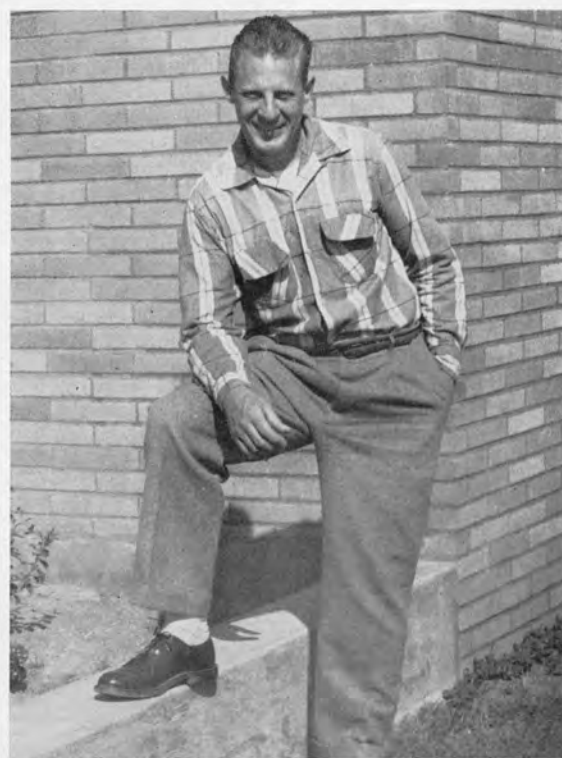

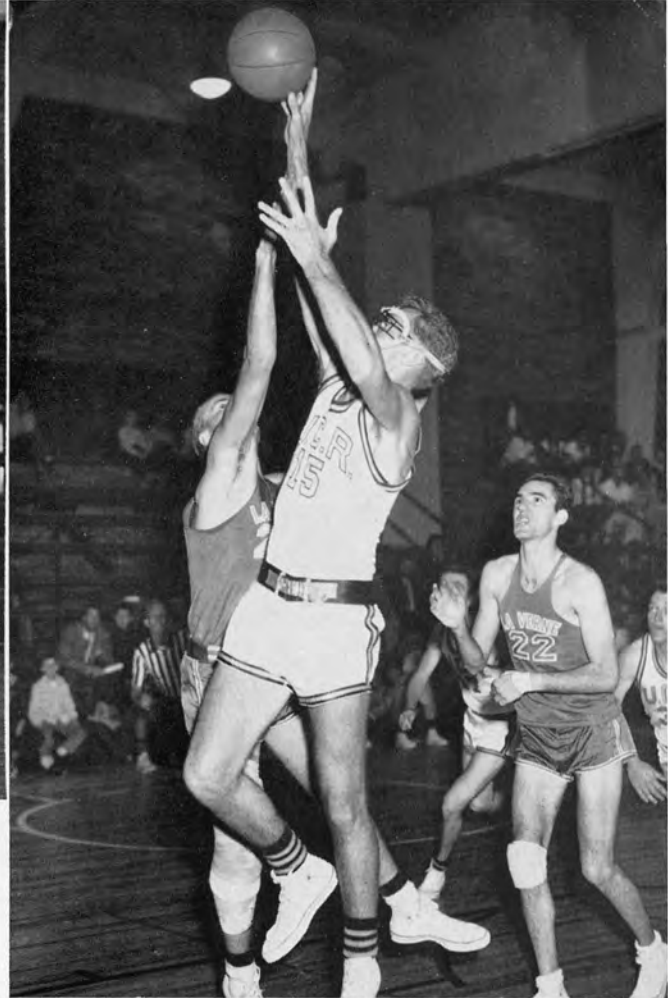

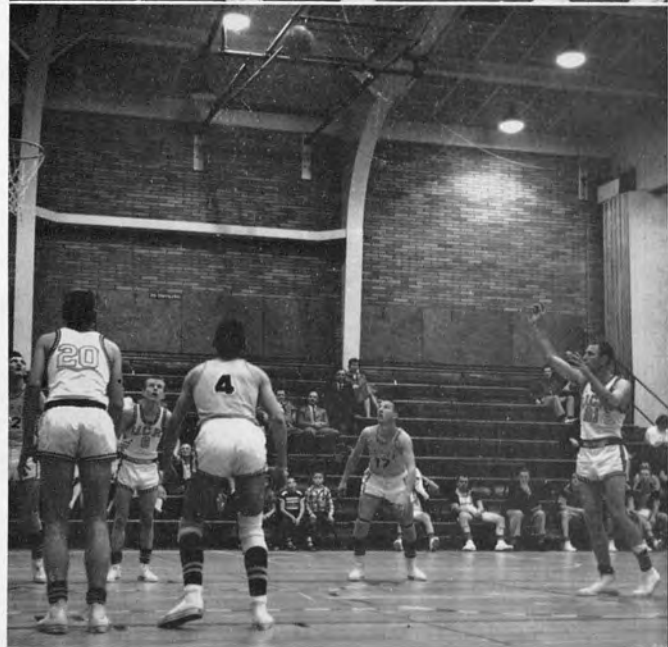

