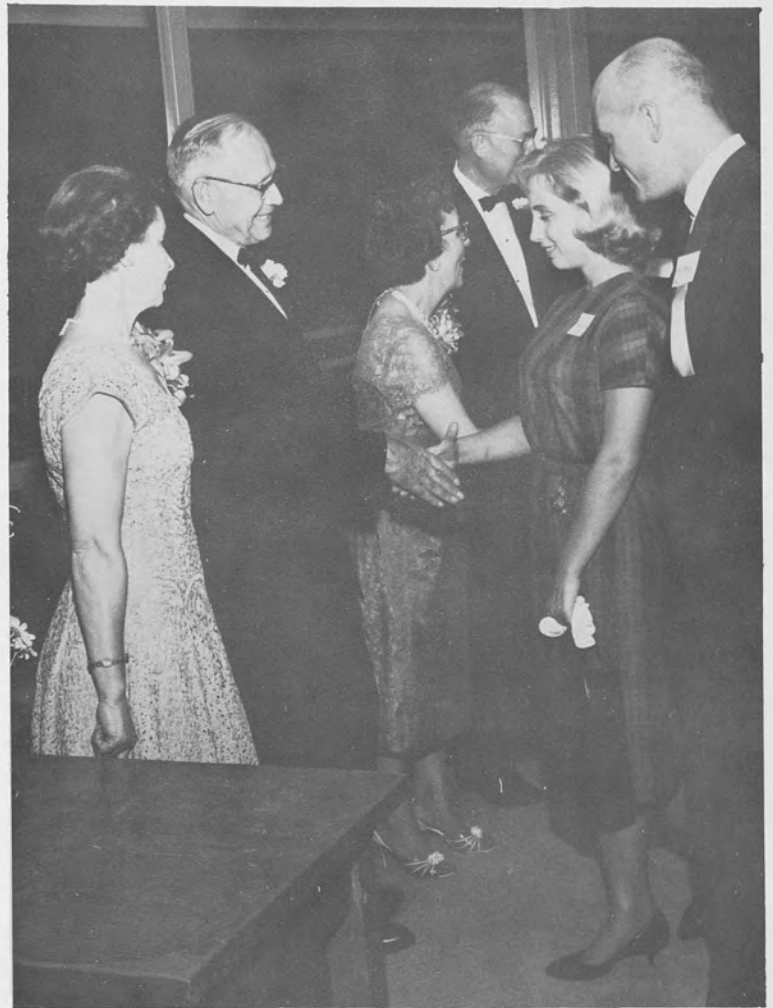

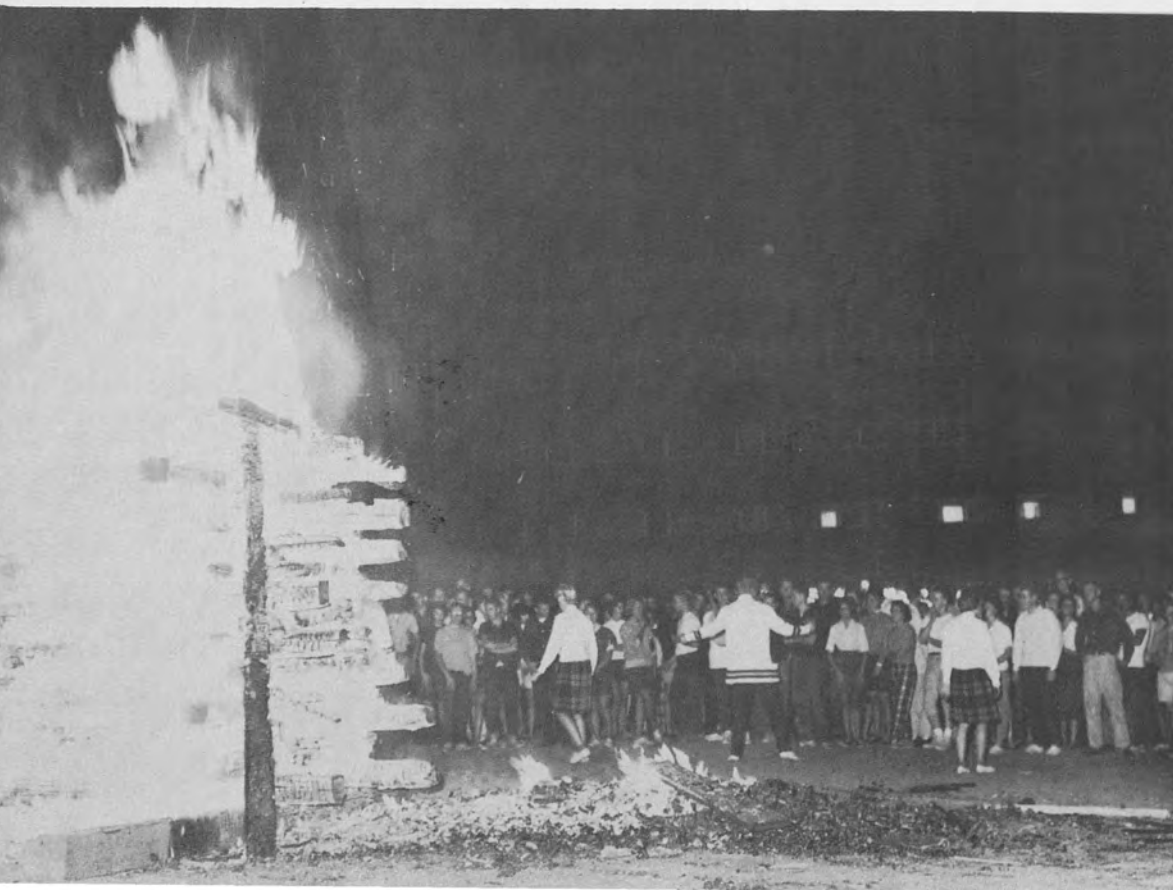

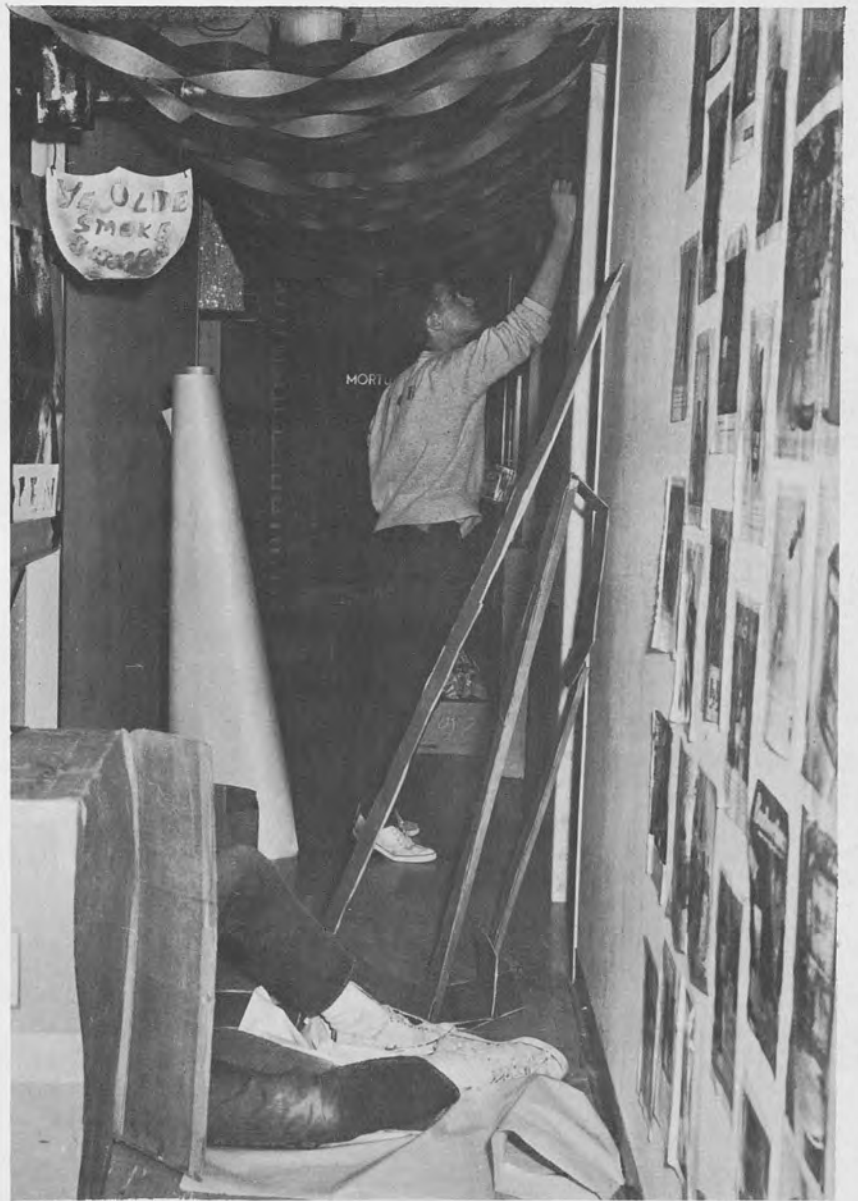

into the category of **Fine Arts.**



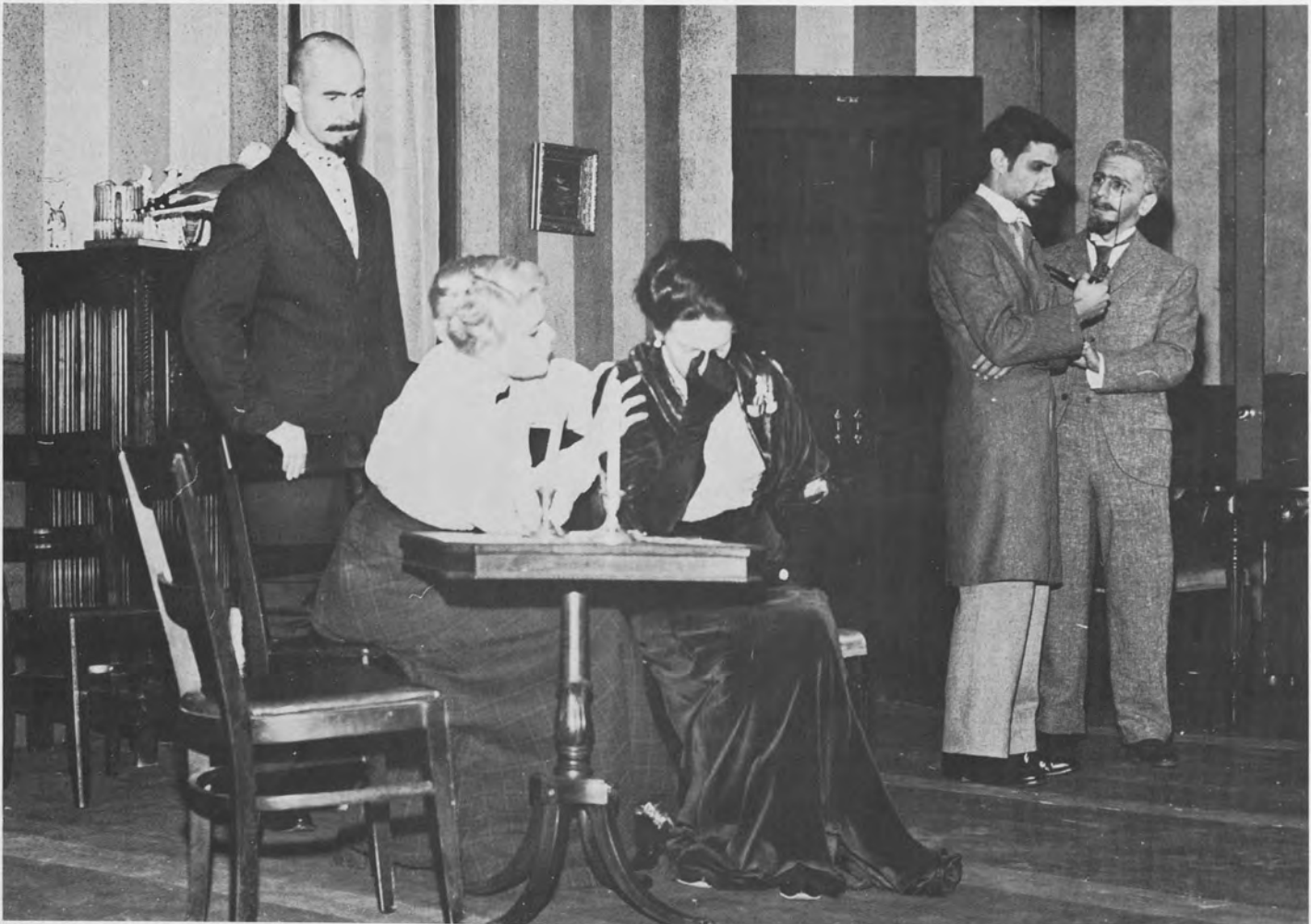

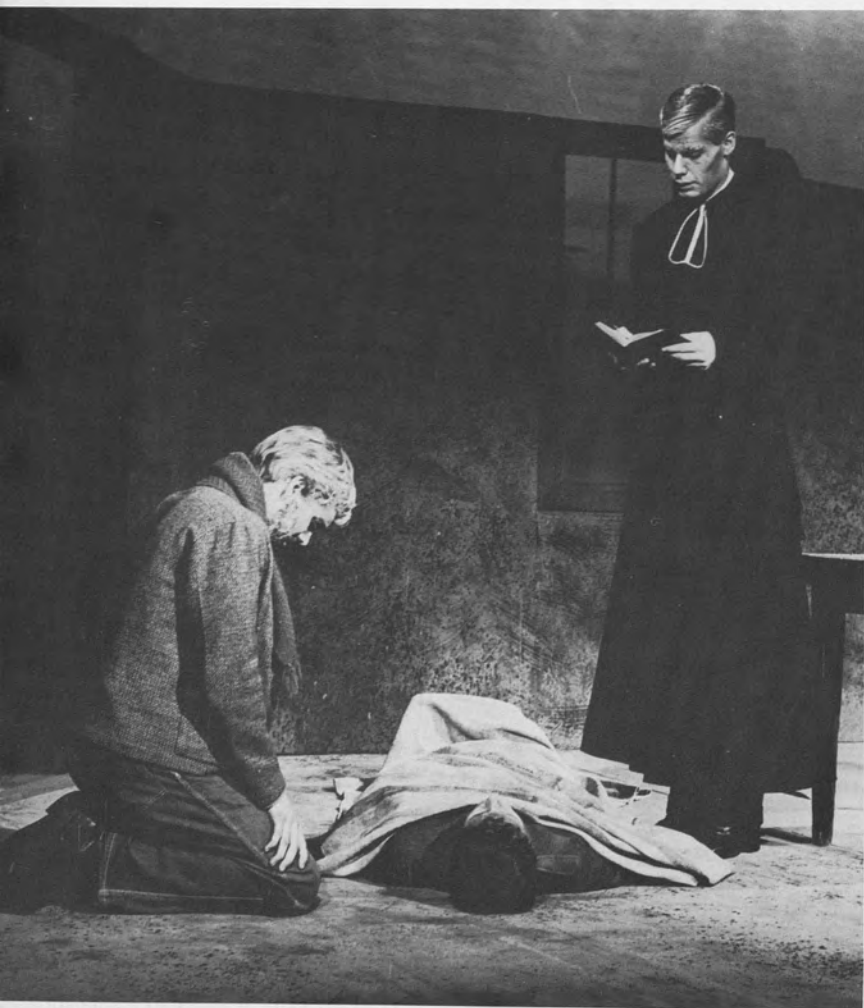
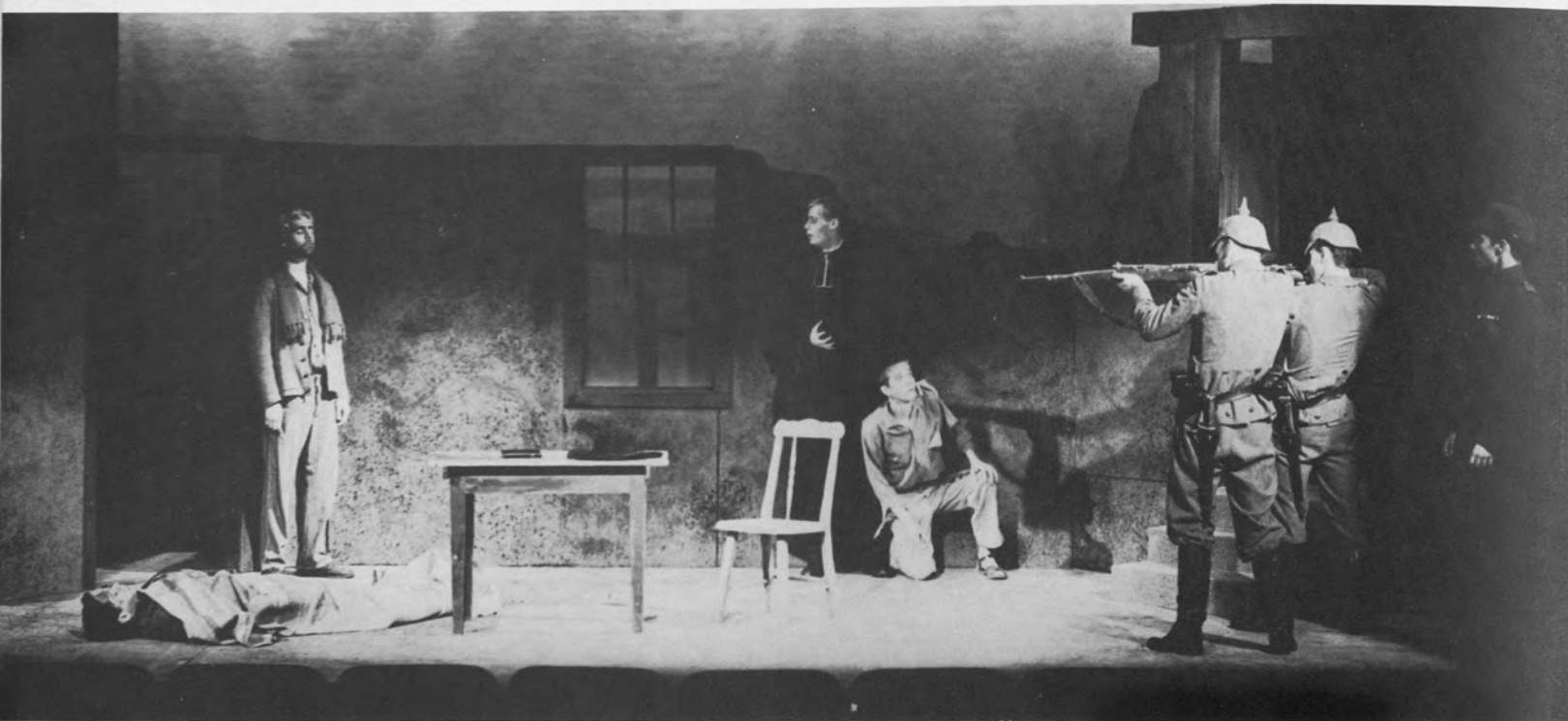

### **ORCHESTRA**

The orchestra, under the direction of Dr. Donald Johns, presented two concerts in the past year, at Christmas and in the spring. The former program featured works of Stephen Storace, Johann Christian Bach, Gordon Jacob, Michael Haydn and the traditional Toy Symphony by Joseph Haydn. The latter concert included numbers by Mozart, the Andante for Flute and Orchestra, Four German Dances, and Preludium.

### **COLLEGIUM MUSICUM**

The Collegium Musicum performed at the spring orchestra concert this year. Included works were Divertimento for Woodwinds by Dittersdorf and a suite for brasses by Charles Coleman. Concerted music for violin, winds and percussion by Dr. Johns was a highpoint of the program.





### **CHORAL SOCIETY**

The Christmas program of the Choral Society under the direction of Dr. John Halliday was highlighted by the singing of Handel's Hallelujah Chorus from the Messiah, Beethoven's Hallelujah Chorus from the Mount of Olives, and Jolley's Gloria in Excelsis. The latter included the Brass Ensemble from the Collegium Musicum. The spring program was built upon the Imperial or Mass of Joseph Haydn. Many long hours of chorus members and soloists in extra rehearsals made these concerts a great success.

### **MADRIGALS**

The Madrigals had a full year offering a selection of seasonally appropriate music at both the Christmas and the spring choir concerts. Besides these performances, Madrigals journeyed to the La Jolla campus and other distant spots to present their skills.

