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Introduction to Speedy Spanish I

Are you wondering why learning Spanish is important? Foreign language study can be challenging, but it can also help with understanding English grammar. Other important aspects of studying a foreign language are to equip people for missionary service and to understand the culture of another part of God's world.

Chinese is the first language of over 1.2 billion people. English is the first language of over 360 million people. Spanish is the first language of over

483 million people. More people speak Spanish than any other Romance language.

Speedy Spanish I is designed to teach Spanish in a fast, enjoyable way. Read Appendix A before beginning to teach this course. It will help familiarize you with the correct pronunciations of the Spanish alphabet, the explanations of the Spanish rules, accents, vowels, masculine and feminine forms, and more. This information will make teaching this course easier.

Components of Speedy Spanish I

The components of this course are two student workbooks, a vocabulary word card packet, audio files, and this Teacher's Guide. Each student workbook contains three units. Book A contains Units 1-3 and the corresponding tests. Book B contains

Units 4-6 and tests. The Teacher's Guide contains reproductions of the workbook pages and the tests with answers, but it is more than an answer key. It contains lesson plans with helpful information and ideas for successfully teaching this course.

How to Use This Course

Just as you first learned to speak English and then studied grammar, so *Speedy Spanish I* is geared to teach speaking first. Then later Spanish can be taken as a high school course where you can learn grammar. This course is intended to be self-teaching and self-correcting when used with the audios.

This course contains thirty lessons and six reviews; each unit has five lessons and a review. There are also six tests, which are required if this course is taken as an elective. The tests are optional if this course is used as a self-help or if the teacher chooses not to administer the tests to younger students.

A list of common Spanish names can be found in Appendix C. Give each student a Spanish name to use in class. If their name is not listed, not easily translated, or not found elsewhere, a middle name, parent's name, or grandparent's name can be assigned instead.

The lessons are intended to be done over one week's time. Each lesson is divided into five parts, and each lesson introduces approximately twelve new words. Students need to be able to spell each Spanish word, including accent marks and tildes, before continuing to the next lesson. Each lesson has the words in English and space for students to write them. If students need more practice, give them an oral test of the words for that week. Another option is to have your students read the sentences in the Practice section to you or another student.

The instructions for each day may be followed each week, or the five-day plan can be split in half and used on a twice-a-week basis. The extra activities given are for Grades 8-12, but the teacher may pick and choose according to the students' needs and abilities.

Introduction to Speedy Spanish I

Monday

Vocabulary—Look at the words, listen to the words on the CD, say the words with the CD. Study each vocabulary until you know the words well. With these vocabulary words, you will learn to speak Spanish. Older students may want to learn to spell the Spanish vocabulary words and may be given a spelling test.

Tuesday

Practice—Read the practice sentences in English, listen to them on the CD. Read the sentences in Spanish with the CD. Notice the sentence structure: the order in which Spanish words are placed within a sentence. Read the sentences over and over until you can read smoothly.

Wednesday

Match—This section will help you put into practice what you have learned. Read the instructions and draw lines or write the correct letter in the blank. When the work is completed, listen to the CD and correct your work. Repeat the words and sentences along with the CD. This will give you added practice in pronunciation.

The Word Bank is a place to keep your vocabulary cards. Turn to the back of your book and find the vocabulary cards for the lesson you are working on. Before you do anything to them, read the directions just before the vocabulary card section in the back of your book. Follow the directions carefully and then place the vocabulary cards in your Word Bank after you have studied them. When you complete five lessons put a rubber band around the cards for the five lessons. In this way you can keep the vocabularies grouped together, ready for the review.

Thursday

Memorize—In this section you will learn Bible verses and songs in Spanish. Listen to the verse and

song on CD. Turn the CD back and repeat the verse and sing the song with the tape. Repeat this process until you know the verse and song well. Bible word match is made up of words from the verses and songs. These exercises will help you add some new words to your vocabulary and review some words you have already learned.

Friday

Review—Use the Quiz to test your memory by matching English words with Spanish words or Spanish words with English words. Use your vocabulary cards to play this game. Race with other students or use a timer to try to beat your previous time in doing the quiz. Use the CD to correct your work. The more often you play this game the better you will learn the vocabulary words.

After you have completed five lessons, there will be a review which will help you determine how much you have learned. Carefully study vocabulary cards from all five previous lessons and then follow the directions to complete the review. A CD is available of only the songs from Speedy Spanish Books A and B.

Extra activities: Do research on Spanish-speaking countries. Write reports on the customs, home, food, jobs, and clothing of the Spanish people. Draw maps of Latin countries. These activities will broaden your knowledge of another culture. Obtain a Spanish Bible and spend time reading it. This will increase your Bible vocabulary, which is different from your everyday vocabulary.

May your study help you realize God loves and cares for *all* people.


Appendixes in the Teacher's Guide

Grammar Notes

There are two verbs for "is" in Spanish. One is *estar* and tells how you feel or where you are. Spanish conjugates verbs, or changes the end, depending who the subject is. As you read today, you might see *estoy*, *estás*, *está*, *estamos*, or *están*. These are the different forms or conjugations of the verb "to be."

The next "is" verb is ser. This one is used to say who you are, where you were born, what your occupation is, and things of a more permanent nature. Its conjugations in the present are soy, eres, es, somos, and son.

Qúe with an accent, as used in this lesson, is translated as "what." Without an accent it can be "that" or "which/who." Look at the sentence it's used in and its translation to determine which way to use the unaccented que.

The students should answer: **Buenos días, Maestro or Maestra**, depending on whether the teacher is male or female.

Point out the ¿? and the ¡! at the beginning and ending of questions and exclamations. Notice the difference: ¿Cómo? interrogative; ¡Cómo! exclamatory; Cómo, declarative. The same is true of qúe and dónde.

Introduce

Introduce the A, B, and C sounds. Read the explanation of the sound for those letters on pages 157, 158 in Appendix A. Read over the text in Lesson 1, pick out each of the three sounds, and read those words out loud. Make a list of three or four Spanish words that use these new sounds. Keep this list in a separate spot in your notebook and add each letter until you have the whole alphabet. Several letters will be studied and reviewed in each lesson.

Begin your audio at Practice 1 and repeat the sentences. Replay the soundtrack until you can say the sentences easily.