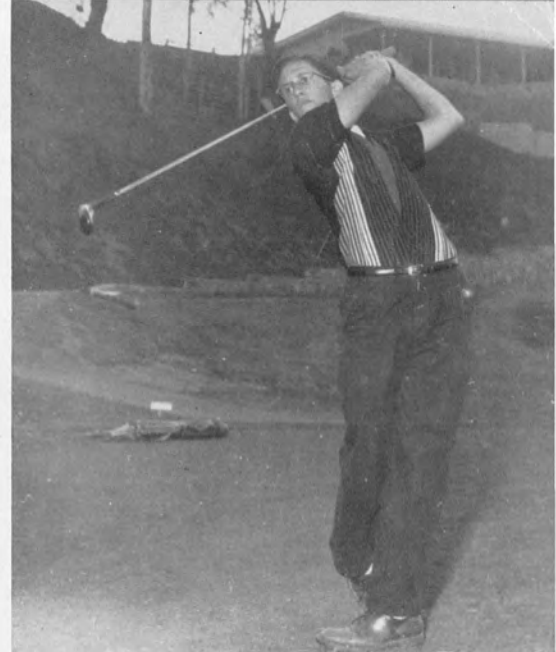

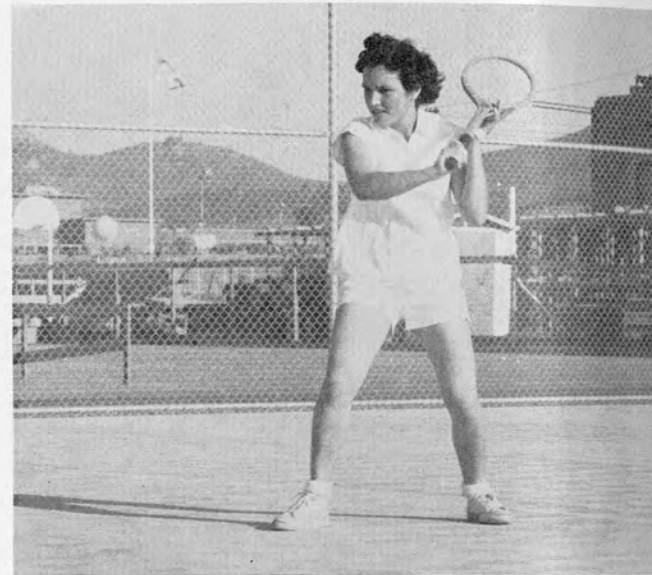

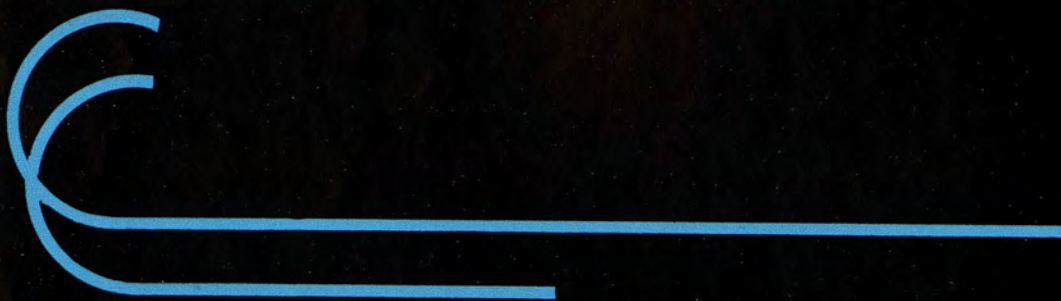

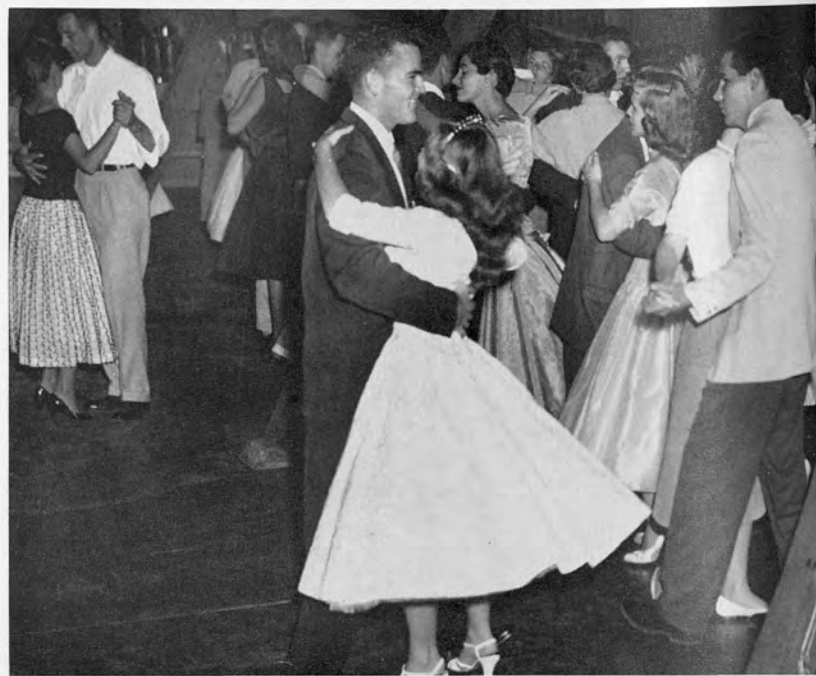

Ann Allen and Ced Saario, in their matching stripes, were one of the more easily recognized couples at the PJ Dance.



