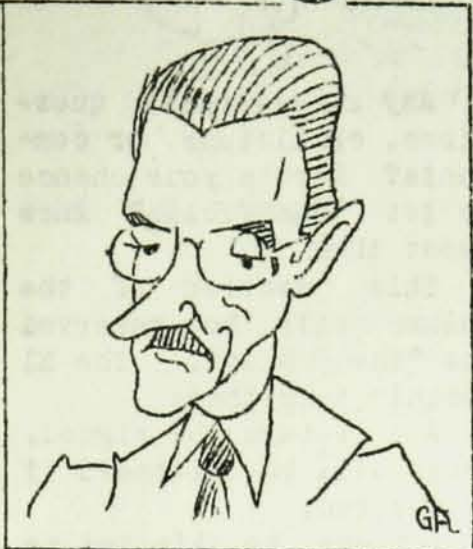

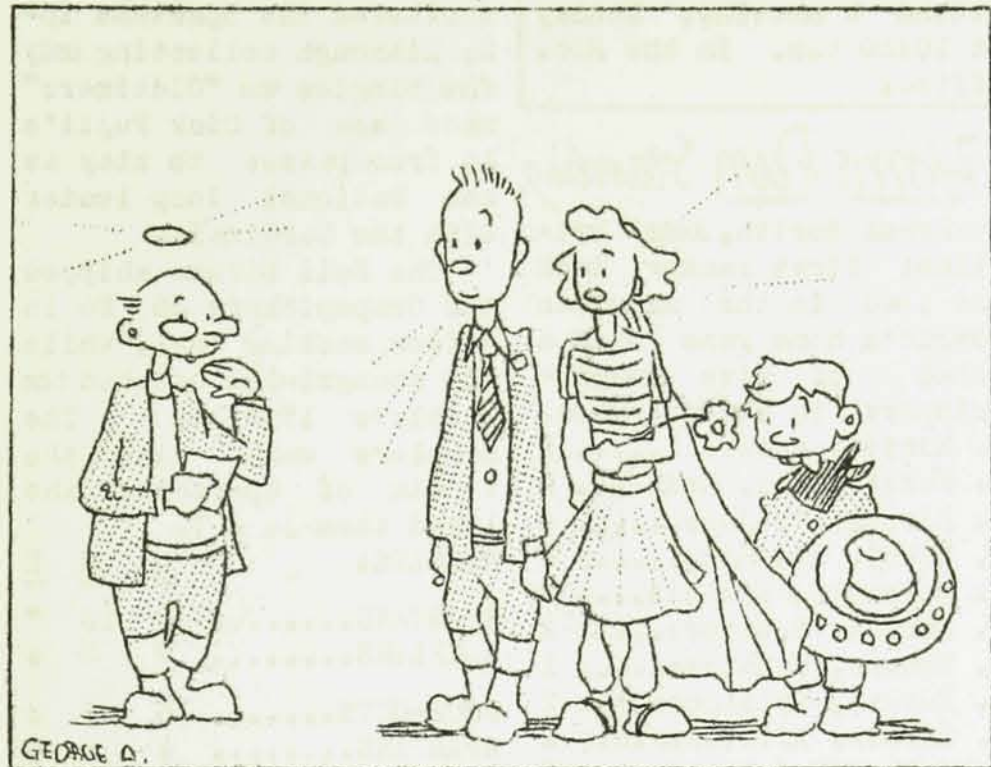
Don Shima is confined in the hospital with infection in hand.

\$750 BONDS !
"Since the opening of
the Stockton Assembly Cen-
ter's Post Office, we have
sold \$750 worth of War
Bonds, \$10 of War Saving
Stamps, and have issued
\$7,200 in money orders,"
announced Bert Jacobs, the
Center's postmaster.
The Post Office issues
daily \$400 in money orders
and \$25 in postage stamps.
It handles on the average
700 letters a day.
About 8 packages are
sent out and 15 packages
are received daily. Fri-
day the Office received 34
packages, the largest amount
handled in a single day.
Only C.O.D. and insured
packages are taken in at
the Post Office. Other
packages are handled through
the Police Inspection Sta-
tion.
Center residents are
asked to refrain from re-
moving faucet handles as
they are irreplaceable.
