CENTER STREETS NAMED FOR HOME TOWN

FIRE! FIRE!

Tulare Assembly Center witnessed its first fire Friday when the quiet of the afternoon was rent with the cry of 'fire! fire!'

Responding spontaneously to the cry of distress, the ever-alert firemen arrived at the scene of the accident only to find it extinguished by a gardener who had been working nearby.

Cause of the fire was attributed to the careless disposal of a cigarette stub in one of the barracks. Although no serious damage was wrought by this incident, Centerites are again cautioned by fire captain Makoto Matsumoto, to be very careful in the disposing of cigarette stubs.

So as not to hamper the work of the firemen, crowds are asked to keep distance from the scenes of the fires.

To Create Homely Atmosphere

Naming of the main thoroughfares in the Center has been accomplished and as soon as the name placards are completed for posting, the aspect of a real community will be comprehended.

Complaints for Repair Told

Acting superintendent of the Corporation Yard, Skeets Oji, issues a notice to the Center residents to the effect that hereafter, all complaints pertaining to repair be made directly to their respective unit headquarters. This includes repairs on doors, windows, roofs or any other maintenance work.

"In order to have our maintenance work functioning properly and to give the people the best and most responsive service, we are having our men working directly from these unit headquarters. We ask your full cooperation to make this operation successful," stated Oji.

Favoring the evacuees, the streets have been named after their home towns, revealed Frank Sakamoto, chairman in charge of the street naming.

The oval track is to be called Tulare Boulevard.

The names of the avenues are: Center, Alhambra, Fillmore, Hueneme, Ventura, Pasadena, San Marino, Altadena, South Gate, and Rosemead. Boulevard names include: Tulare, Santa Barbara, Oso Flaco, Lompoc, Oxnard, Compton, El Monte, Torrance, Sierra Madre, and San Gabriel.

South Pasadena, Santa Paula, Camarillo, Oceano, Summerland, Long Beach, Pismo, Guadalupe, Arroyo Grande, Goleta, Santa Maria, Carpinteria, Moneta, Gardena, and Glendale, are the names of the Center Drives.

TO WORK IN MONTANA

Center to July 1. It is not permissible to overdraw this account, but unused balances will be accumulative.

Only ready-made apparel including shoes may be purchased, and no exchanges will be made. Yardage goods and notions cannot be ordered.

Workers are urged to apply early at their unit headquarters where a catalog will be available. The total amount a family receives may be divided in any way desired.

CLARIFICATION MADE

Introduced by Mrs. R. Susu-Mago, Mr. Tom Bodine, a representative of the Student Relocation Council of the West Coast, spoke to a group of approximately 150 students at the grandstand, Friday, July 10, at 3 p.m. He explained and clarified many details on the relocation of university and college students in various schools of the middle west and in the east.

With representatives from Stanford, University of California, Oregon, Whittier, Sacramento, Occidental, San Francisco, and Santa Rosa serving on the Committee, the Relocation Council is a coordinated group of various agencies attempting to resettle the students. Its primary purpose at this moment is to gather data from all the Centers which will enable them to make a survey of the total needs and to collect material from which they may select the first representative group to leave. A attempting to complete the survey by August 1, openings in the various institutions will be decided by National Headquarters in Philadelphia while selections will be made by a committee composed of college deans, registrars, and other university representatives on the west coast. If there is sufficient time, personal interviews may be conducted to aid the selections.

Financial difficulties will be settled in 3 ways: (1), by tuition scholarships offered by the universities, (2), through part time work for self-support, and (3), through scholarship funds provided by the Council.

WCCA travel permits are now being issued for those who are able to leave the centers for schooling. Those who have been accepted to a university or college should contact the Council's head-

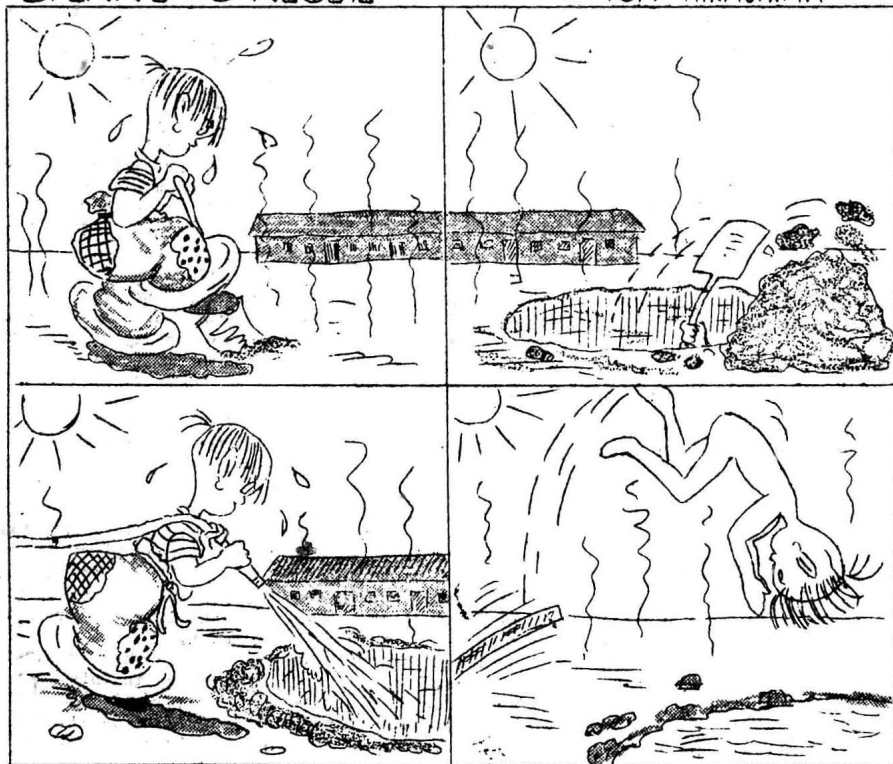

A complete schedule will soon be announced by Miye Tachihara and games will probably be played in the evenings.

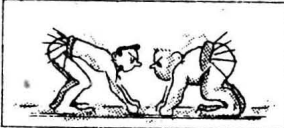