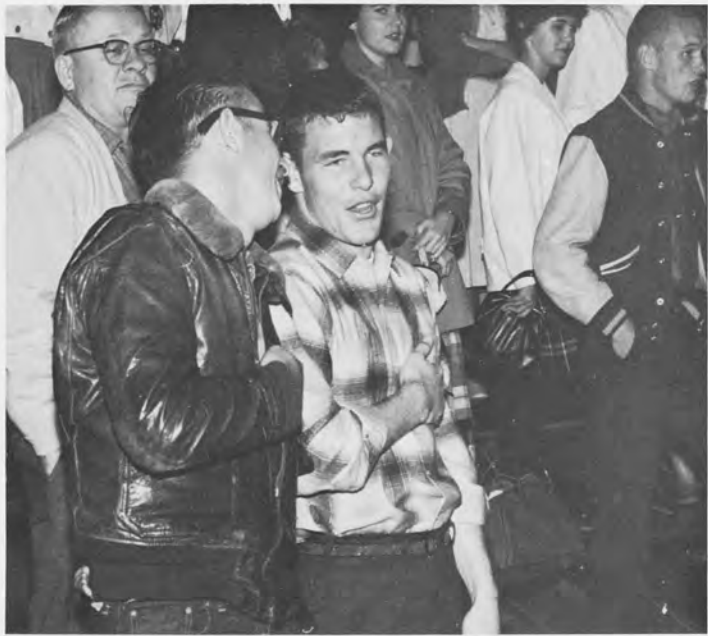

The 1960 football team became the first undefeated team in UCR history. Guided by head coach Jim Whitley and his able assistants Gil Allen, Dwain Lewis and Don Edwards, the Highlanders compiled a 7-1 record with a perfect season being marred only by a tie with Azusa College. UCR fans saw a brand of football never before witnessed on this campus, and despite the loss of some key first string players Coach Whitley is looking forward to another fine year in 1961. Strong teams which UCR defeated in '60, such as Davis, Pomona, CMC and Cal West will be looking for revenge but Coach Whitley and company plan to have a strong answer waiting. UCR fans may thus look forward to another season of football fireworks.

## SEASON SUMMARY

The Highlanders opened the season slowly and picked up momentum as the schedule progressed. In the opener against Chino, UCR eked out a 20-14 victory. Touchdowns by Ketella, Michaelson and Woertink accounted for the victory, but at the final gun the Clansmen were desperately fighting off a Chino drive. When Cal Tech came to town the next week, a better prepared Highlander team handed them a 28-18 whipping. Sparked by halfback Warren Blakely, the Clansmen enjoyed an 8-6 halftime advantage which they never relinquished. The highlight of the game was a fourth-quarter 83-yard scamper by Blakely, his second of the day. Ketella and John McKnight accounted for the other UCR scores. The following week the Highlanders upset the highly touted Cal Aggies from Davis 12-6 to run their season record to 3-0. Defense was the story of this game as the Clan twice stopped Davis in the shadow of their own goal posts. Blakely and Roller scored the pair of UCR touchdowns while the defense held the Aggies scoreless for the first three periods. Davis came to life, however, in the fourth period, scoring one TD and when the final gun sounded they were perched on the UCR two-yard line. — And the Highlanders rolled on. — The next victory came at the expense of a completely out-classed Naval Ordnance team from the north. Michaelson, Elstead and Blakely all contributed touchdown runs while two TD passes from Ketella and one from Bill Hall added three more. The most exciting play of the day came when Ketella threw a seven-yard pass to Blakely who then carried the ball 42 yards right through most of the Navy team to score his second TD of the day. The season count was now 4-0. Claremont-Mudd was next on the list as the Clan posted a 12-7 Homecoming victory for their fifth win in a row. Approximately 1200 fans saw the Clan fight back from an early 7-0 deficit and score twice in the second quarter and take a 12-7 halftime lead. The second half was a fierce defensive battle in which neither team was able to score. The Highlander scores came on two scoring passes from Ketella. The first was a fourth down 3-yard toss to Woertink and the second was another clutch fourth down pass, this time for two yards to Blakely. The record now read 5-0 but a strong Pomona loomed in the way. At Pomona, the strong Clan defense was again the difference in the ball game. Led by guard George Mills, the defense again and again thwarted Pomona scoring attacks. The game remained a scoreless tie until with less than five minutes remaining in the game Ketella sneaked over from two yards out to climax a 57-yard drive. This was enough and when it was all over, the score read 6-0 in favor of UCR. The following week, an overconfident Clan team carried its six game winning streak to Covina where an inspired Azusa College ended the winning streak by holding the favored Highlanders to an 8-8 tie. Each team scored in the first half and then sloshed fruitlessly up and down the field in a driving rain storm for the remainder of the game. During the second period, however, UCR had a 65-yard punt return by John Elstead called back because of a clipping penalty. In the final game against Cal Western of San Diego, with the first undefeated season in the history of the school on the line, the Highlanders were not to be denied. Behind 9-8 late in the game, Ketella faded back and threw a fourth down pass 45 yards to Bob Woertink to provide a 16-9 victory. This climaxed an uphill struggle which the small Highlander team had waged all season; from the near defeat at the hands of Chino in the first game to the final victor against Cal West and the posting of the first undefeated football season in the history of UCR.

