Martin Luther's Ninety-Five Theses

Key Concepts

Martin Luther was a priest, Augustinian monk, and university teacher who struggled to find peace with God through self-denial and good works.

Eventually he realized that salvation depends upon faith rather than works.

On October 31, 1517, he posted ninety-five doctrinal theses on the church door in Wittenberg for public debate. This act is considered the beginning of the Magisterial Reformation.

Term

St. Anne – According to Catholic tradition, she was the mother of the Virgin Mary, and thus the grandmother of Jesus.

Ninety-Five Theses – A list of theological statements Martin Luther posted for public debate on the church door at Wittenburg. Many of them addressed the practice of granting indulgences.

Key Concepts

Martin Luther defended himself against charges of heresy before the Diet of Worms by claiming that his beliefs stood solely on the testimony of Scripture.

With the support of German princes, Luther wrote, translated the New Testament into German, and began a new church.

He concluded, however, that all churches need state support.

He opposed nonconformists and urged rulers to quell peasant uprisings.

Terms

Diet of Worms – A diet is an official gathering of German nobles; this one was held at the city of Worms to consider charges of heresy against Martin Luther.

Augsburg Confession – Published in 1530, this document outlined Lutheran beliefs and condemned some Catholic and Anabaptist teachings.

Liturgy – Set of prescribed formal prayers, readings, and responses used during liturgical worship services.
