ZONE 2 EXODUS BEGINS SOON; COMPLETES AUG. 7

Approximately 6,000 Japanese living in California Zone 2, 3000 from Sanger, 1700 from Visalia, 1300 from Reedley, will complete evacuation to War Relocation Projects by August 7.

Evacuees from Sanger will start for the Gila River War Relocation Project on August 2 at the rate of 500 a day. Visalia will begin evacuation on the same date for the Colorado River War Relocation Project. Reedley will begin their exodus on the following day for Gila River.

PLUG FOR THE COÖP

However, as important as the choice of our leaders is to us in the assembly center, we must not overlook the form of government that we are to have in the relocation center. A self-sufficient cooperative plan is to be instituted there, and there is a distinct need for our community members to know the principles of this system so that our eventual transfer to and settlement in the WRA Projects could be accomplished with the minimum of confusion and wasted efforts.

Our series of articles on cooperatives were started for this reason and may aid the Center people to gain some knowledge of this plan.

COOPERATIVES



PRINCIPLE #3

Money invested in a cooperative, if it received interest, shall be limited to a fixed percentage which shall not be more than the prevailing current rate.

Any business needs capital to start and those that invest in a cooperative should be rewarded, but only in the form of interest at the rate that prevails in the business world.

This principle may not apply to us in our relocation project but is an important principle for any cooperative started voluntarily.

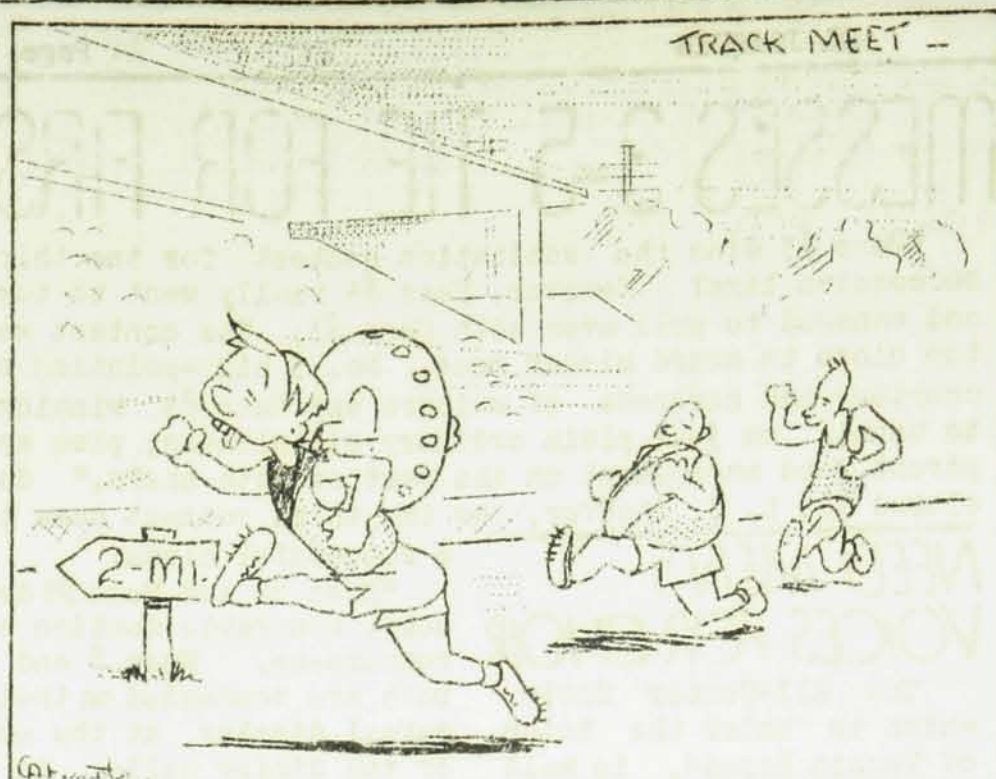
They also repair electric fans and refrigerators in the army barracks.

REDS' RALLY FAILS BEFORE 3,000 FANS 3-2. F. KAMIBAYASHI BAT STAR

In a story book finish southpaw George Kagawa out-pitched Mike "The Kid" Takeuchi in a superb mound duel to enable the powerful All-American ten to shade the champion Blk. 5 Reds 3 - 2 before a record crowd of 3000 fans, who were treated to the best played game of the season.

Going into the last frame with a dangerous single run lead the All-Americans staved off a desperate Reds' rally that saw the bases populated when second sacker Frank Arata pulled down Frank Kamibayashi's high fly for the final out.

Unprognosticable Butch Hayashi started the futile attempt by sending a soaring double into the barrack after Kiichi Hiramoto and Sam Kamibayashi had flied out. Keizo and Mas Okuhara filled the bags by cashing a free pass, but Kagawa worked Frank Kamibayashi into flying out to Arata to nip the rally.

The victors' runs, all unearned, were scored in the first two innings when they took advantage of Takeuchi's brief wildness, which later proved to be disastrous for the losers.

Bespectacled Frank Kamibayashi grabbed batting honor by slugging out two doubles and also scored the Reds' two runs.
