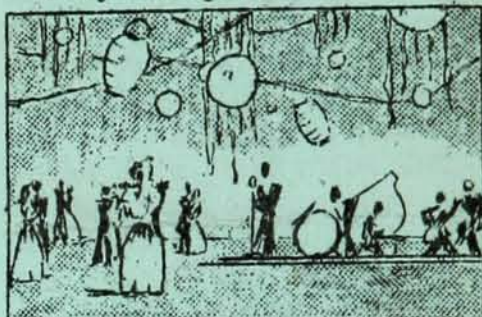
Intra-troop competition will be held in the centipede rope race, knot tying, first aid, signaling, judging, compass relay, and surprise relay.

RECREATION DEPARTMENT GIVES FINANCIAL REPORT

Answering the questions of what is happening to the donations and collections to the Recreation Department, the following financial report was released by Charles Kamayatsu, chairman.

The total cash receipts from July 1-31, totaled \$494.46. These donations were from entertainment, \$227.14; baseball \$37.63; sumo, \$169.53; education, \$60.16. Included in the entertainment collections are movies, music appreciation, dances, go, shogi and sumo tournaments and talent shows.

July expenditures were nursery, \$1.03; library, \$27.63; entertainment, \$198.78; education \$115.42; athletic equipment, \$49.32; arts, \$56.15; music, \$45.26; sumo, \$101.91. Total amt't is \$591.52.

As of July 31, the Recreation Department fund was \$97.06 in the red, but since then through collections, the fund has a balance of \$29.08 as of August 4.

The expenditures of the Education Department have been cut down considerably due to material aid furnished by the government.
