

Materials needed: Artsheet 306, crayons, colored construction paper

Purpose: Learn to color by number, follow instructions, and color neatly in small spaces. Observe the effect that comes by placing two shades of color side by side, creating the appearance of shading and shadows.

Instructions: Sharpen your crayons a bit if they are too blunt. Work carefully in the small areas. Color guide: 1-yellow, 2-orange, 3-red, 4-light blue, 5-dark blue, 6-dark green, 7-light purple, 8-medium green, 9-brown, 10-black, 11-light green.

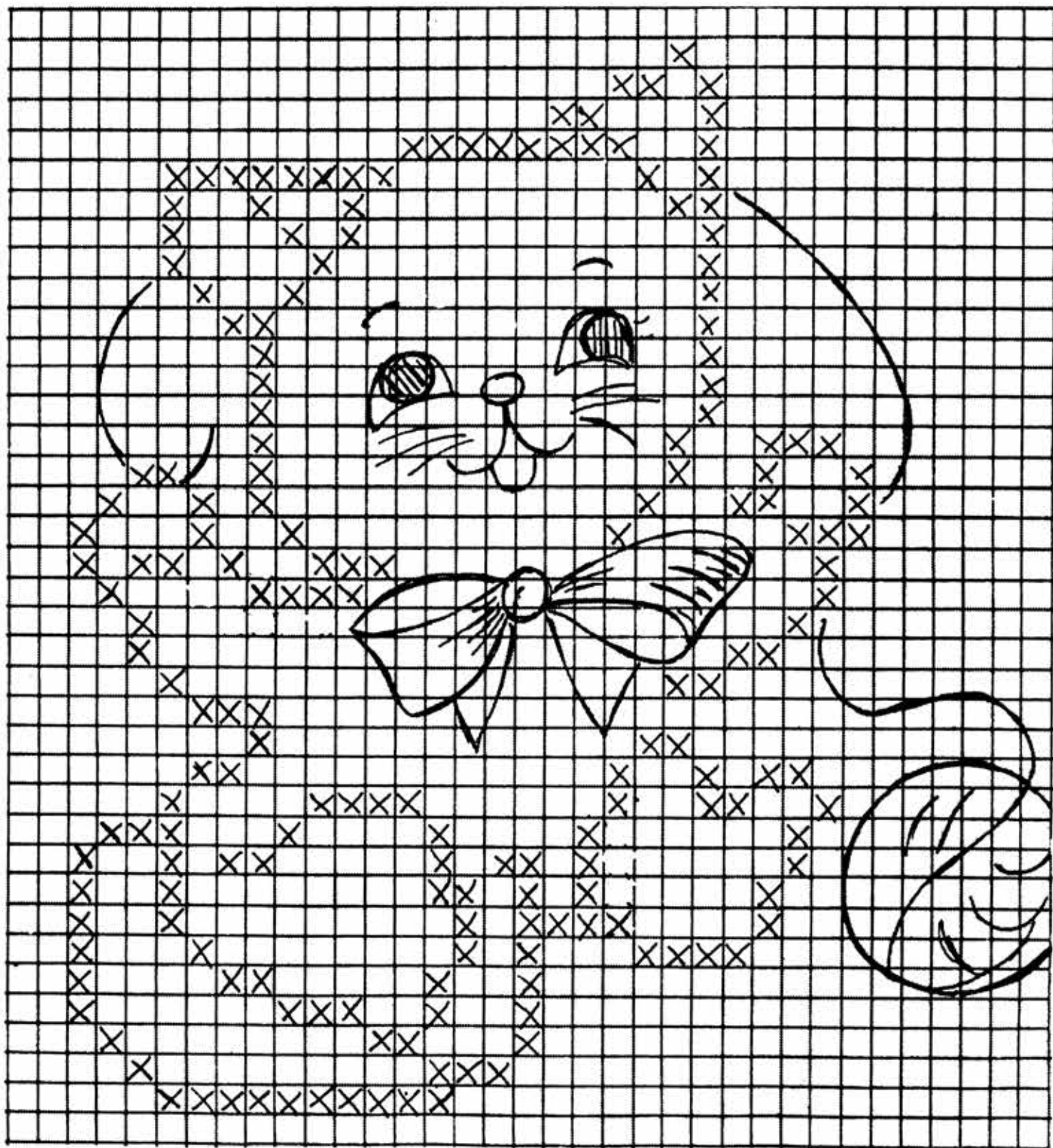
When you are finished, glue your colored sheet carefully onto a full-colored sheet of construction paper.



Materials needed: Artsheet 31, 1/8" graph paper, pencil, crayons

Purpose: Review grid work and learn the new technique of making a larger picture, smaller.