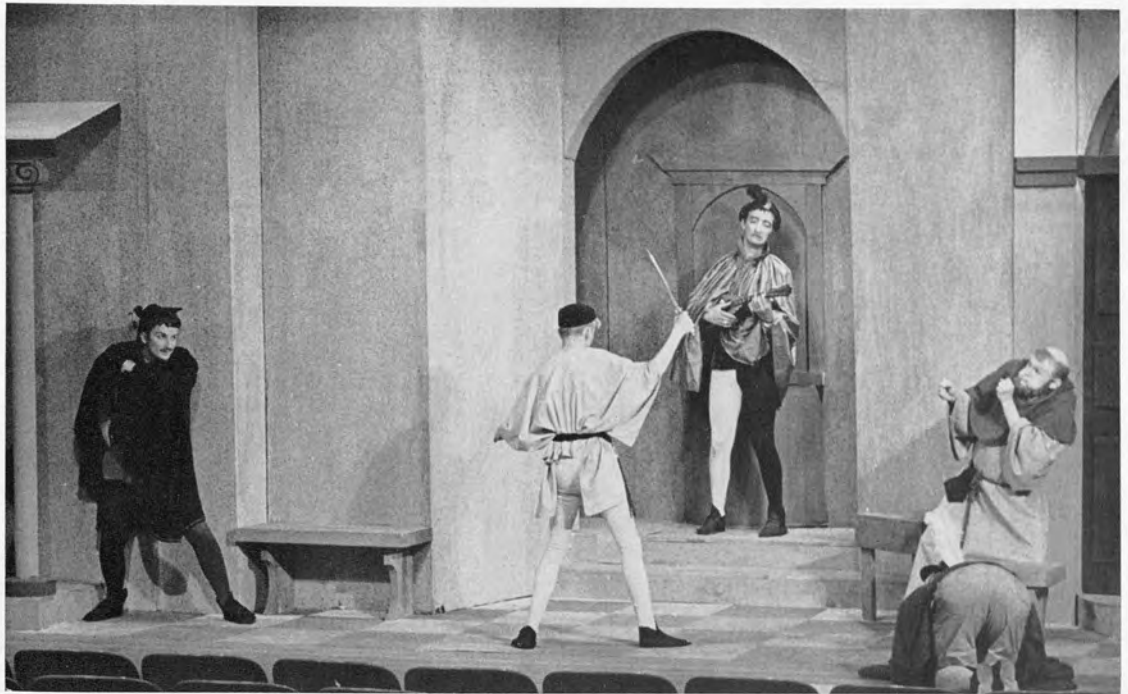

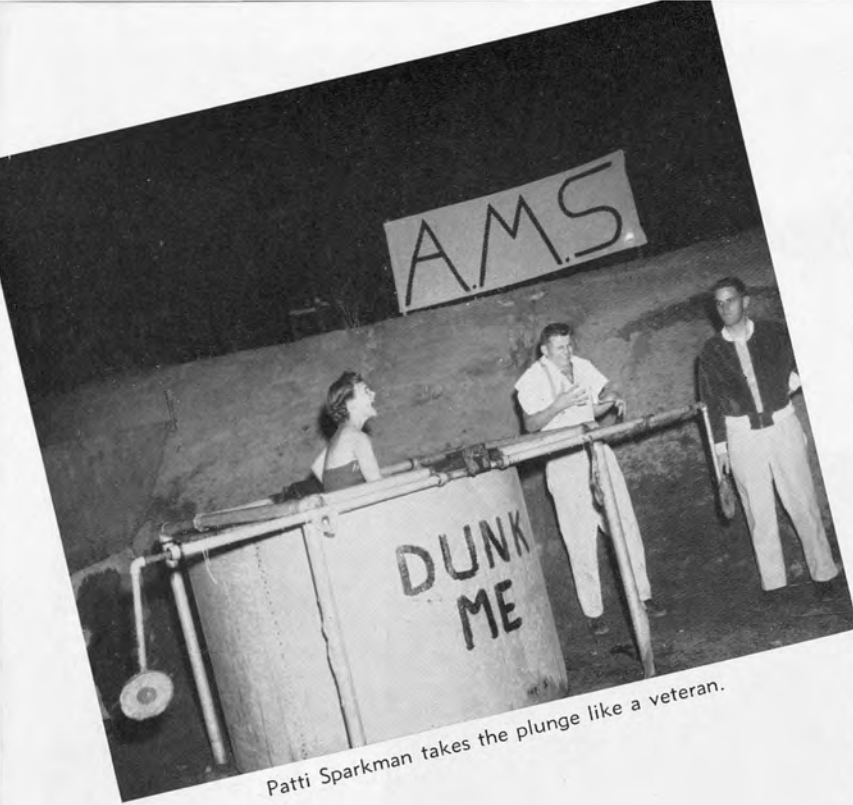

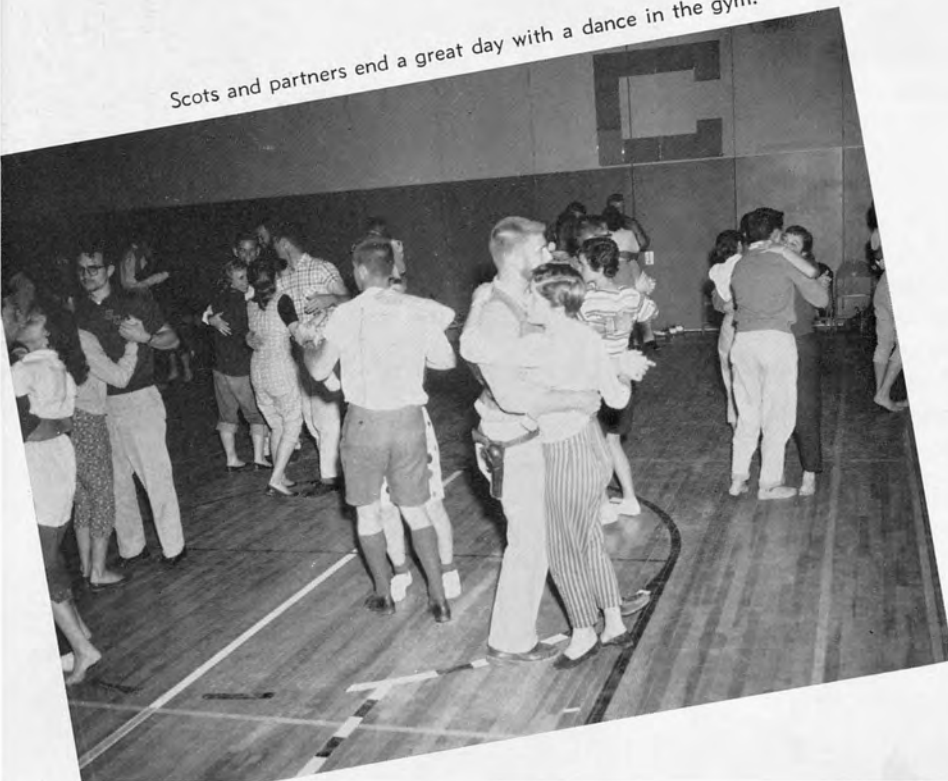