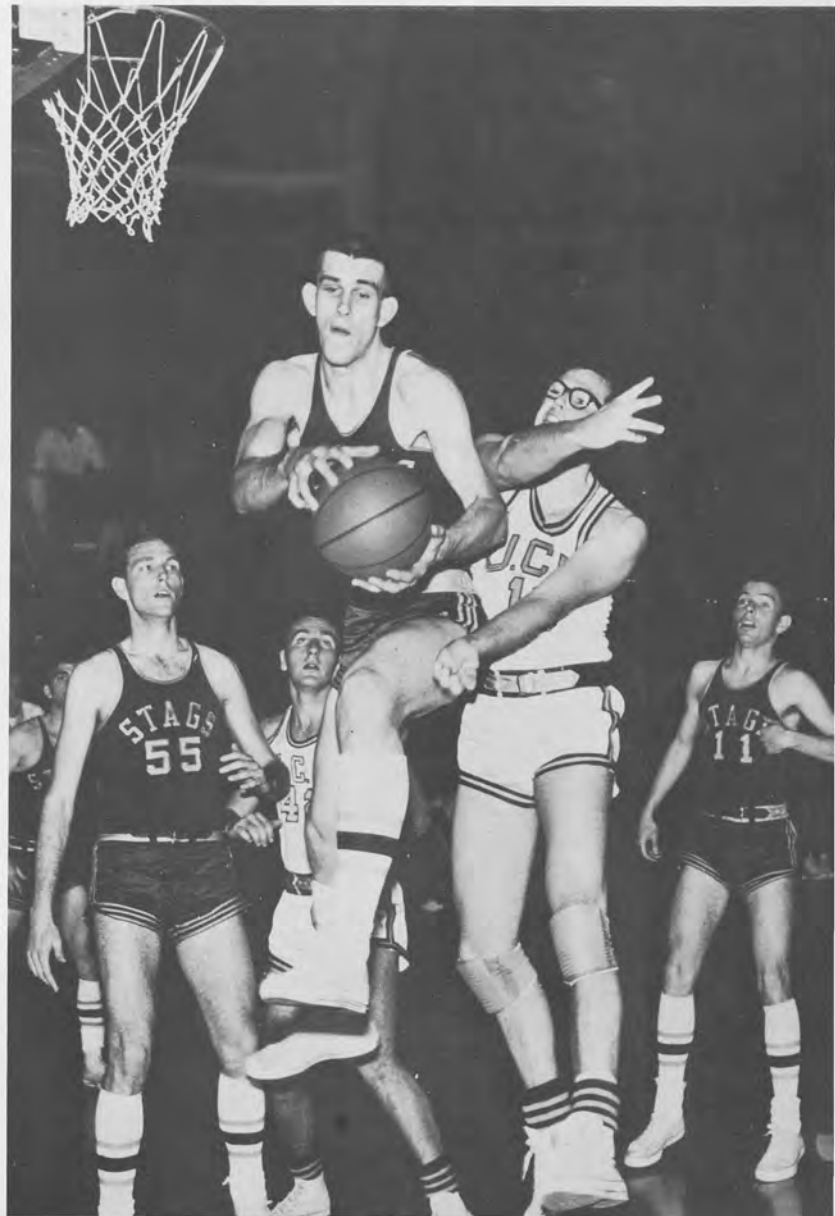






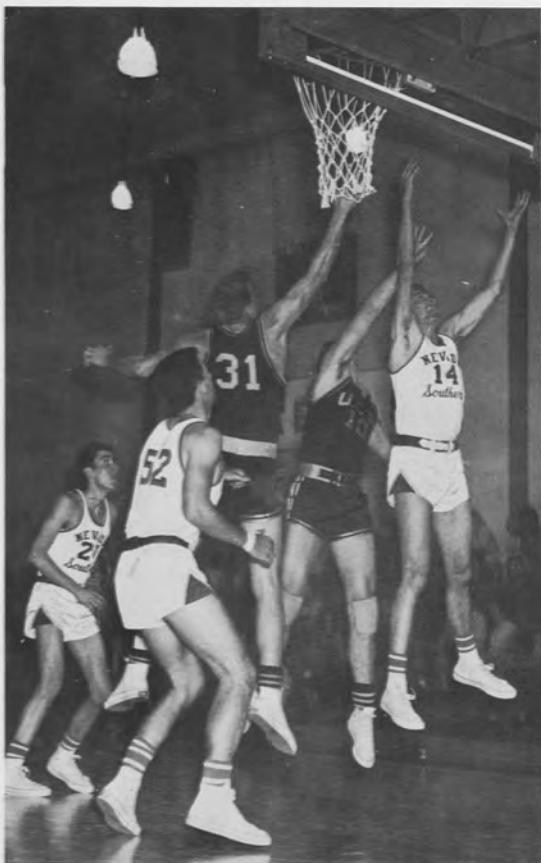
## BASKETBALL

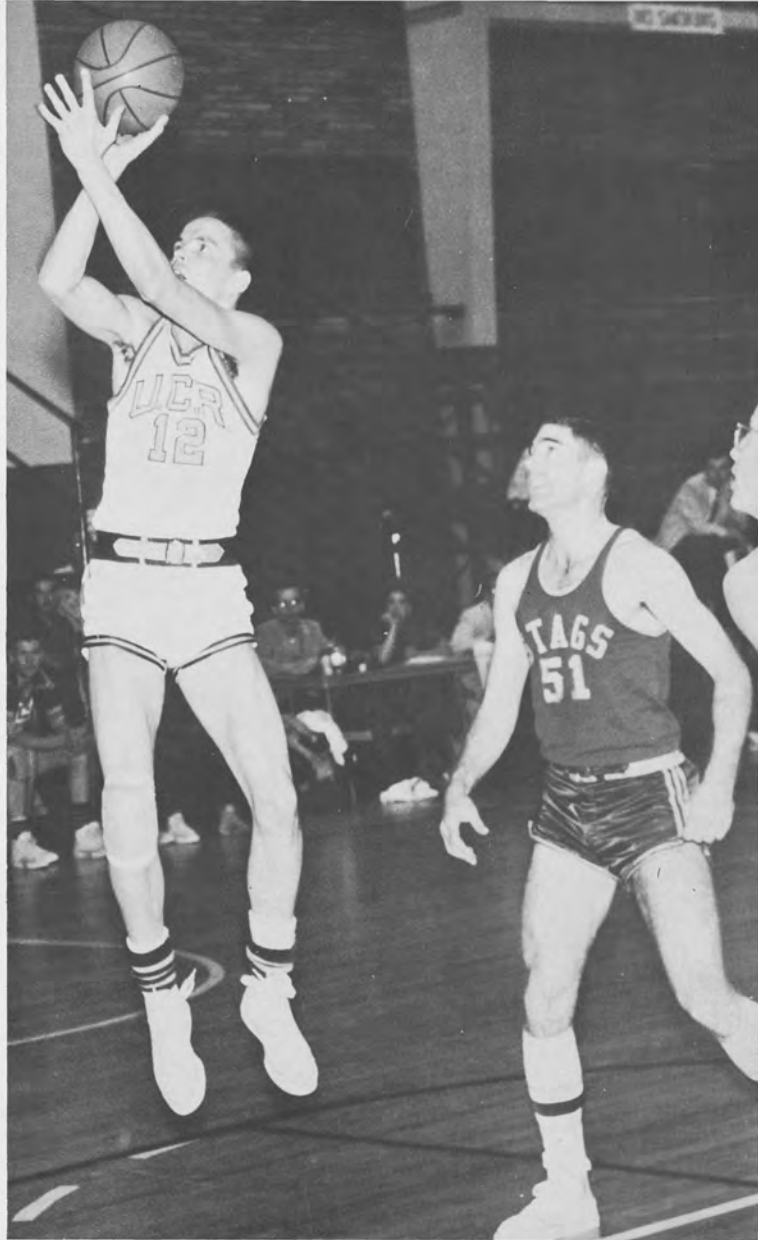
Coach Frank Lindeberg had the unenviable job of molding a team from a pre-season turnout where the largest man measured only 6'2". This lack of height was pretty much the story of the season which saw the Highlanders win only four games while losing seventeen. Coach Lindeberg must be commended, however, because despite this lack of height the team made a good showing practically everywhere they went. A five-day trip to the north during which they played Davis, Sacramento State and Santa Barbara resulted in three losses but upon returning home, the Highlanders captured two in a row from La Verne College and Cal Tech respectively. The team then traveled to Las Vegas for two games against Nevada Southern University and Nellis Air Force Base. The final win of the year came at the expense of Claremont-Harvey Mudd College in the final game of the regular season. The Clan then journeyed to Cal Poly for the annual tournament where they met the top seeded home team in the first game of the tournament. The highly touted Cal Poly team was expected to crush the small Highlanders; but the spunky Clan traded their opponents basket for basket and with two minutes remaining in the game, UCR was down by only three points. At this point, however, a tip-in and a fast break put Cal Poly out of reach and they won by an eight-point margin. Throughout the season, Highlander scoring was paced by guard Chuck Park, center Gary Shima and latecomer Frank Dixon. An individual honor went to senior guard Warren Blakely who was voted team captain at a banquet given by Coach Lindeberg. Next year, with the acquisition of some height, the Clan can be expected to field a much improved squad, as many of this year's team will be back. Returning players will be guards Keith Blackburn, Chuck Park, Roger States, center Bob McCune, and forwards Bob Fakindiny and Bud Herren, all of whom turned in fine performances this season.

