

WHETHER YOUR RESOURCES ARE LIMITED OR GENEROUS, it is wise to consider expenses before proceeding with wedeing purchases. Two questions for bride and groom to discuss, together and with their families, may be:

1) WHICH WEDDING EXPENSES BELONG TO THE BRIDE'S FAMILY AND WHICH TO THE GROOM'S FAMILY, OR SHALL THE TOTAL BE DIVIDED EVENLY?

Traditionally in the U.S.A., the groom and his family assumed expenses for the rehearsal dinner and the honeymoon, while the bride and her family covered all costs for the wedding and the reception. However, as each situation allows, to-day's couples may feel perfectly free to make alternative decisions which are agreeable to both families.

2) HOW MUCH SHOULD WE SPEND?

A simple budget may be helpful to chart expenses. This list is not exhaustive, and some categories may overlap. These are only some possibilities for your consideration.

FABRIC CAN BE HARD TO FIND (depending on where you live), so it is a good idea to contact fabric shops, tell them the colors you're looking for, and request that samples be sent to you.

SEWING IS SOMETHING THAT CAN be done while you brainstorm about other details of the wedding. It is a good idea to sew a few dresses for yourself and perfect your pattern before starting on your wedding dress. Of course, this effort can produce the happy result of having some new dresses in your closet waiting for the honeymoon! Getting this off your list gives you a good feeling and is sure to cut down on last-minute stress.

INVITATIONS ARE PROBABLY THE BIGGEST thing to get off your list. They can be time consuming, but it is very rewarding to have them done. First decide who all you will invite. Will it be just immediate family or all your friends and relatives? Will you include children?


IT IS A GOOD IDEA to send your invitations at least two months before the wedding so your guests are sure to save the date. It can take up to three or four weeks to get the invitations after you order them, so be sure to take that into consideration. Compiling all the guest addresses into this book should save a lot of time when you are ready to mail the invitations. A check mark beside the name indicates that an invitation has been sent to that person. Be sure to keep one out for yourself!
