

Accepted in the Beloved

We are naturally a self-centered bunch. We see life through our personal lenses and often consciously or subconsciously expect the world to understand things the way we do and conform to our wishes, needs, and plans. The experience of rejection heightens this natural self-centeredness. It easily makes our needs more starkly apparent to us and our demands on God and others more intense.

Shifting our centeredness to Jesus is a revolutionary, but necessary, shift. When we make Jesus the center of our lives, we come to live in union with Him. He lives in us and we live in Him. By this we affirm experientially that Jesus is alive today, that He is in the room with us, that He is able to talk to us and listen to us, and that we can have a relationship with Him as real as any relationship with a flesh-and-blood friend.

In this chapter we want to explore more fully the acceptance we have with God, based on our spiritual union with Jesus. God receives us fully, completely taking us into His heart. Just as relationship with God is the most fundamental relationship, so acceptance with God is the most fundamental acceptance, and to be rejected by God is the most fundamental rejection.

To face rejection by humans is painful, but it is not the worst rejection. To be accepted by humans is wonderful, but it is not the most fantastic acceptance. No matter whether we are accepted or rejected on earth, ultimately we must find ourselves "in" with God.

Ironically, when Paul was reconciled to God through Jesus, he moved from acceptance to rejection among his peers. Those who had commended him for his Jewish zeal eventually sought his life for his devotion to Christ. He went from top man to topping the most-wanted list. He was beaten, chased out, imprisoned, mocked, falsely accused, and thoroughly rejected by the Jews.

But Paul had gained the most important acceptance. He belonged to the Father in Heaven. He had been received of God, accepted in a way that more than compensated for being cast out among his fellows. We wish to explore this acceptance by God, to plumb its breadth and width, as it were, because this is the secret of handling rejection from people in the here and now.

Instead of having a grand review at the end of the year, approximately two-thirds of most lessons is review. This review system helps students retain important concepts.





LightUnit Format




Textbook Format


Teacher's Guides

Charting a Course

Based on the book *Charting a Course in Your Youth*, this half-credit elective helps students think seriously about finances and life, challenging them to channel their time, talents, and resources into God's kingdom.



From the Publisher's Note