# SOCCER

The past season was the UCR soccer squad's most successful in its four-year history. Not only did it manage to leave the basement of the Southern California Soccer Conference for the first time, its tie for second place with a 5-4-1 record earned Derek Colville the honor of being named the Coach of the Year by the SCSC.

A portent of things to come was seen when the Clan took the season opener from Redlands, 2-0. This was the first time the Highlanders had been able to do this in a league contest. Following this were victories over Caltech and Pomona-Claremont by scores of 5-1 and 7-0.

UCLA ended the win streak by soundly trouncing the Clan 10-0. The defeat so unnerved the squad that in its next outing it did not play near its best form and lost 4-0 to Redlands. When the Clan faced UCLA again, the Bruins were victorious, 7-0. However, the score was far from indicative this time. The Clan was once more playing good soccer.

The second encounter with Caltech was to be the test. The Engineers were a revitalized squad and at that time the "hottest" in the league. They were smarting for revenge, and the game was in Pasadena. The contest was extremely hard fought, but in the end the Ucrans came through with a 2-1 victory to retain second place. The Clan had to settle with a 2-2 tie with Biola the next time out, but four days later they made up for it. Playing Biola again, the Highlanders were behind 2-1 midway in the first half. But they took command in the second half, the final score being 5-2.

The last game of the season ended in a Pomona-Claremont upset victory, 2-0. The loss robbed UCR of a clear claim to second place, the squad ending up in a tie with the Redlands Bulldogs.

Many honors were accorded individuals on the squad. Jerry Weber was elected to a position on the SCSC All-League team, with Brian Hawley, Archie Ilcken, Dick Thill, Horst Richardson and Jim Sharp receiving honorable mention. In addition, Jerry Weber, Brian Hawley, Dick Thill, Frank Horowitz, George Mineah, Marty Nieto and Horst Richardson earned places on the SCSC All-Star team which played to a 2-2 tie with the league champs, UCLA, in the annual All-Star game.

