ADVISORY EDITOR

Roger Daniels, who received his Ph.D. from the University of California, Los Angeles, is head of the Department of History at the University of Cincinnati. He has taught at the Universities of California and Wyoming and the State University of New York, Fredonia, where he was chairman of the History Department. Professor Daniels presently serves on the editorial boards of the *Pacific Historical Review* and *Amerasia Journal*. Daniels' numerous articles, papers and books reflect his interest and scholarship in the field of Asian American studies. Some of his recent major publications are *AMERICAN RACISM* (with Harry H. L. Kitano, 1970), *CONCENTRATION CAMPS, U.S.A.* (1972) and *THE DECISION TO RELOCATE THE JAPANESE AMERICANS* (1975).

EDITORIAL BOARD

Gordon Hirabayashi received his Ph.D. in sociology at the University of Washington and is Professor of Sociology at the University of Alberta, Canada. He has also taught at the University of Washington, and the American Universities in Beirut and Cairo. He is presently on the Board of Editors of the National Japanese Canadian quarterly, *Rikka*, and has recently served as Chair, Japanese Canadian Centennial Society. Dr. Hirabayashi was a principal in the Supreme Court case on curfew and evacuation challenges in 1943, *Hirabayashi v. United States*. His most recent publication is "The Hyphenated Canadian: A Case of Japanese Canadians," *MULTICULTURALISM AND THIRD WORLD IMMIGRANTS* (1977).

Harry H. L. Kitano is Professor of Sociology and Social Welfare at the University of California, Los Angeles, where he served on the Advisory Committee for the Japanese American Research Project from 1966-1976. Dr. Kitano has done extensive research in the fields of sociology and mental health and is the author of *ASIANS IN AMERICA: An Annotated Bibliography* (1971), *AMERICAN RACISM* (with Roger Daniels, 1970), *RACE RELATIONS* (1974), and *JAPANESE-AMERICANS: The Evolution of a Subculture* (1969). He has also been involved in educational film and T.V. productions including "Japanese Americans" (1976) and "Runaway Children" (1976).

H. Brett Melendy, who received his Ph.D. in history from Stanford University, is Professor of History at

the University of Hawaii at Manoa. Dr. Melendy has taught at San Jose State University and was Chairman of the Department of History there for ten years. He has served in many academic and civic posts and is currently chairperson of Hawaii State Committee for the Humanities. Dr. Melendy's most recent publications include *THE ORIENTAL AMERICANS* (1972) and *ASIANS IN AMERICA: Filipinos, Koreans and East Indians* (1977).

Howard Palmer is Director of the Research Center for Canadian Ethnic Studies at the University of Calgary, Canada, where he is Associate Professor of History. Dr. Palmer received his Ph.D. in history from York University, Canada. He is Co-Editor of the Ethnic Histories Series for the Canadian Department of the Secretary of State and Editor of *CANADIAN ETHNIC STUDIES*. He has written a number of articles and papers on ethnic studies and immigration and his most recent book is *IMMIGRATION AND THE RISE OF MULTICULTURALISM* (1975).

Betty Lee Sung is Associate Professor of Asian Studies at the City College of New York. Ms. Sung studied economics and sociology at the University of Illinois and received an M.L.S. from the City University of New York. She has worked in both education and publishing and is the author of many books on Chinese Americans, such as *MOUNTAIN OF GOLD* (1967), *CHINESE AMERICAN MANPOWER AND EMPLOYMENT* (1976), and most recently *ALBUM OF CHINESE AMERICANS* (1977). It has been traditional for historians and other students of ethnic groups in the United States and Canada to treat immigrants from Asia as if their experiences were entirely divorced from those of peoples who came from other parts of the world. This view has not only blurred the image of Asian Canadians and Americans but has also contributed to an increasingly significant distortion of the composite picture of North American ethnic groups, since the element from Asia or with an Asian heritage is almost always either completely ignored or vastly underrepresented. If it is still legitimate to speak of Asians and their descendants as if they constitute a coherent group, it is largely because they were and are so perceived and treated by most Americans, scholars and laypersons alike. Yet, such a classification imposes an arbitrary and artificial unity on peoples whose experience and culture were and are radically different. This Arno collection focuses on the two most numerous and long-standing Asian ethnic groups, the Chinese and Japanese immigrants and their descendants who have lived in both the United States and Canada since the middle of the last century.

