Key Concepts

John Wycliffe, an influential priest in England, is remembered as the "Morning Star of the Reformation."

He and his followers produced the first edition of the Bible in English and emphasized Christian discipleship and obedience.

His followers, the Lollards, carried his teachings across England, eventually facing intense persecution.

Terms

living – A benefice: the office a priest held over his parish, for which he received pay and housing. Priests often held more than one living (benefice), receiving its income and living elsewhere while paying lesser clerics to carry out the duties of the parish.

Lollards – Supporters and followers of John Wycliffe. Some were more political, following him because of his anti-papal views; others followed him because of his emphasis on the Scriptures.

Morning Star of the Reformation – John Wycliffe, whose work in the late 1300s foreshadowed the Reformation movement that developed over the next century.
