It represents a unique opportunity to re-emphasize our public message about HIV disease: learn your HIV antibody status by being tested; if you are positive, enter into personal and professional relationships which maximally support the development of a long term plan for living with HIV; and regardless of the results of your antibody test, learn to live safe from any unnecessary exposure(s) to viruses and infections.

## CASE MANAGEMENT

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ase management is a process for helping clients learn to live with HIV by ensuring that they have a comprehensive plan for coping with their disease. Case managers are professional service workers who make sure clients know about the many different services available and how to make those services work for them.

For example, if a client does not have a doctor, the case manager can help him or her find the right doctor, one who understands HIV infection.

If a client is unemployed, the case manager can help the client obtain financial support and even housing. The same is true for other services: substance abuse treatment, mental health services, advice on legal problems or benefits counseling. The case manager can help direct people to the services they need.

Any resident of San Francisco who is HIV positive and requests services is an eligible client at the Center for Positive Care.

The Center has case managers affiliated with many different community based agencies each of which has special expertise in working with diverse communities including people of color, women, youth and those with substance abuse problems.

## OUTREACH



California Prostitutes Education Project, known as CAL-PEP, has provided services for male and female prostitutes and women at risk since 1985. Our client population consists mostly of women of color with an emphasis on services to women of child bearing age (from 16–42).

The Center for Positive Care is a natural extension of CAL-PEP's street-based services. The Center will provide a base facility where CAL-PEP outreach workers can bring clients to access additional social services, as well as early intervention. CAL-PEP will utilize its experience in operating mobile based counseling services to clients. Van transportation service will be provided to all center clients on weekdays during regular business hours.

Since the inception of CAL-PEP, we have provided HIV/AIDS, and safe drug use education to women and men throughout the San Francisco Bay Area consisting of condom and bleach distribution, and coordinated referrals for drug and alcohol treatment, social services, and shelter information. CAL-PEP believes in

the motto of “each one, teach one”, and has employed the model of peer education to become most successful in its outreach efforts. Educating people of color has become tantamount in the prevention of HIV, and CAL-PEP remains on the forefront of the epidemic on all levels.

## EDUCATION PREVENTION

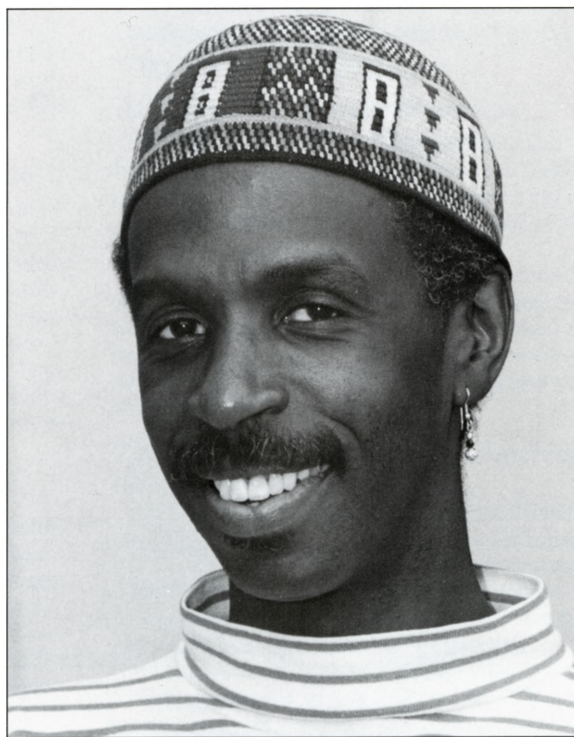
Education remains our only real weapon against HIV and AIDS. AIDS is found everywhere—our prison system, mothers, injection drug users, teenagers, new-borns—in all ethnic and socio-economic groups across the country. Soon, *everyone* will know someone with HIV. Prevention and risk reduction education means the promotion of condom usage as the safest means, other than abstinence, of preventing the spread of HIV and other STDs skyrocketing in our communities. We must communicate *how* HIV is transmitted in culturally sensitive and appropriate ways.

People may ask, "With so many other crises—crime, drugs, poverty, economics—why single out AIDS?" Well, AIDS is the *one* crisis we can do something about! And in stopping the spread of HIV, we will impact all those other areas as well.