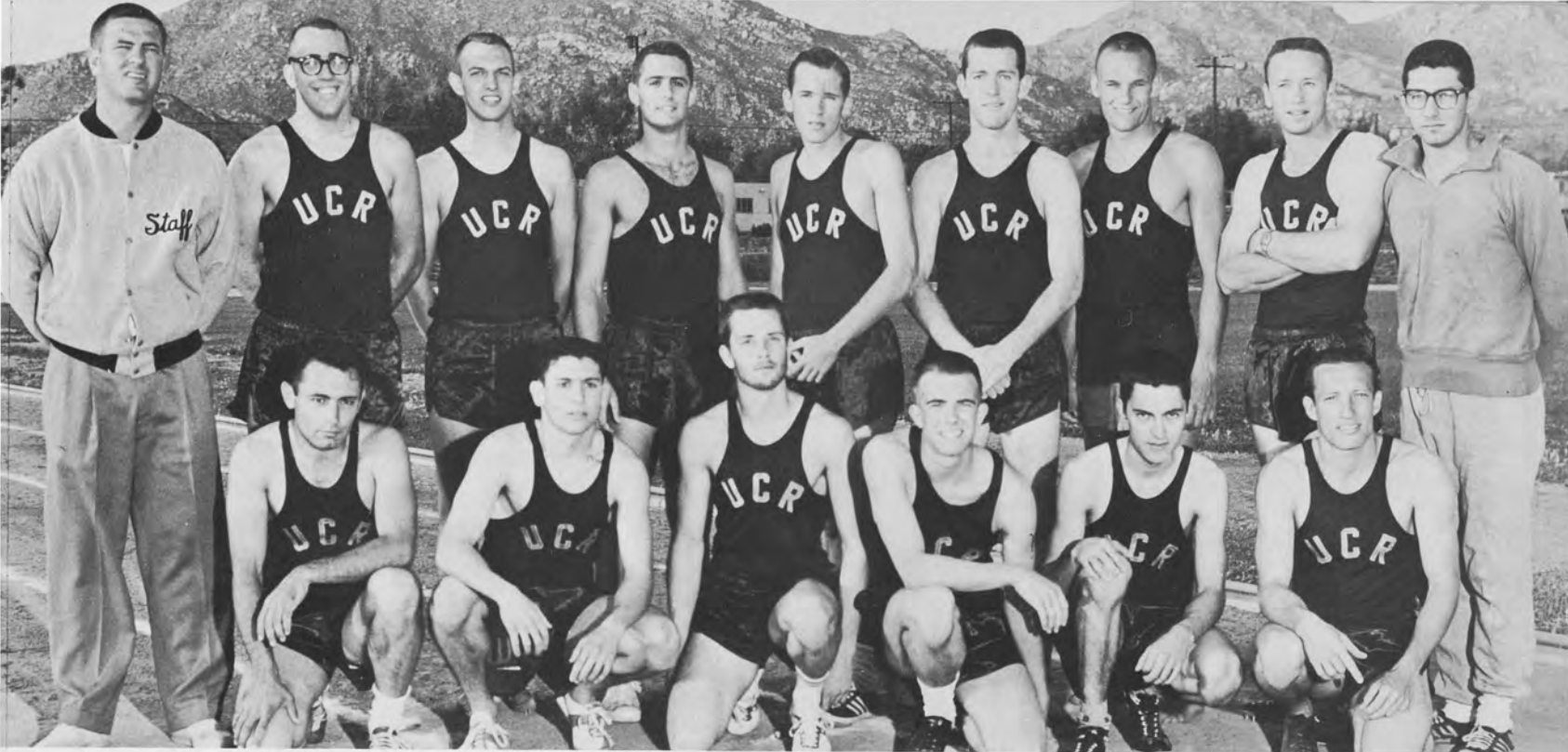

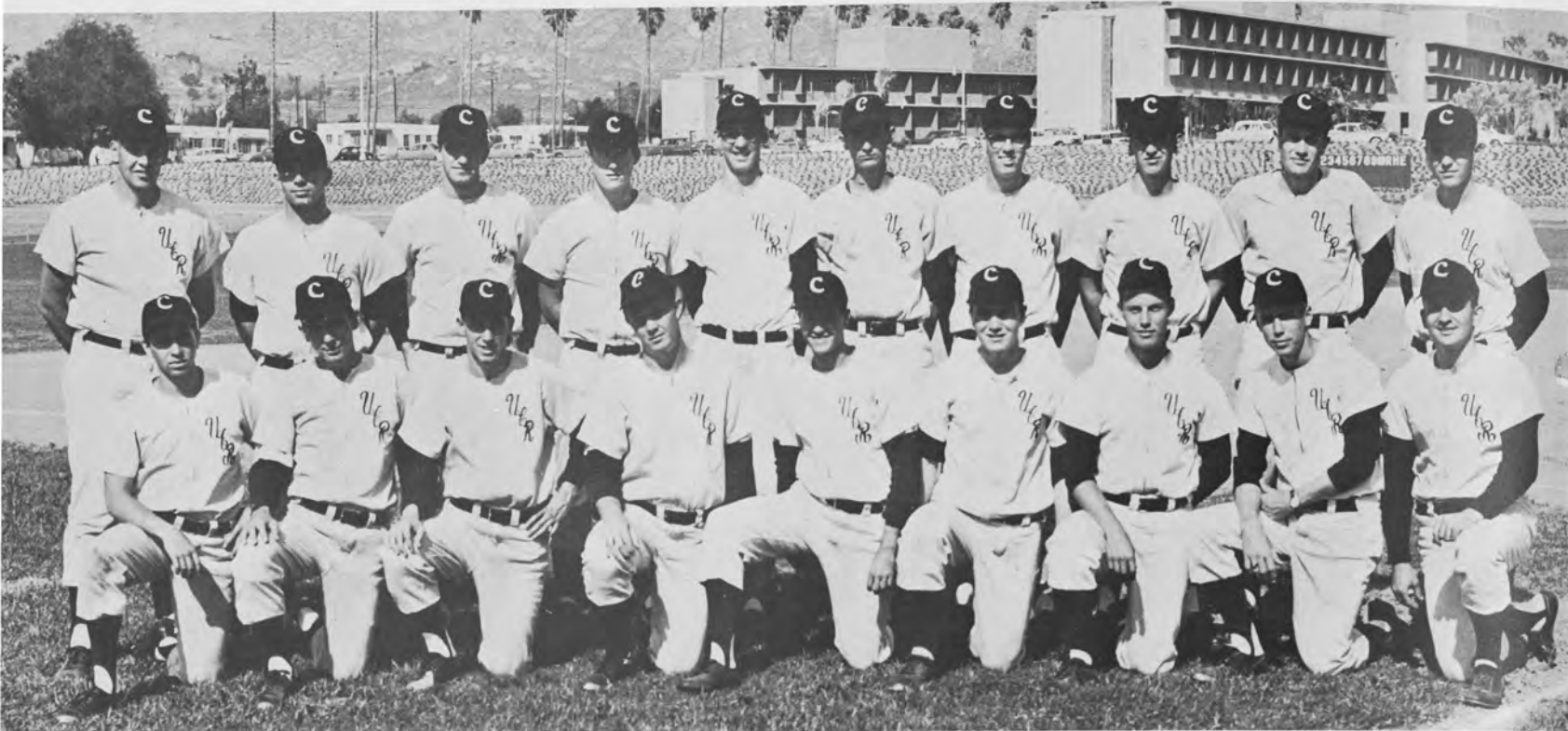

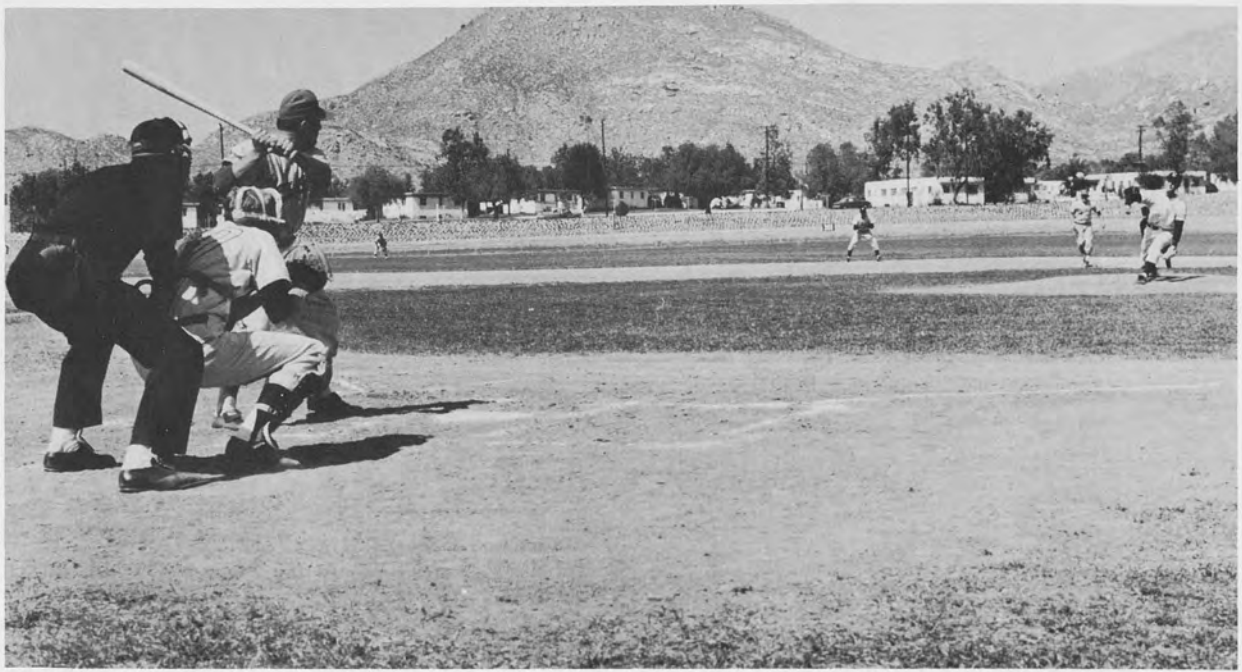
## BASEBALL

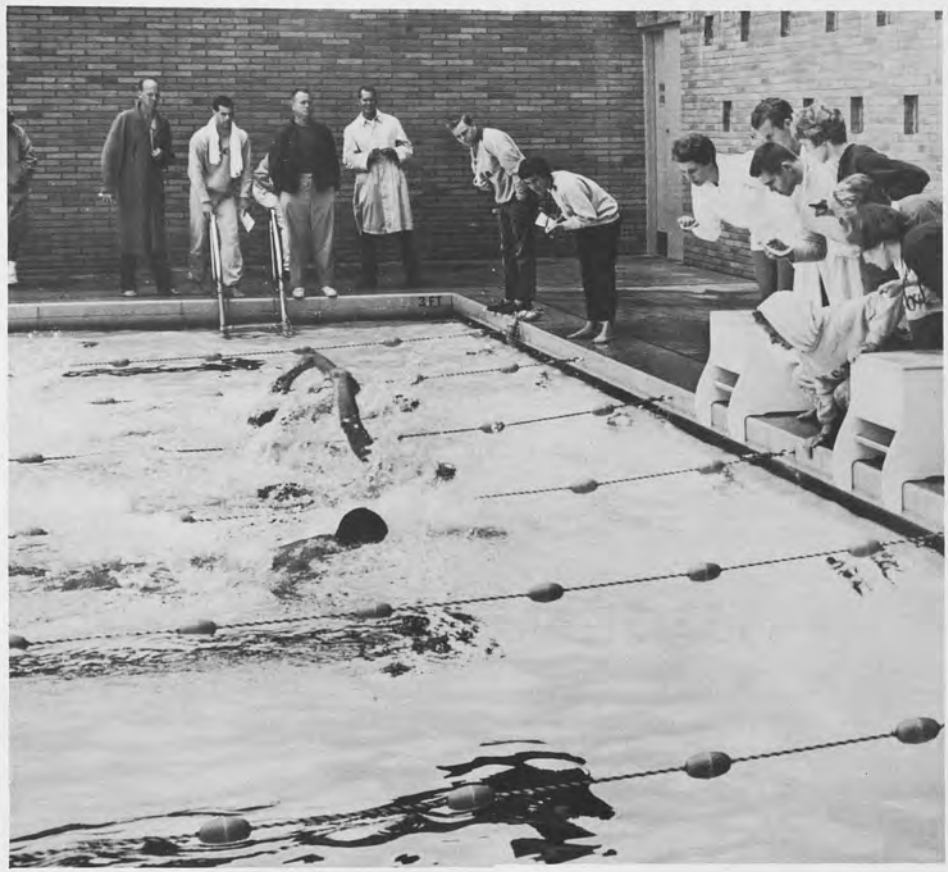

## **TENNIS**





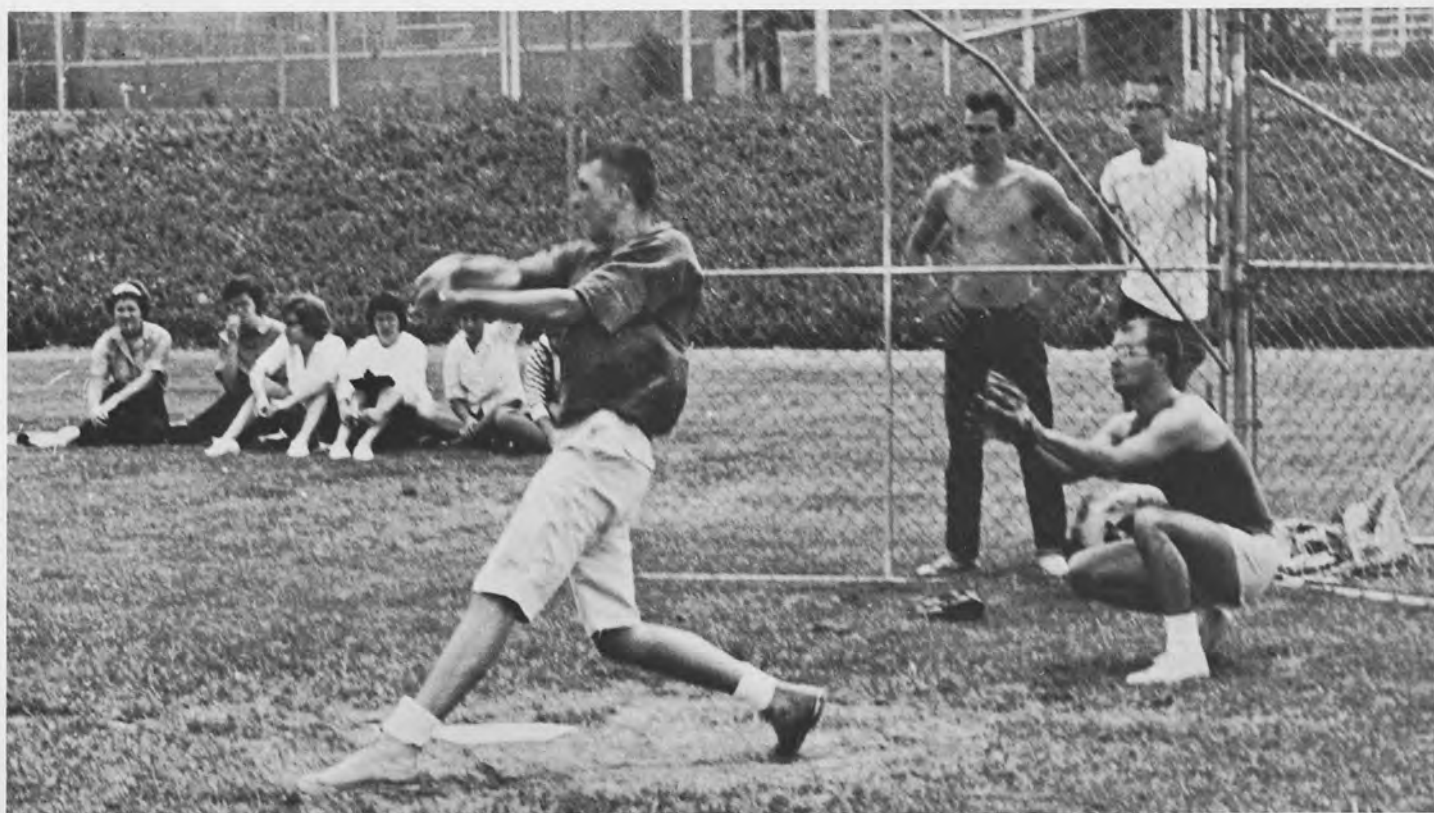

## RUGBY

A new addition has been placed on the list of varsity sports at UCR this year. Although rugby has been played in past years, it was only a club activity. This season, under the coaching of Frank Frost, the rugby team played eight consecutive Saturdays, winning one out of six in league play. This record is not poor considering the team played SC, UCLA, San Diego State, Eagle Rock A.C., Pomona, Loyola, and Norwalk. The win was against Loyola (11-9).

Rugby, which can be described as a cross between football and soccer, is played with 15 men on each team. The ball is similar in shape to that of a football, but is larger and lighter. It can be carried, tossed backwards, and kicked, while the ballcarrier may be tackled; blocking is not allowed. The uniform consists of cleated-shoes, long socks, shorts and a jersey. No padding may be worn.

A team may score in a number of different ways. The ball can be carried over the goal, called a try, for three points. This gives the team the opportunity to score two more points by kicking the ball between the goal posts. A team also scores three points for a completed penalty kick.

Thus, with the completion of the 1961 Tartan, two years in the publication business at UCR have been brought to a culmination. An attempt to evaluate these years might, at this point, be considered useless. Yet it would be senseless to ignore the existence of four semesters of extra-curricular activity; hence I feel I must attempt some sort of terse