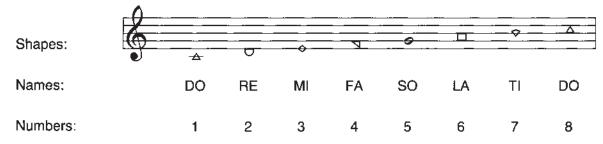
Singing is not just a Christian pastime. It is both a duty and a privilege. God requires us to sing, and we can find much joy in obeying this command.

The lines and spaces of the staff are called degrees. These degrees are lettered. A clef sign on the staff gives the letter of one degree and then we can letter the other degrees. The G clef names the second line G. The F clef names the fourth line F. The two staffs with the G clef and the F clef make the grand staff.



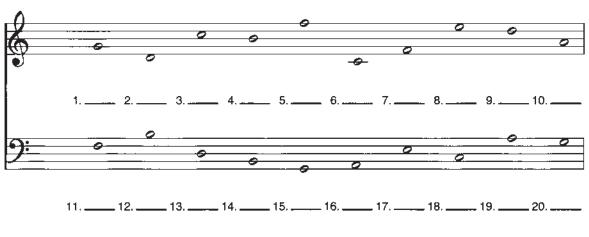

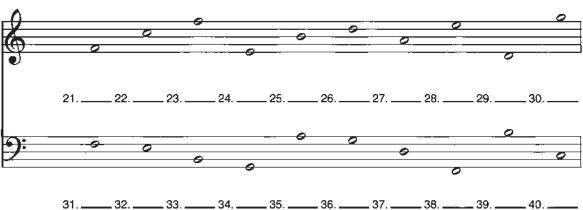

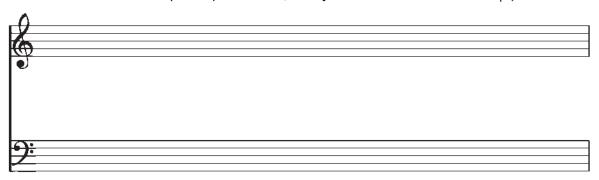

Draw the scale on each staff. On the G staff, start low DO on middle C. On the F staff, start low DO on the second space. (Remember, always count from the bottom up.)



Key signatures are made with flats or sharps and appear right after the clef sign. Key signatures tell us the pitch and position of DO. For example, the Key of F means DO appears on the degree F and its pitch is also F. Or the Key of B $^{\frac{1}{p}}$ means DO appears on the degree B and its pitch is B $^{\frac{1}{p}}$. When there are no flats or sharps, we have the Key of C.

Here are the key signatures made with sharps.





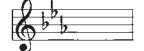

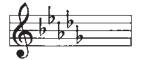