The benefits of HIV education do not need to stop there. A realistic discussion of the diversity of sexuality would stress the importance of sexual responsibility and personal consideration, regardless of sexual orientation. Once stereotypes of sexuality are torn down, we will be able to work together toward the goals

of freedom, health and equality of opportunity for everyone. "You cannot support civil rights for one group and not another—none of us can be free as long as any of us are oppressed."

Education is a right for everyone. Condoms and clean needles will drastically reduce one's chances of transmitting or receiving the AIDS

## THE AGENCIES

**T**he Center for Positive Care is a new concept in client care, bringing together 17 different social service agencies, working together in the fight against AIDS.

### **AIDS Benefits Counselors**

AIDS Benefits Counselors educate and assist people with HIV or AIDS to: plan for any eventual disability; acquire and use employer sponsored benefits; and utilize public benefits including social security, state disability insurance and others.

*Center for Positive Care* services will assist HIV+ people to understand the available benefits should they become disabled, and help them plan for gaps in benefits that can be filled prior to disability.

### **AIDS Health Project, University of California, San Francisco**

The AIDS Health Project is an AIDS prevention, education and mental health program currently serving more than 15,000 people at risk for AIDS, those with HIV infection and their health care providers.

The AIDS Health Project provides direct client services in the community and at San Francisco General Hospital that include individual counseling, support groups, HIV antibody testing and counseling and Living with HIV public forums. It also produces a wide range of HIV-related publications and newsletters and provides education for health professionals and caregivers.

At the *Center for Positive Care*, the AIDS Health Project acts as the fiscal agent for the Center and coordinates centralized case management and site administration in collaboration with the National Task Force on AIDS Prevention and the California Prostitutes Education Project. In addition, the AHP will provide training to provider agencies on early intervention, help link clients from ATS sites to early intervention services, and provide a special Women's Advocacy Program for HIV+ women to access early intervention services.

### **AIDS Indigent Direct Services**

The AIDS Indigent Direct Services mission is to empower indigent, HIV infected clients living in the Tenderloin to improve the quality of their lives by providing a broad continuum of services which are appropriate, sensitive and accessible. A.I.D.S. advocates for the creation and funding of services for the indigent.

At the *Center for Positive Care*, A.I.D.S. will provide health education, clinical trials advocacy and linkage to early care services for HIV infected residents of the Tenderloin. Services will include: one-on-one and group health education counseling, development of health maintenance plans, clinical trials workshops and referral, early care treatment planning and physical assessments.

### **AIDS Treatment News**

AIDS Treatment News is a semi-monthly publication which reports on treatments for AIDS and public policy issues around AIDS.

At the *Center for Positive Care*, AIDS Treatment News is acting as the consultant for the Center's library.

### **American Indian AIDS Institute**

The American Indian AIDS Institute (AIAI) provides education and prevention information and referral and helps provide humane support for those with HIV. Direct services include case management and practical support.

At the *Center for Positive Care*, the Institute will provide information on treatment options, traditional healing, and clinical trials. The AIAI is committed to client advocacy, provides counseling services, financial benefits counseling and risk reduction workshops.

### **California Prostitutes Education Project (CAL-PEP)**

The California Prostitutes Education Project is an AIDS education and prevention organization reaching people who are most susceptible to HIV infection. Street outreach is conducted via a mobile outreach unit in San Francisco, Marin and Alameda counties. Pregnancy screenings are done weekly in a mobile van in East and West Oakland.

At the *Center for Positive Care*, CAL-PEP will provide support groups, case management and outreach to people of color.

### **Community United in Response to AIDS/SIDA (CURAS)**

Serving the Latino communities, CURAS provides social services as well as emotional and spiritual support to those affected by the AIDS virus and their families. CURAS provides training, outreach and counseling.

At the *Center for Positive Care*, CURAS will provide case management and linkage to early



medical care. CURAS will sponsor substance abuse services for the Latino/Latina community. Services will include individual counseling and support groups, treatment advocacy and education seminars.

### **Early Advocacy and Care for HIV (E.A.C.H.)**

The E.A.C.H. Program provides three levels of service at the *Center for Positive Care*. 1. Information and referral to community services and support groups. 2. Intake and assessment to determine eligibility for appropriate early intervention services by case management staff. 3. Case management to assist clients in accessing services and implementing treatment plans.

