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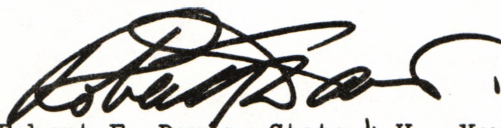

Re: Statewide 4-H Project Revisions



We are sending you some revised statewide 4-H projects. They do not alter the original CEMIS subjects or major objectives but have been brought up-to-date and done in somewhat uniform format.

These are written to provide some guidelines for local programming and to incorporate all the areas included in individual projects received from the staff.

As indicated in the CEMIS Handbook, each county should have a long-range program plan developed in conjunction with a countywide planning group. This should be updated periodically and should serve as the basis for development of individual project plans.

If you do not now have at least one reportable or non-reportable plan related to each statewide project, you should strongly consider developing one, since nearly all staff members should be participating in some way in all or nearly all of the program areas represented. These are in line with both California 4-H in the '70's and the CEMIS primary subjects for 4-H Youth work.

The areas covered by each project are roughly as follows:

- SW 431 - 4-H Nutrition Education (not limited to counties with ENEP funds)
- SW 433 - 4-H Youth Science and Technology (all 4-H project areas except CRD and personal development related projects)
- SW 434 - 4-H Youth Personal Development (all personal improvement projects, activities)
- SW 435 - 4-H Youth Citizenship (all citizenship development activities, local-county-state)
- SW 436 - 4-H Youth Volunteer Staff Development (all 4-H leader development, both adult and teen leaders)
- SW 437 - 4-H Youth International Programs (anything related to IFYE, 4-H Ambassador Program, Japanese LABO Program, interstate exchanges, or any learning programs related to other countries)
- SW 438 - 4-H Youth Staff Development (primarily for efforts devoted to training fellow professionals or paraprofessionals by state or county staff)
- SW 439 - 4-H Youth Community Resource Development (all Community Pride, CRD efforts in training leaders, members, etc., and arranging for participation in training conferences)
- SW 440 - 4-H Youth Program Development and Management (overall countywide program planning and evaluation; management activities which cannot be allocated to specific program areas; recognition and awards, research, camping, and innovative teaching methods)

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- SW 441 - 4-H Youth Urban Programs (programs aimed at reaching young people in urban areas of cities with 50,000 or more population; projects, activities and other efforts relating to adapting 4-H programs to urban needs)
- SW 442 - Affirmative Action 4-H Youth Programs (work with 4-H program Expansion and Review Committees to develop and carry out and evaluate and report success of Affirmative Action programs to extend 4-H to all interested young people)
