## Ready to Go?

Welcome to fifth grade math. Don't you feel refreshed and ready to go after a summer vacation? Good! Did you go on any trips this summer? Did you travel to a foreign country?

Have you ever wanted to travel to Central America, Europe, or Africa? Well, here's your chance. The themes in Math 500 will take you to mission stations around the world. Of course, you already know that the climate, plant and animal life, and way of living differ in other countries. Yet all people around the world have the same basic need-Jesus. Remember to pray for the missionaries and people in the countries you visit.


Math 501 is different from other LightUnits. It helps you brush up on what you learned in fourth grade. It gives you a series of pretests and practice pages to prepare you for your travels.

Most lessons begin with a pretest of a particular area of math you studied in Grade 4. The scoring box at the end of the test shows you how many problems you must have correct to pass. If you pass the pretest, your teacher may allow you to skip the practice exercises in the next day's lesson. The practice exercises help you to relearn what you may have forgotten from last year.

Some lessons are quite easy, but others may take a little more time and effort to complete. Don't be discouraged; we all forget. Just do your best to get ready for your first flight.

## Introduce the LightUnit

Hand out LightUnit 501. Read the introduction on page 2 together. Page through the LightUnit together, taking time to discuss things the students see that look interesting. Tell your students this LightUnit reviews what they learned in fourth grade. After successfully finishing this LightUnit, they will be all set to travel into the rest of fifth grade math.

## Tips for Struggling Students

$\rightarrow$ When the symbols < and > are used, the point of the symbol always points toward the smaller number.
$\rightarrow$ Students may need to have the terms negative and simplify explained to them.

## Helpful Hints

$\rightarrow$ Students may need a reminder about $<$ and $>$ signs. These signs look like an alligator's mouth that is wide open to gobble up the larger number. The widest part is always next to the larger number. If the wide part of the sign is first, $(>)$ it is a greater than symbol. If the point is first, $(<)$ it is a less than symbol.
$\rightarrow$ When simplifying expressions, remind students to work from left to right. They must do multiplication and division first and then addition and subtraction.

## Tips for Struggling

Students
Struggling students may benefit from the extra practice sheets in Appendix E of this guide.

## Helpful Hints

$\rightarrow$ Negative numbers are always located to the left of zero on the number line. On a thermometer they are below the zero. Temperatures below zero are cold because there is less heat in the air. The farther below zero it is, the less heat there is; therefore, -18 is less than 7 even though it is a bigger number.