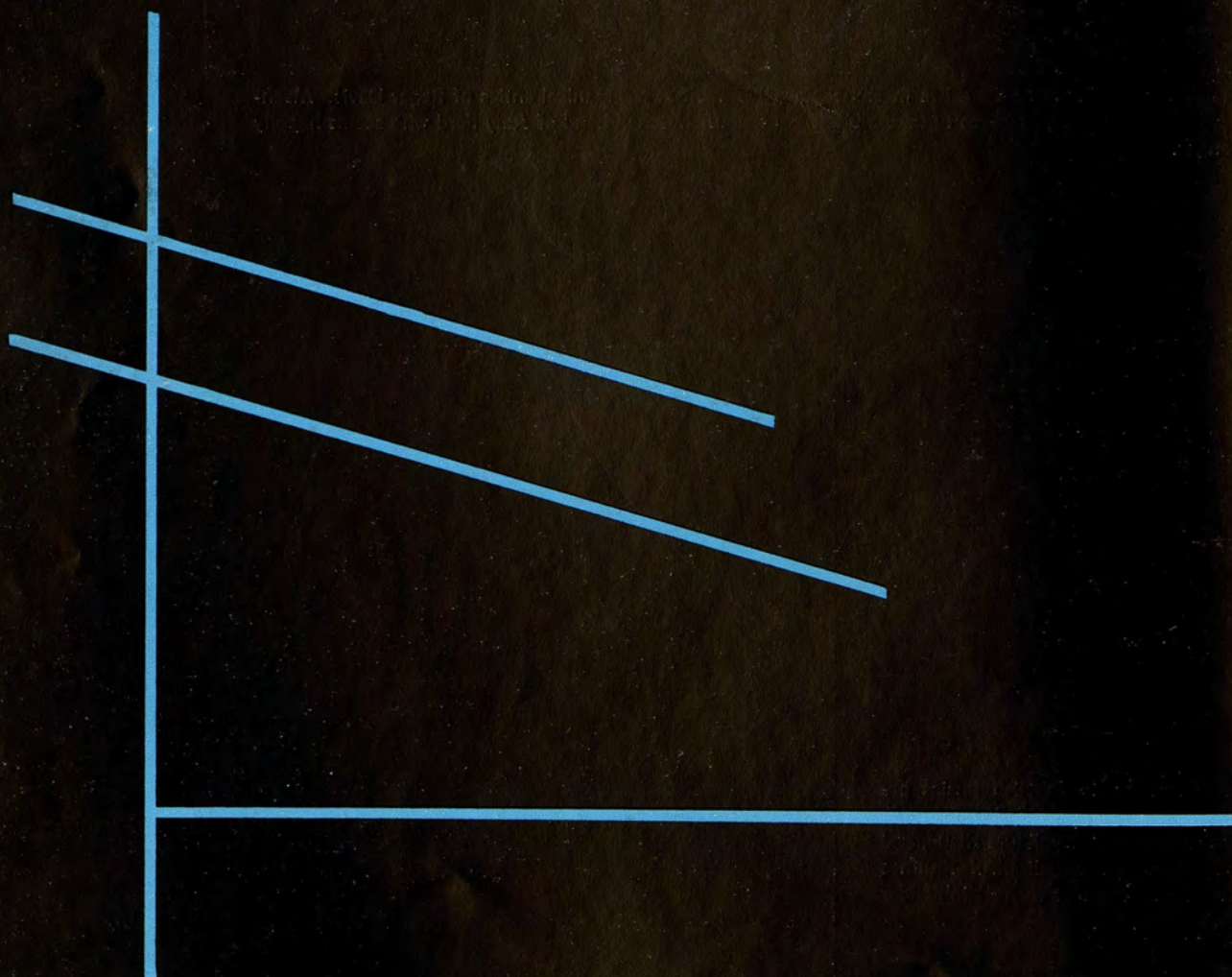

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