Though restoring the temple was the primary mission of these returning exiles, they were unable to get the task done quickly. Sixteen years after the first exiles returned to Jerusalem, God raised up the prophets Haggai and Zechariah to help renew the vision for the temple, and construction resumed. Twenty years after the Captivity ended, the Israelites finally finished the temple.

After the temple was rebuilt in Jerusalem, God placed a young Jewess named Esther and her cousin

Mordecai in one of the Persian's imperial headquarters, the palace of King Ahasuerus at Shushan. Esther and Mordecai rose to positions of power, and God used them to protect the Messianic line from destruction. The next lesson tells the story of the Jews left in Persia, even after thousands of them had returned from the Captivity.

Search the Scriptures

① King Darius of Babylon had a son Xerxes, traditionally thought to be King Ahasuerus, who took Esther to be his new queen at Shushan. Xerxes' successor was Artaxerxes, who later encouraged the Jews to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem.


Ezra and Nehemiah

Possibly while Esther was queen of Persia, God called "Ezra the priest, a scribe of the law of the God of heaven" (Ezra 7:12) to lead a second group of Jews back to Jerusalem from Babylon. This significantly smaller group included many priests. The mission of these returning exiles seems to have been revival. The teaching and living of the Law of Moses resumed in Israel, bringing spiritual reform to God's people. "For Ezra had prepared his heart to seek the law of the LORD, and to do it, and to teach in Israel statutes and judgments" (Ezra 7:10).

About thirteen years after Ezra's return, God sent Nehemiah with a handful of folks to Jerusalem. Their objective was to fortify and secure Jerusalem by rebuilding her walls and gates. Nehemiah encouraged the social and economic reforms begun by Ezra and the priests.

About one hundred years after Zerubbabel's return, God sent the last Old Testament prophet to His people. When Malachi's ministry ended and his book was written, the Old Testament Scriptures were complete.

God had brought His people back to their land, just as He had promised. What a mighty God! He does as He wishes and accomplishes what He chooses. His power knows no limitation. His ability never fails. No one and nothing can stand in His way or thwart His purposes, except as He Himself decides to allow it. There is none like Him in all the earth. His equal or superior cannot be found anywhere in time, space, or eternity. He alone is sovereign. Hallelujah, praise Jehovah!



We see God's sovereignty in using powerful leaders to fulfill His plans. He prompted heathen kings to permit and facilitate the Jews' return to their land and to restore Jerusalem and the temple. Though not openly as with Cyrus, God also governed Ahasuerus. Though God's name doesn't appear in the Book of Esther, His sovereign hand rules unmistakably. What may appear to be coincidence and random chance is

rather God guiding history in the making. Truly Jehovah alone is Sovereign of sovereigns, easily directing kings and emperors.
