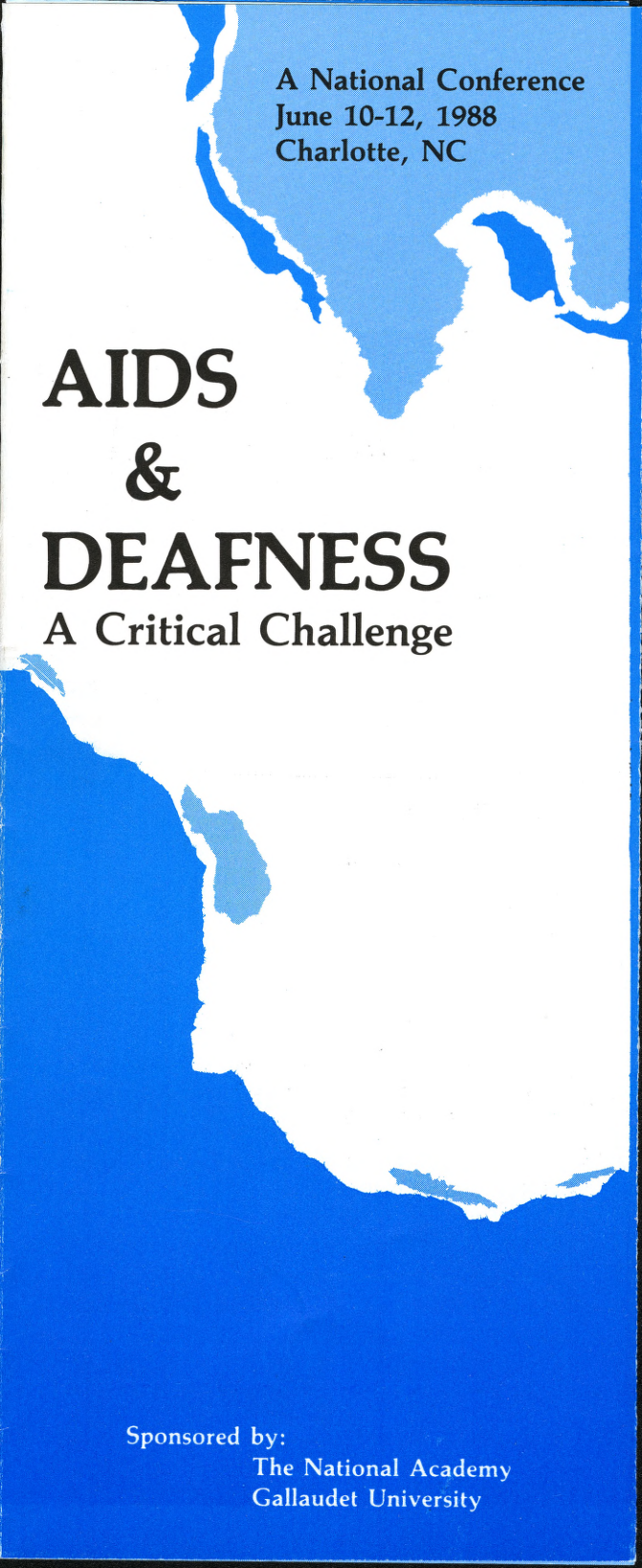

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Presentations, training workshops, poster sessions, and panel discussions will offer a dynamic interactive forum to provide you with information and resources in three program areas:

AIDS Education

- LEARN successful strategies for information sharing with all ages.
- ANALYZE your attitude to increase your ability to provide AIDS-related services.
- DEVELOP special skills in providing neutral and supportive AIDS-related assistance.
- REVIEW and EVALUATE print and video materials.

The Emotional Impact of AIDS

- DISCOVER strategies for minimizing the stress of being a caregiver.
- LEARN what support systems are in place and how deaf and hard of hearing people can gain access to them.
- GAIN insights from deaf and hard of hearing PWAs, family members, caregivers, and bereaved survivors of AIDS.
- UNDERSTAND how working out grief, shame, and guilt can be an empowering experience.

Ethical/Legal Considerations

- CONSIDER the implications of mandatory testing, confidentiality, and contact tracing.
- DISCUSS society's right to protection versus the individual's right of privacy.
- EXAMINE current state and federal policies on AIDS in the workplace and in school settings.
- LEARN how Section 504 applies to PWAs and HIV positive people.

ACCREDITATION

Gallaudet University CEUs will be available to all conference participants who register for them at the conference site. A total of 1.6 CEUs will be offered for this three-day conference.

REFUND POLICY

Cancellations made before June 1 will be subject to a \$25 administration charge. No refunds will be made after this date.

This three-day conference will bring together peers and professionals who share concerns about the impact and implications of providing AIDS awareness, education, and support services to deaf and hard of hearing people. Critical issues, commonly encountered barriers, and emerging perspectives will be examined. By attending you will obtain:

- a comprehensive overview of available resources, with ideas and strategies for new directions in providing AIDS education and support services; designs, approaches, and methods for educating the "uninformed and unafraid" and "the worried well";
- an opportunity to be part of a national network bringing together professionals and support personnel who provide AIDS-related services to deaf and hard of hearing people;
- a complimentary copy of *Directory of Services and Resources*, slated for post-conference publication;
- an invitation to evaluate currently available print and video materials on AIDS;
- hands-on workshops with speakers and panelists; and
- numerous poster sessions that will address specific concerns, such as *Women and AIDS*, and *AIDS in Minority Populations*, plus highlights of programs and projects that are proving to be successful.
