The tentative plans of the Army for the relocation of Merced Center residents were announced to the Center Council Wednesday morning by Harry L. Black, manager. Stressing the point that the plans are subject to change with respect to destination or date of movement, the announcement indicated that the entire population of this Center will be transferred to the new War Relocation Project now being built at Granada, Colorado, and the scheduled date for the movement is August 31-September 8.

The Center Manager explained that the announcement was made to allay the confusion and unrest created by all sorts of unfounded reports and rumors concerning the relocation date and destination.

According to present plans, the announcement continued, all residents of Merced Center will go to Granada. In addition, there will be approximately 2000 evacuees from some other assembly center.

Granada is located in Prowers County, in southeastern Colorado, and in a section of the state known as the Arkansas River Valley. The county seat is Lama, the center of a productive agricultural and stock-raising area.

Close to 4,000 residents in Turlock Center will be moved to a new relocation center on the Gila River in Arizona, according to the latest Army release.

The move is expected to be carried out between July 18 and August 1, about 350 people per day.

The new Gila River Center taking up about 16,000 acres of Indian reservation land will become the new homes of 15,000 evacuees. Besides raising vegetables, food processing plants will be put up on the site.

At the same time, the Army announced the Pinedale residents (near Fresno) will be relocated to Tul-lake and Parker Relocation Centers.
