

Use apostrophes to form possessive nouns.

Singular	Singular Possessive	Plural	Plural Possessive
brother	brother's	brothers	brothers'

Most possessive nouns add an apostrophe followed by an s to indicate possession.

David's harp ship's mast clock's pendulum

geese's honks sheep's wool children's books

Plural nouns that end in *s* usually just add an apostrophe at the end of the word.

knives' handles rabbits' hutches mailboxes' doors

Some archaic names that end in s show possession by adding an apostrophe at the end of the word.
