COUPON BOOKS

CENTER-ITES BUY 6,079 TO DATE

From May 14 to June 23 the Center Cashier has sold 6,079 coupon books, totaling \$15,197.50. The daily average sale amounts to \$434.21. The highest sale for one day was \$1,737.50 and the lowest totaled \$172.

An analysis of the respective sales of the coupon books and the day's take at the Center Store reveals that as the sales of the coupon books increased the sales at the store were much higher.

EDITORIAL

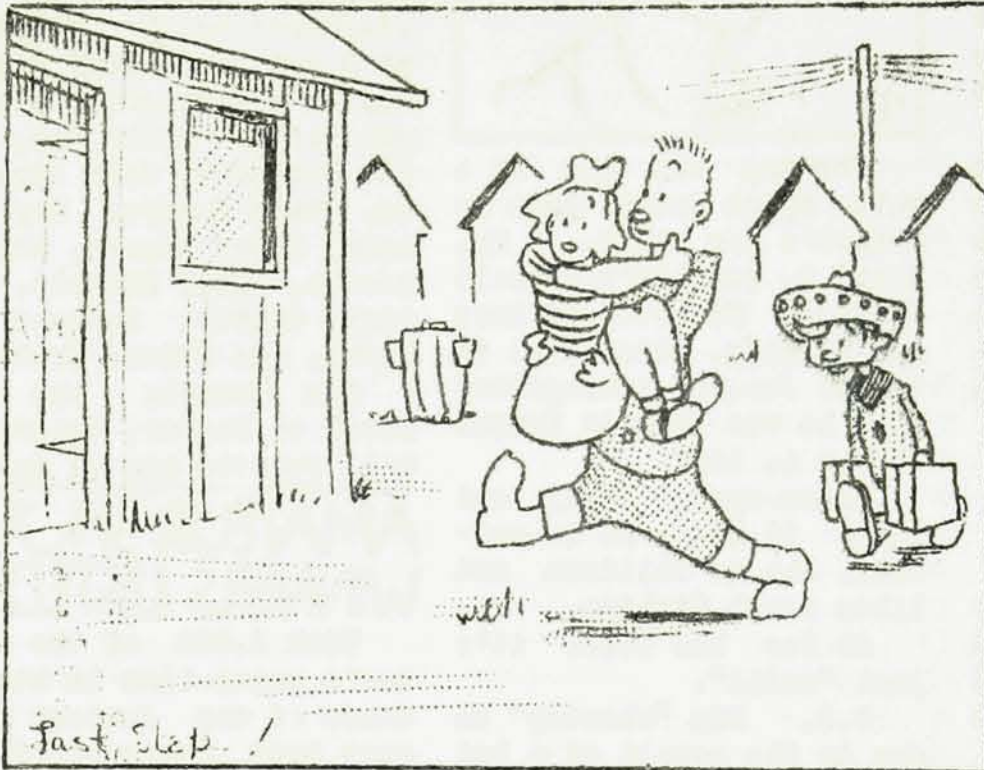
With a population of 4,150 residents our Center is the fourth largest community in the San Joaquin County.

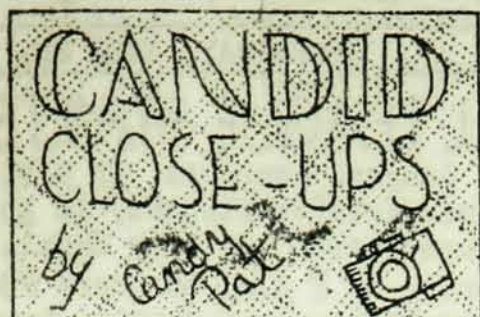
