"The only way we can fly is in an airplane," Mama said as she helped Brenda sit on a chair. "Our bodies weren't made to fly."

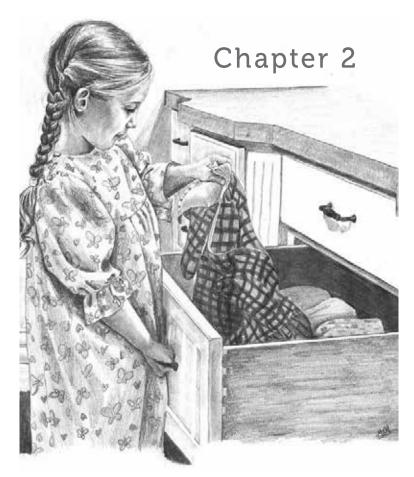
"Then how can birds fly?" Brenda asked.

"Yes," Mama said with a twinkle in her eye. "Flying is for the birds."



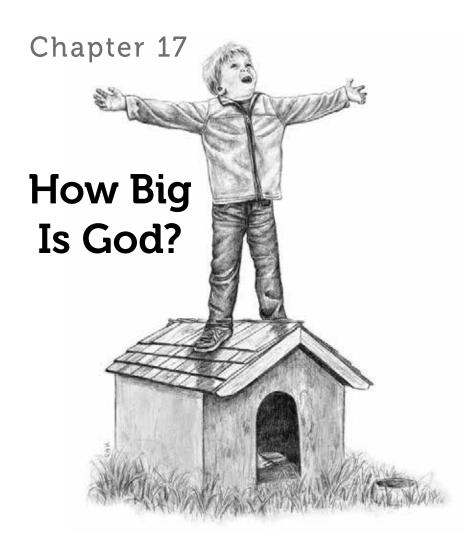
Question-Box Beth