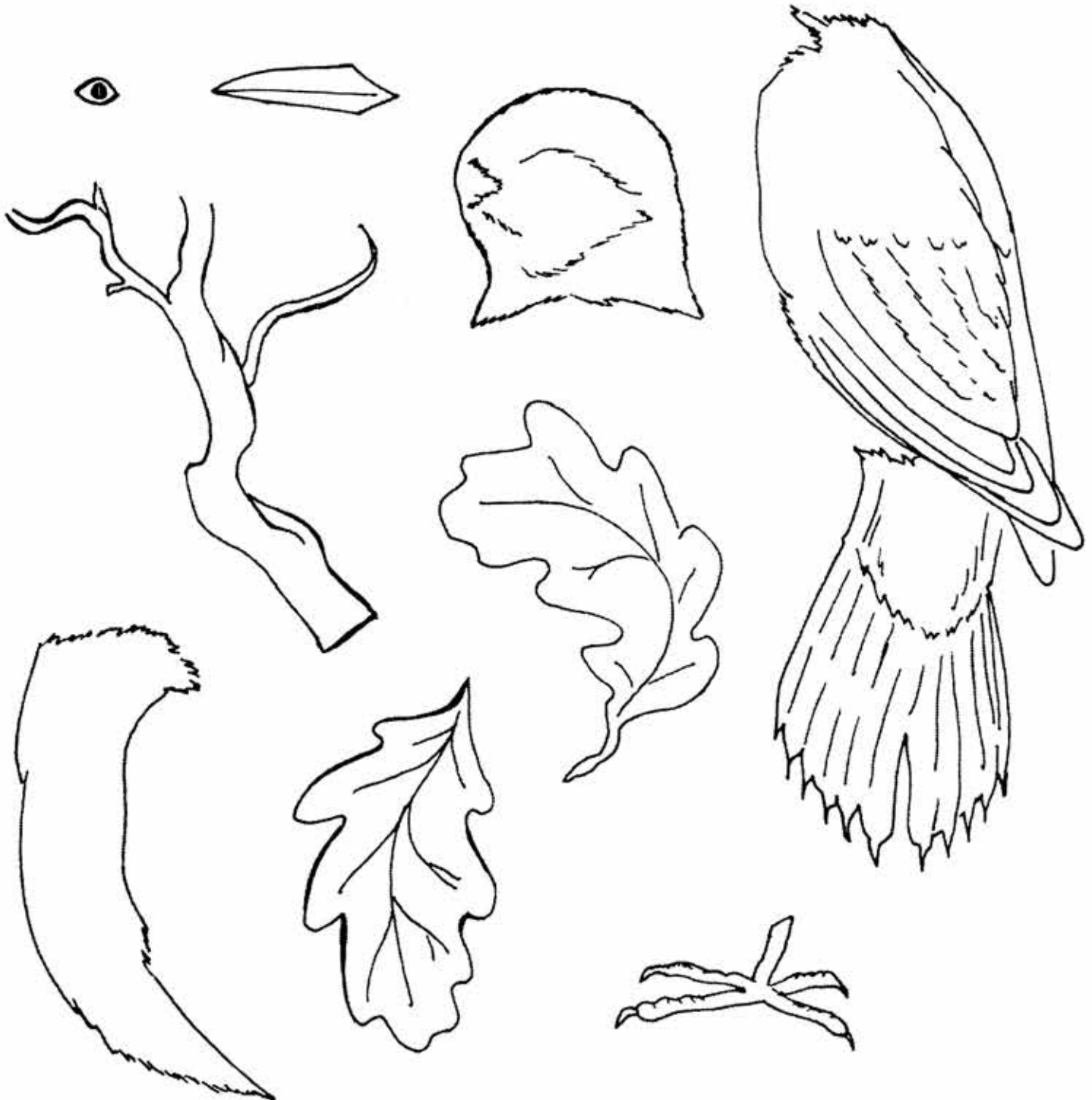
Instructions: Label the vertical and horizontal axes (numbers and letters at the side and top of the page) on both artsheet and the graph paper. Proceed to make the picture doing all the x's lightly. Draw in the facial features, the yarn ball and the bow. Now color the picture. The whole kitten should be a light brown. Color the eyes green, the bow and tongue red, the yarn ball, yellow, and the inner ear pink over the light brown. Now using a darker brown, shade the upper and left side of the head, paws, top of the ear, and the left side of the tail. Purr-fectly cute, isn't it?



**Materials Needed:** Artsheet 319 & 320, sky blue construction paper, crayons, scissors, glue

**Purpose:** Review shading techniques, cutting, pasting, and project assembly.

**Instructions:** Use the example on Artsheet 320 for shading the pattern pieces. Shade the head carefully using a red crayon. Leave the breast white. Shade the back and tail, black. Color the beak and feet orange. Shade the tree trunk and branch with brown. Shade the leaves with green. Now, cut out the colored pieces and the eye. Try to keep the jagged edges on the head and breast. It helps the picture look more realistic. Assemble the woodpecker on the blue construction paper using the finished picture on artsheet 320 as a guide. Glue the pieces into place.



Materials needed: Artsheet 330, a jar lid, scrap paper, artist's paint brush, brown, blue, black, yellow and red watercolor paint

Purpose: Learn to use the watercolor wash method.

Instructions: Begin with a drop of brown paint on the jar lid. Add a bit of water with your brush until you get a transparent brown wash. Test on your scrap paper. We will use this for the boy's face and fingers. We want it to look like skin - not a shapeless brown lump. Now paint the face all over except for the white of the eye. Add another drop of brown to make a darker wash. Paint the rabbit, except for the tail. Now with a touch of black stirred into the brown, outline the rabbit, paint in the fur lines, etc. Paint the eye and outline the tail. Paint the dark part of the boy's eye, his eyelashes and his eyebrows with this darker paint. Let the white of the eye, white. Now with just a touch of red very, very thin go over the boy's lower lip. Wash the lid. It's good to keep a bucket of clean water handy for this. Drop a drop of blue into the lid. Add water until the paint is a transparent blue. (Test on your scrap paper.) Wash the shirt carefully. Now use a fresh drop of blue. Outline the shirt and fill in the checks. Finally with a thinned out drop of yellow, wash the table top.
