Mitsugi Oishi was appointed interpreter in the Council for the benefit of those who have language difficulties.

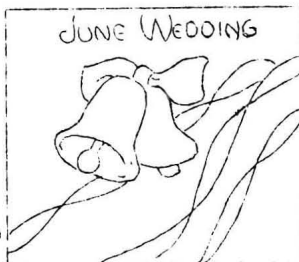
AT LAST! FIRST WEDDING

Rubber Saving Plan Launched

Suggested by the 15-day, nationwide scrap rubber campaign launched on June 15 by President Franklin Roosevelt, the Tulare News is sponsoring a drive in all Assembly and Relocation Centers for the conservation of rubber soles and heels by extensive use of wooden clogs and sandals whenever possible, it was announced today.

The already popular use of wooden clogs by the Tulare Center people and the recent announcement of the scrap rubber campaign suggested the use of wooden sandals in place of shoes.

The possibility for such a revolutionary move was revealed when many people in the Center were approached on the subject.

Many of the first generation claimed that they did not mind wearing wooden clogs if it were around the barracks. Others said they did not travel far in the Center so the use of the new foot gear may become popular and serviceable. The feminine group stated that wooden sandals will be comfortable and if proper straps could be applied there will be little trouble in using the new fangle.

The use of strong cloth for straps nailed to the clogs will do double duty, by conserving leather and rubber was also pointed out.

Several of the boys exclaimed that the use of the new footgear will save their stockings, provided they wear their clogs barefooted.

The Tulare News urges everyone to join the campaign.

CENTER JAPANESE JOIN SCRAP RUBBER CAMPAIGN

Proving that the welfare of the nation is always with them, many Japanese in the Tulare Assembly Center are writing letters to caretakers of their property back home to bring out old tires, garden hoses and other rubber articles for the 15-day nationwide scrap rubber campaign launched June 15, by President Franklin Roosevelt, was revealed today.

Tadashi Tokuyama (K-

5-3) former Oxford produce manager, reported that he has instructed his Mexican neighbor to donate his old truck tires, weighing several hundred pounds towards the drive. He said that several of his tires are stored in the home of his neighbor in Oxford.

Many others are reported doing the same with their old rubber goods, stored in their garages or in the cellars of their

Koyama to Teach

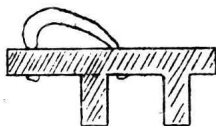
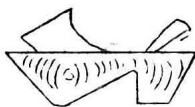