Any serious examination of the experience of immigrants from Asia shows that most of the generalizations made about immigrants apply as well to Asians as to others. Most of the fewer than two million Asians who came to the United States and Canada arrived during the great agricultural and industrial expansion which occurred between the 1850s and the outbreak of World War I. Most of them did not have the capital to set up their own enterprises; few of them had the education to practice a learned profession or to enter one of the skilled trades, and even those few who possessed these attributes were largely stopped by either statute or custom. Most immigrants from Asia were thus proletarians—they had only their labor to sell. One aspect of the historical experience of immigrants

from Asia that is markedly different from that of other immigrants is their geographical locus. Unlike almost every other immigrant group, the Asians first settled in the western part of the continent so that the focus of both immigrant experience and anti-immigrant reaction was in California and British Columbia rather than in Massachusetts and Ontario.

The works included in this Arno collection illuminate various aspects of the experience of Asians and their descendants in both the United States and Canada. It is one of the major premises of the collection that, on either side of the 49th parallel, the experiences of Chinese and Japanese ethnic groups have been more similar than different despite distinct disparities in both ethos and statute. Both the U.S. and Canada inhibited and then essentially stopped immigration from Asia in the first quarter of the twentieth century; both nations inhibited the civic rights of Asians; both nations applied mass incarceration to ethnic Japanese during World War II; and both nations now regard Chinese and Japanese citizens and immigrants as valued elements in the melting pot or pieces in the mosaic, depending on the national metaphor in use.

The volumes included in the collection fall into three general categories: official government documents and reports, polemical writings of several sorts, including fiction, and works of scholarship.

Much of the material, including government documents and scholarship, reflects quite markedly the prejudices of the time in which it was written. The sensitive modern reader will find much within that offends. Yet, without large doses of that kind of material it is impossible even to begin to understand what the Asian experience in North America has been, and it is to that end that this collection has been compiled.

