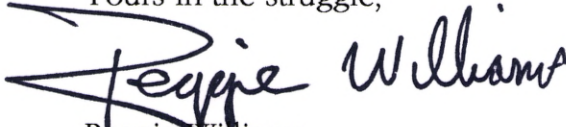

Re: Health Concerns from African American Health Providers
for utilization of \$25.9 Millions

Supervisors Ward and Kennedy recently convened a meeting with various African American professionals and providers to determine their responses on the utilization of a proposed \$25.9 millions enumerated in SB 855. The purpose of the meeting was to assure that the Supervisors provided an opportunity for African American health interests and needs to be listed and for an agenda about such concerns to be developed.

Present at the meeting was: Ahimsa Sunchai, MD, Ronald Colthirst, Melvin Miles, Garth Collins, MPH, Larry Saxxon, Hon. Naomi Gray, Janet Nasser, Tim Offutt, Flo Stroud, RN MPH, Jimmy Loyce, PhD, WJ Brandy Moore, MPA, Gerald Lenoir.

Additional Invitees: Pat Norman, Shirley Gross, Pat Evans, MD, Robert Christmas, PhD, Joh Nickens, Reggie Williams, Cynthia Selmar, Abner Bolles, PhD, Bert Campbell, Martha Henderson, MSW. Copies of the meeting report will be mailed to all invitees.

After introductions from Supervisors Ward and Kennedy the group was asked to consider the impact of \$25.9 millions and what it could mean to issues related to health care and services. An initial question for the group was, "What do we need for African American health? The query was posed from the viewpoint of what currently exists and what might the attendees like to see?

The responses were taken round-robin and are listed here without respect to priority or importance of single issues.

Discussion Issues

--The respondents agreed that there should be a commitment to continued funds....a mechanism that would reserve funds over time.

--There is a need for residential care (after care) for men, for women with children, and for youth.

--There is a need for a resource center which could facilitate the

identification of programmatic linkages between prevention, healthcare and services.

The concept of linkages for primary care came up more than once. The respondents discussed the need for targeted care centers for African Americans; for managed care programs like at SFGH, and for the community centers model for health care.

There needs to be a program and information dissemination on the African American view of health care and services.

Funds should be committed to provide media coverage, language which describes and defines health care and services in relation to the needs of African Americans.

--The establishment of an ambulatory care task force with support and mandate to provide a comprehensive for African American health needs and define existing and "wishlist" access to health care and services.

--It is time to consider "violence" among, against and within the African American population as a response or element of health. Funds should be provided to develop a program and ideas.

--The group called for health screening through mobile units; includes HIV testing and counseling.

Targeted Funds

--Provide funds for children's mental health. Example: The Family Mosaic Project.

--Provide funds for sickle cell anemia research and education. Also, funds for infant mortality.

--Provide funds for foster care kids in San Francisco.

--Provide funds for treatment, research, health care and services of those with diabetes, hypertension, substance abuse, cancer, cigarette smoking etc.

--Funds to strengthen current programs...

Consider the year 2000, set and achieve goals for African American health. (primary care). Expand programs accordingly.

--Provide funds for STD (sexually transmitted diseases) among African Americans.

--Provide funds for education interventions for in-school/out-of-school students. Use on site programs, information to educate about health care and services; but to illustrate the value of preventive care.

--Provide funds for elderly African Americans as survivors, caregivers and family. Develop an African American skilled nursing facility? Provide mechanisms to assure senior independence.

--Provide funds to challenge racism as an health issue. Develop cultural competence training for services to African American clientele.

Connect a resource center to such efforts as the OMI Wellness Center. Expand.

--Empower the "helping hands" in the African American population to do more, better....for all of us. Example: Barbers, beauticians, bartenders, missionaries

Summary:

The Task Force held a second meeting to add priorities to issues raised during the meeting of 20 August 1991. An extensive list ranging from adolescent health care, HIV disease, mental health services, to African American women's health programs was developed by attendees. (See attached Minutes.)

The objective of the meeting (3 September) was to provide several items of critical need with an approximate cost of each; to Supervisors Ward and Kennedy. The items are to be of broad range in numbers of African Americans to be served and concentrated upon a general health perspective.

CAUTION: The federal government has not allocated these \$25.9 Millions. Estimates suggest that until this is accomplished, expectations of funds to the state should not begin before January 1992.

Secondarily, the Task Force recommended that existing or proposed services for HIV/AIDS should be monitored for their impacts and services to African Americans. Example: SF AIDS Foundation is listed in the Achtenberg legislation for providing early intervention and education to people of color. ***The Task Force overwhelmingly agreed that some mechanism be developed to assure that such programs have an audit clause and a community based review procedure.***

Thirdly, the Task Force considered that these funds may be a (1 time only) opportunity and proposed programs should provide services integration or 3rd party reimbursements with services. Example: The OMI Wellness Center might be expanded to serve a broader base or clientele in various other sites around the city. Or...the Westside Community Mental Health Center might be urged to develop a preventive health care training for providers working with African American youth at Youth Guidance Center.

Three major issues were important to the discussion on 3 September. The group achieved consensus on the following concepts:

1. Residential care facilities (multifaceted with linkages to various African American health needs like substance abuse services, mental health and HIV disease.)

- A. Develop a case management network throughout San Francisco to assure broad health care and services for African Americans.
 - B. Develop a successful demonstration model which assures funding, compliance with Afr. American needs, and engenders respect; enough that clients utilize the model.
 - C. Assure that a community based activity occurs which is considerate of African American needs.
2. Prevention components through a resource/wellness center. OMI Wellness Center is one such program. Expanding its concept to other SF areas (Sunnydale, Tenderloin, BVHP etc.) would serve the African American population better.
3. Develop a program(s) with training to address the impacts of racism upon the health of African Americans. Example: Violence, abusive behaviors and other responses.
- A. Create a mechanism for coordinating various programs so that every assurance is given for monitoring current and future needs.
 - ** Must be ethnic/racial specific for African Americans.
 - B. Coordinate and Monitor programs through agencies like Westside Community Mental Health Center, Bayview Hunters Point Foundation, Black Health Professional Organizations, and the Family Mosaic Project.

All programs need linkages to all other health care and services in the African American population. A fundable method for assuring these linkages is critical to the success of health care services targeted to African Americans.

Additionally, there are other state and federal funds pools from which to manage many of the ideas presented here. It is necessary to recall that programs are currently attempting to service African Americans; but often must suffer budget cuts and reductions. The Task Force urges that funds be provided to assist these programs now and in the future.
