# The Birth of the Church

### **Key Concepts**

The Christian church was birthed at a time in history when certain world conditions supported its rapid spread.

Jesus' Gospel introduced new teachings that the disciples struggled to understand.

### Terms

**church** – (Greek *ekklesia*): A called-out assembly.

**martyr** – A witness to the truth. Christian witnesses to the truth of the Gospel of Jesus Christ were sometimes executed; hence the word *martyr* has come to mean one who dies for his beliefs.

**Hellenistic** – Thinking, speaking, and living like a Greek.

**Messiah** – Deliverer; the Hebrew word for "anointed one."

**Christ** – The Greek word for "anointed one" and for the Hebrew *Messiah*.

Pax Romana – Two-hundred-year period of peace under the rule of Rome (27 B.C. to A.D. 180).

**Judaizers** – Jewish believers who accepted Jesus' teachings but insisted that Christians from both Jewish and Gentile backgrounds must keep the Jewish ceremonial laws.



### Instead of reading the Foreword and Chapter 1, read these summaries.

### Summary of Foreword (pages v-vii)

The Greek word *ekklesia*, meaning "called-out assembly," had been used in the Greek translation of the Old Testament to refer to the assembly of God's people Israel. Abraham and his family were "called out" from among pagan peoples to live and worship according to God's direction. The Israelites were "called out" from bondage in Egypt to live in Israel. Although His people always live "in the world," they are "called out" from it to live according to His direction rather than following the ways of the surrounding world.

The Christian church (*ekklesia*) dates from Pentecost in A.D. 30, when the Holy Spirit descended on Jesus' disciples and others who believed the Gospel. Christians have been called out by Jesus from spiritual darkness into the light of the Gospel (1 Peter 2:9).

True Christians are those who have an active relationship with and serve Jesus Christ as their Lord (Matthew 7:23). Someone who claims to be a Christian but lacks a living relationship with Jesus is a nominal Christian (Christian in name only).

#### Lesson 1

Just as there are true Christians and nominal Christians, so there are true Christian churches and nominal Christian churches. Some large institutional churches have distorted the Gospel while others have worked hard to maintain it. Church history includes the story of all these churches.

### Summary of Chapter 1: "The Fullness of Time" (pages 1-14)

Jesus came to the world in "the fullness of time" (Galatians 4:4), meaning that the time was ripe for His coming. A number of world events made it easier for the Gospel to spread and capture the attention of men's hearts in the years immediately following Jesus' death and resurrection.

- 1. Several centuries before Christ, the Greeks (under Alexander the Great) took control of much of the western world and spread their culture and language, making Greek a very widely spoken language. Greek thinkers began questioning the validity of the old gods and were open to considering new ideas.
- 2. The Septuagint, a translation of the Hebrew Old Testament into Greek, made the Jewish Scriptures accessible to Greek speaking Jews across the Roman Empire. These Scriptures prophesied the coming of the anointed one—the Messiah. *Christ* is the Greek word for "anointed one."
- 3. When Jesus was born, the Roman Empire controlled Europe, northern Africa, and the Middle East. A network of Roman roads and two centuries of peaceful Roman rule known as the *Pax Romana* supported the spread of the Gospel across the empire.
- 4. The seafaring Phoenicians had developed navigation and sailing skills that led to a system of trade all around the Mediterranean Sea. Commerce by sea also helped make possible the spread of new ideas.
- 5. Besides the Jews living in Israel, Jewish people lived in many cities across the Roman Empire. They resented Roman rule and looked for their promised Messiah to come and deliver them. In the early days of the church, Jewish Christians spread the Gospel rapidly among Jews.

### **Key Concepts**

The twelve apostles based their doctrines on the teachings of Jesus Christ, the Old Testament Scriptures, and the inspiration of the Holy Spirit.

The New Testament is a collection of 27 books and letters that tell about Jesus and the birth of the church and explain how Christians live by faith in Christ. Most, but not all, were written by apostles.

#### **Terms**

**doctrine** – A truth or principle that is taught, such as the Christian teaching that Jesus is the Son of God who lived as a man, was crucified, and rose from the dead. The noun *teaching* is a synonym.

**sabbath** – A day of rest. Traditionally kept by Jews on the seventh (last) day of the week.

**Lord's Day** – The first day of the week, the day Jesus rose from the dead, observed by Christians as a day of rest, worship, and honoring Jesus as Lord.

**testament** – A covenant or agreement between two parties.

**circular letter** – A letter intended to be passed from one party to the next so they can all benefit from its contents.

**Sunday** – The Roman name for the first day of the week.