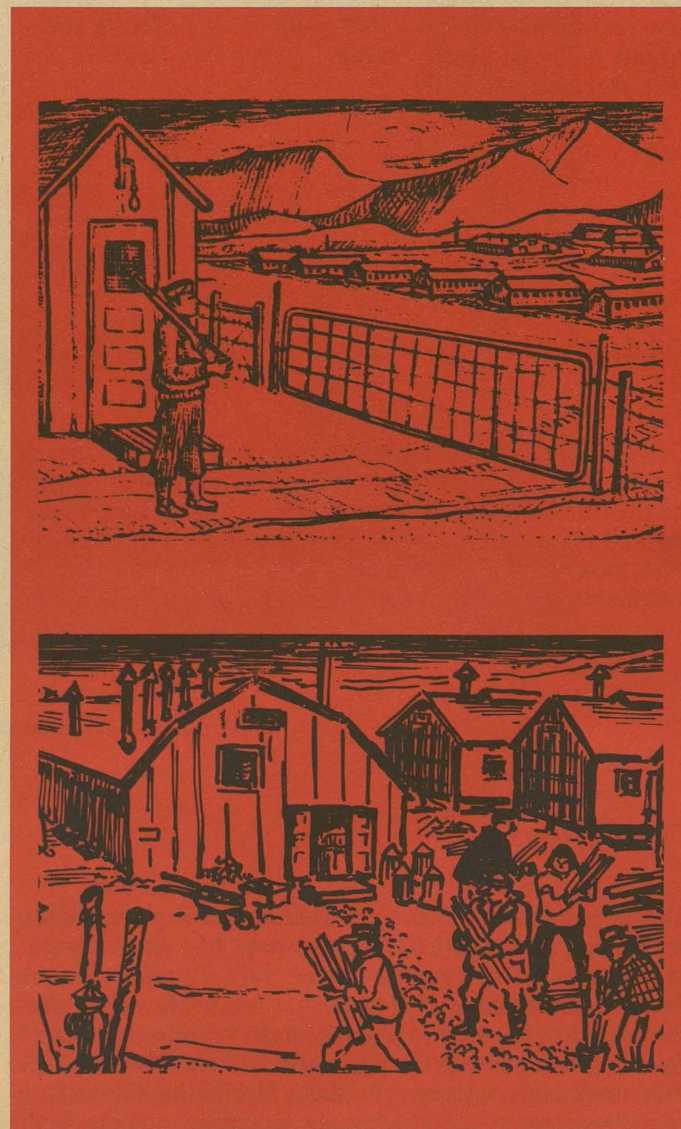

Katherine Coman's pioneering study of contract labor in both the Hawaiian Kingdom and the Territory of Hawaii is invaluable for the study of Asian immigration. Not only were almost all of the earlier Asian migrants to Hawaii contract laborers but Hawaii also served as a staging point for re-migration to the North American mainland, chiefly the United States but also Canada. *Hawaii's Japanese* is a post-war account by one of the leading interpreters of Hawaii's multi-ethnic democracy. Based upon broad and accurate research, the work clearly reflects its time although today it is regarded by many in the ethnic community as patronizing. Drawing upon American, Hawaiian and Japanese documents and secondary sources, Conroy has written a classic account of the beginnings of trans-Pacific migration from Japan. Conroy indicates that while Hawaii is often described as an American frontier, it was also a Japanese frontier and, quoting from Conroy, "... the Hawaii of the late nineteenth century provides a fascinating tale of frontier competition... And whereas American interests in the Islands had the advantage of prior establishment and institutional development, as well as great wealth, the Japanese had ever increasing strength in numbers and

remarkable facility in building economic prosperity and social cohesion, in spite of the political cards that were stacked against them." Conroy's description and explanation of the dynamics and precise circumstances of the migration remain basic to any understanding of the process.