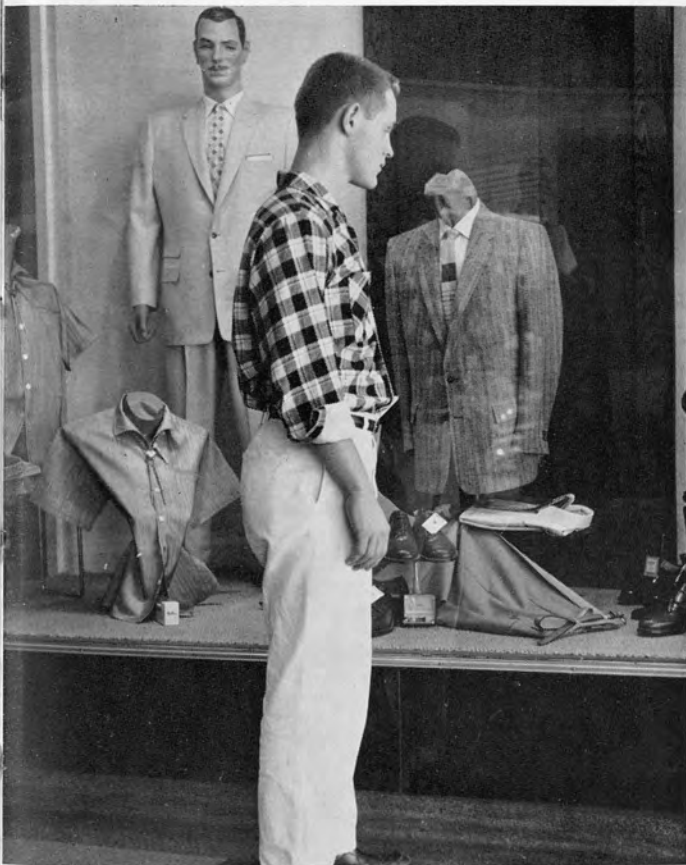


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Acknowledgements . . .
