Fractional Exponents

Normally roots are expressed using radical signs. However, roots can be expressed using fractional notation. To write a radical using a fractional exponent, write the power of the radicand as the numerator and the index in the radical as the denominator. The two terms below, one expressed using the radical sign and the other using a fractional exponent, are equal.

$$\sqrt[b]{x^a} = x^{\frac{a}{b}}$$

Example 1 Change radical to fractional notation: $\sqrt[3]{x^2}$.

 $\sqrt[3]{x^2}$ Original problem.

 $\sqrt[3]{x^2} = x^{\frac{2}{?}}$ Exponent is numerator.

 $\sqrt[3]{x^2} = x^{\frac{2}{3}}$ Index is denominator.

Sometimes a fractional exponent can be reduced, and sometimes after being reduced, they can be simplified.

Math in History

On his first cruise as a midshipman aboard the frigate Brandywine, Matthew Maury attended school when he wasn't working. The navy's navigation textbook frustrated him—it was vaque, incomplete, and didn't agree with other sources. Maury saw the need for a better system to prevent shipwrecks.

Example 2 Change radical to fractional notation: $\sqrt{8^4}$.

 $\sqrt{8^4}$ Original problem.

 $\sqrt{8^4} = 8^{\frac{4}{?}}$ Exponent is numerator.

 $8^{\frac{4}{2}} = 8^2 = 64$ Index is denominator.

When there are two or more variables, each variable is converted to fractional notation.

$$\sqrt[5]{x^3y^2} = x^{\frac{3}{5}}y^{\frac{2}{5}}$$
 $\sqrt{xy} = x^{\frac{1}{2}}y^{\frac{1}{2}}$ or $(xy)^{\frac{1}{2}}$

The concept of fractional exponents works both ways. Terms with fractional exponents can be expressed with radical signs.

$$x^{\frac{2}{3}} = \sqrt[3]{x^2}$$

$$x^{\frac{2}{3}} = \sqrt[3]{x^2}$$
 $8^{\frac{1}{3}} = \sqrt[3]{8} = 2$

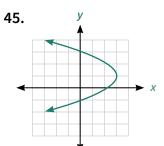