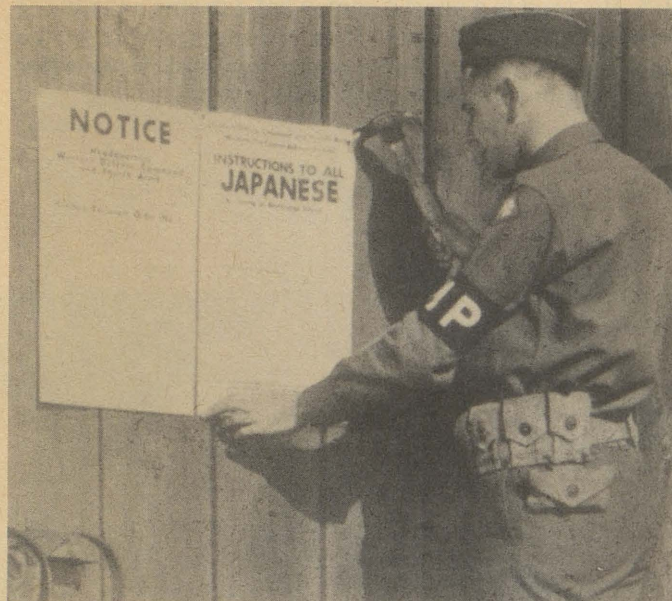

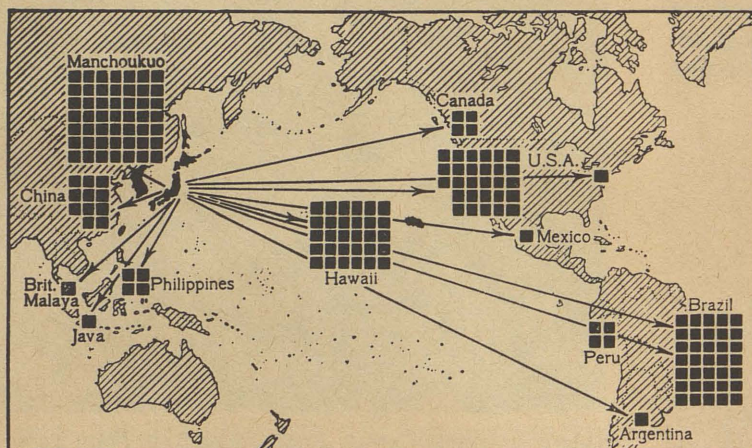

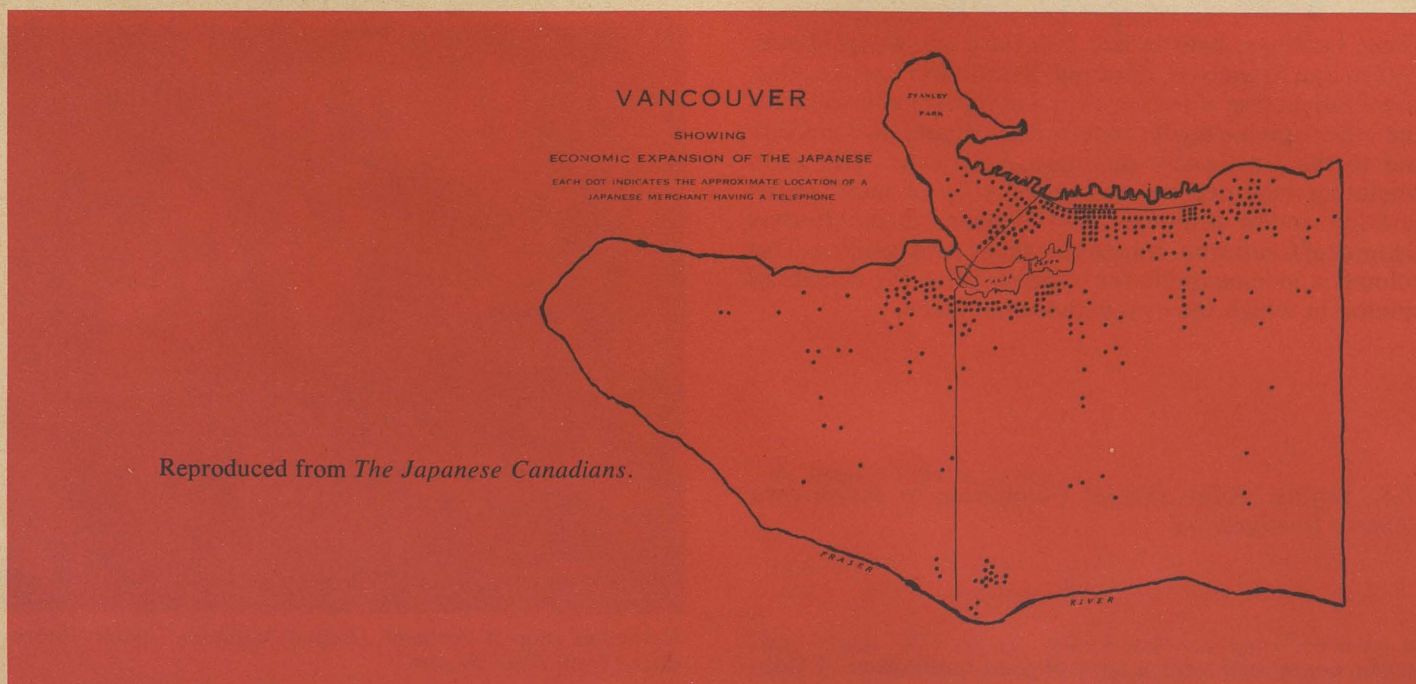