### **18 Street Services**

18th Street Services offers outpatient substance abuse counseling, information and referrals for gay and bisexual men of all ages and colors, including homeless youth. Outreach and substance abuse prevention efforts relative to HIV are an integral part of the program.

*Center for Positive Care* services will include: assessment, advocacy and referrals regarding substance use and abuse. Outreach will include women.

### **Filipino Task Force on AIDS (FTFA)**

The Filipino Task Force on AIDS offers educational workshops to the Filipino community including families, self-identified gay and bisexual men, lesbians, cross gender individuals, youth and women. Workshops provide basic information on AIDS/HIV risk reduction; HIV and substance use; updates on medical treatments and early intervention. FTFA provides psycho-social support services individually and in groups.

At the *Center for Positive Care*, the FTFA will provide early intervention services to Asian/Pacific Islanders who are HIV positive. Services include outreach, education, referral to available services, support groups, clinical trial advocacy and linkage to medical care.

### **Gay Asian Pacific Alliance Community HIV Project**

The Gay Asian Pacific Alliance offers support groups for HIV positive Asian/Pacific Island men and their partners, community workshops on early intervention, bilingual peer counseling and case management.

At the *Center for Positive Care*, G-CHP provides early intervention services to Asian/Pacific Island individuals who are HIV positive. Services include outreach (media and workshops) education, information and referral, support groups, clinical trials advocacy and linkage to early medical care.

### **Glide-Goodlet AIDS Project**

The Glide-Goodlet AIDS Project (GGAP) strives to meet the needs of all people, especially those who may feel rejected, outcast and alone. The GGAP offers counseling, support groups, HIV testing and referral—all within the context of acceptance, respect and compassion.

Through the *Center for Positive Care*, the GGAP will provide psychosocial counseling and support that is both culturally specific and open to all sexual orientations.

### **Haight Ashbury Free Clinic**

The Haight Ashbury Free Clinics have served the San Francisco community through the Haight Ashbury Free Medical Clinic and the Haight Ashbury Alcohol Treatment Services for many years.

At the *Center for Positive Care*, the Haight Ashbury Free Clinic will provide individual counseling to evaluate client needs relative to substance abuse services. Clients will be counseled, treatment plans will be developed, and they will be directed to substance abuse programs.

### **National Task Force on AIDS Prevention**

The National Task Force on AIDS Prevention fosters education and care programs in more than 30 U.S. cities and focuses on HIV prevention and early intervention programs that are designed by and for gay/bisexual men of color. The NTFAP strongly supports partnership building as the primary strategy for meeting the needs of diverse populations affected by the global HIV/AIDS epidemic.

At the *Center for Positive Care*, the National Task Force is part of the site administration team and works in support of all Center programs that serve gay and bisexual men of color.

### **Planned Parenthood—Perinatal HIV Reduction and Educational Demonstration Activity (PHREDA)**

The PHREDA Project provides community-based, comprehensive women's specific health care, family planning and HIV prevention services to women at high risk for HIV and unplanned pregnancies at 8 different clinics.

The Health Services Liaison provides individual and group education and counseling about gynecological health, family planning and other women specific HIV concerns. The PHREDA Project links clients with appropriate early intervention services. Gynecological education will be provided at the *Center for Positive Care*. Clients do not have to be enrolled in PHREDA to receive services. Services in Spanish are available.

### **Project AHEAD—Special Programs for Youth**

Project AHEAD is a central coordinating force in organizing services for HIV positive youth ages 12–23. Project AHEAD augments medical care, provides case management, outreach and support services at several location including San Francisco General Hospital.

At the *Center for Positive Care*, Project AHEAD offers case management services for HIV positive youth and sponsors meetings of BAY Positives, a peer support group for HIV positive young people.

### **San Francisco AIDS Foundation**

The San Francisco AIDS Foundation is a non-profit agency providing education, client services and public policy programs. The Foundation operates the AIDS Hotline, produces information materials and periodicals including B.E.T.A. (Bulletin of Experimental Treatment for AIDS) and Positive News.

B.E.T.A. and Positive News will be available at the Center. The Foundation will also conduct four public forums on early intervention care. One will be in Spanish.

## THE LIBRARY

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IV infection is a treatable disease, especially when treated early. There are many options for treatment today.
