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


Using a Cluster to Brainstorm for Writing


Using a Cluster to Brainstorm for Writing

Clusters, also called mind maps, can be used to brainstorm for writing.

To use a cluster as a prewriting tool, write the main topic in the center of a piece of paper. Then circle it. Around the circle, write the first several related ideas that come to your mind. It is important to write quickly, without stopping to think. Then circle them and draw lines from each related idea to the main idea.



Continue the process even further.



Each set of circles could be an entire paper, if the writer wishes to expand the ideas. For instance, he could write about the importance of having all your documents when traveling. He could just as well write about three famous cities to visit. Clusters help writers brainstorm for compositions.

Write a cluster. Show it to your teacher. Then save it for later. Use this list of topics to help you get started. Remember to move quickly; do not pause for long to think.
