REPATRIATION

AANONSEN EXPLAINS APPLICATION MOVE

Applications for repatriation are now being accepted at the Commissioners' office in the south wing of the grandstand, it was announced yesterday by Center Manager Nils Aanonsen. All requests must be submitted by Friday noon, July 24, 1942.

Although the acceptance of a formal request for repatriation by the W.C.C.A. does not bind the Federal government to grant the same, neither does it bind the individual to return to Japan if circumstances are not favorable. However, American citizens who apply for repatriation do indicate, by doing so, that they are willing to forfeit their citizenship.

Requests for repatriation will be accepted from any individual 18 years or over, who is a citizen of Japan, or has dual citizenship. All persons 18 years or over must fill in and sign an individual form. Children under 18 years must conform to the decision of their parents or guardian. When individuals in a family wish to be repatriated together, a "Family Summary Form" must be submitted with the individual request form.

When an individual becomes eligible for repatriation, the members of the immediate family also become eligible. The immediate family includes dependents, such as parents, spouse, unmarried children, and foster or adopted children.

All forms must be made out in triplicate and signed by the applicant.

IMPORTANT

The official notice of evacuation will be announced in the TULARE NEWS ten days before the starting date, and any rumor to the contrary is not based on fact. A special edition will be published if necessary, and until such time, no information, however "official" should be accepted as fact.

HODEL KEPT BUSY

Beginning at one o'clock this afternoon, the June payroll amounting to \$12,156.95 will be distributed to 1,463 evacuee employees was revealed by cashier, J. J. Hodel.

In order to accommodate workers who are unable to obtain their checks during the morning and afternoon hours, the receiving windows will be open from 7 to 9 p.m. during this week.

Checks may be cashed through the Center banking services tomorrow and Friday, announced Mr. Hodel. Service hours are 9 a.m. to 12 noon, and 1 to 3 p.m.

1200 PAY CHECKS

Twelve hundred paychecks for the month of May totaling \$7694.96 have been here since Monday, and are being distributed from the cashier's window, according to John J. Hodel, Center Cashier. The window is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. For the convenience of the workers, it will also be open from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. for a limited time.

Proper procedure for claiming the checks are as follows: skilled and professional workers will go to window number 2 and unskilled workers to window 3. Assignment slips must be presented in order to receive the checks stated Hodel.

There are 76 persons receiving the P rating, 204 receiving S, and 920 U's it was reported.

RULING GIVEN

Previous articles published in this paper concerning the free issue of clothing have been somewhat misleading due to misunderstanding of the provisions of the Operations Manual concerning this problem, according to Center Manager Nils Aanonsen. The original plan as outlined in the Manual is still in effect, he added.

The proper procedure is as follows. All applicants must fill out their requisitions at their respective unit headquarters, and sign same. Those in charge of this work at the headquarters will assist in figuring costs, and explaining limitations and price lists. The allowances are classified according to age, and are as follows: Adult male, \$3.82; male, 6-18, \$2.15; children, 1-5, \$2.60; adult female, \$4.61; female, 6-18, \$2.85; infant to one year, \$2.25.

Family groups, regardless of age, may apply on the same requisition. Upon arrival of the merchandise, the recipient will be notified by a messenger and should claim the articles at J-5-1, located behind the grandstand.

In order to avoid the accumulation of too much merchandise in the warehouse, persons should claim their articles as soon as possible after receiving notice of arrival of same, according to A.J. Avila, who is in charge of distribution.

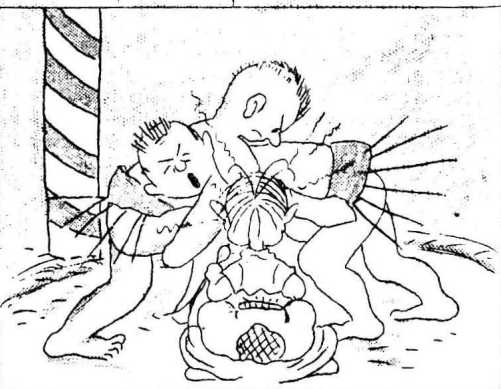
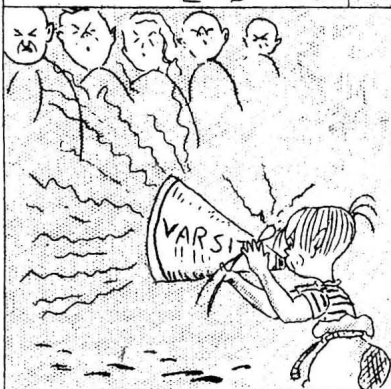
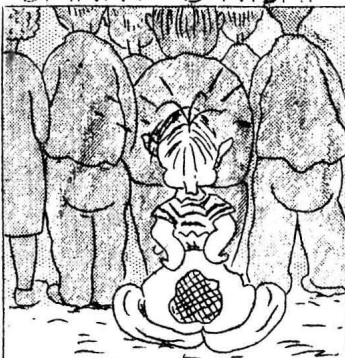
