As you discussed with Margaret McGovern of our office, I am enclosing a copy of the questionnaire for the planned "Interactive Forum of AIDS Management" which will be held during the ASCO meeting in San Francisco starting on May 21.

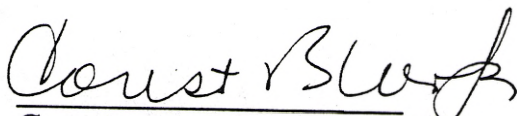

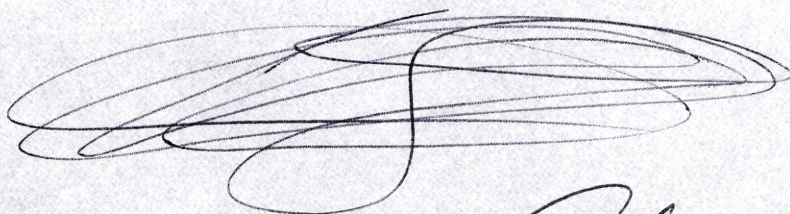

Dear Connie:

I am asking for your help in locating a Fellow in Infectious Diseases, with an emphasis on AIDS, to begin July 1, 1989. So far, I have been unsuccessful in locating a Fellow for next year. The salary range is \$30,000 plus benefits. The Fellow will have a dual appointment in Infectious Diseases and General Medicine. The Fellow would be Board eligible in Infectious Disease after two years of fellowship.

The fellowship consists of the usual Infectious Diseases fellowship, but all research and a significant portion of the clinical activity is in AIDS. The Fellow would be expected to round on the inpatient AIDS service, to spend at least two half days in the AIDS Clinic per week, to carry out clinical research projects in epidemiology, prevention and treatment of AIDS. The current research includes prevention of spread of HIV among IV drug users, a Megace study, a cost of care project, and development of a non-profit AIDS treatment center in Sacramento called CARES (Center for AIDS Research, Education, and Services). CARES will affiliate with San Francisco AIDS Treatment Consortia and is expected to provide a new type of model for AIDS treatment in mid-sized cities.

What: Exchange of existing heavyweight wheelchair for a lightweight wheelchair;

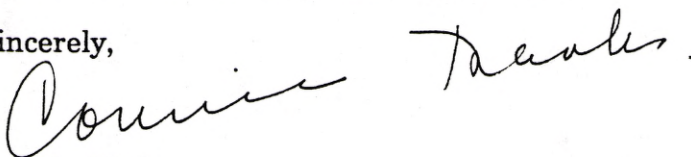
Why: Wheelchair too heavy for family members to place in car to bring patient to VA Hospital for various medical appointments. VA based wheelchairs are seldom available for transportation. Family members are unable to ensure outpatient visits without the personal availability of a wheelchair.

This request evidently goes to Rehabilitation which will evaluate its validity, arrange an appointment with Benny, and if the request is granted, it will be passed back to the Prosthetics Department and the alternate wheelchair will be issued.

If I can trouble you to do this, it will greatly facilitate visits.

Bonnie, thanks very much. It really would make our life easier. At this point, my mother has been renting one on a monthly basis. I can just barely swing the heavyweight one into a car, but she is unable to do it at all.