examination. In a sense, the time has proved both troublesome and rewarding. The former is perhaps the most tangible result, to which many will attest. As for the rewards accrued from the Highlander and Tartan, they are objects which are personal, subjective, and therefore harder to delineate. The practical experience of publishing a newspaper and yearbook, of course, must not be discounted. At the same time, the acquaintances gained through the activities are unquestionably the greatest asset. Persons with all shades of attitudes and beliefs have crossed my path, altering considerably my concept of human nature in both general and specific instances. Opinions have reversed themselves in both directions.

As for the Tartan itself, the work was pleasant and not as time-consuming as might be expected. Credit certainly must be accorded the staff which made my job a good sight easier, especially Linda Dalton for putting up with my rather lax attitudes. The most kudos, however, must be thrown at John Fawcett, the gentleman responsible for the vast majority of the pictures which so graphically represent what makes a campus tick. "Flash," as he has been nicknamed, never seemed to lack the time to take a photo or work in the darkroom, although very often it meant a dip in the grades (as it did for everyone.) Neil Petersen, Bob Powellson and Tom Irwin also should be thanked for their photo work. Barbara McBride, too, earned credit on the photography staff by virtue of the fact that she took more Tartan pictures than anyone besides John. Work by professionals Jackson Ingham and Ken Middleham were also used, although sparingly. And thank goodness for Frank's Cafe.

In all, it has been a good, if not confusing, year.
