READY FOR BALLOTS

Applications for absentee ballots are now available at each unit headquarters to all eligible voters registered to vote was revealed by Ken Utagoriya, Commissioner of Service.

As loyal American citizens, everyone is requested to exercise their right to vote. Voters are asked to contact their respective headquarters for applications immediately.

The Tulare News will publish instructions as to voting at an early date as soon as information is obtained for release.

AUG. 10 DEADLINE

The second clothing issue starts today, according to Al Avila, clothing administrator. In order to be able to receive the clothing before evacuation, all orders must be placed not later than Monday, August 10, he stressed.

This will include clothing limitations for the months of July and August. All evacuees are urged to make their applications soon as possible.

Fire Buckets

Despite repeated requests and warnings, the people are still taking the fire buckets from the barrels, it was reported by Chief Eugene Hoyt. As stated in the regulations posted at each barrack, the red buckets must stay on the barrels at all times. This is imperative as the buckets are one of the important means of emergency fire fighting available immediately.

AUGUST COUPONS POPULAR

Wilkins Seeks Mess Cooperation

The new signboards on the mess halls were made by the cabinet makers and painted by the sign painters. These signs state the exact time at which the different groups may enter, and must be strictly observed, according to Tets Mayeda, Commissioner of Feeding.

L. J. Wilkins, Supervisor of Mess and Lodgings requests the close cooperation of everyone in enforcing this ticket system in order to make for smoother running of the mess halls.

Approximately \$3,200 worth in free coupon books for the month of August has already been distributed to date, revealed J.J. Hodel, Center Cashier.

Within the two days that these scripts were issued, the C, D, E, and F districts have received them. Today is the day for G and H sections. Tomorrow J and K will have their turn and Friday L and M will receive theirs.

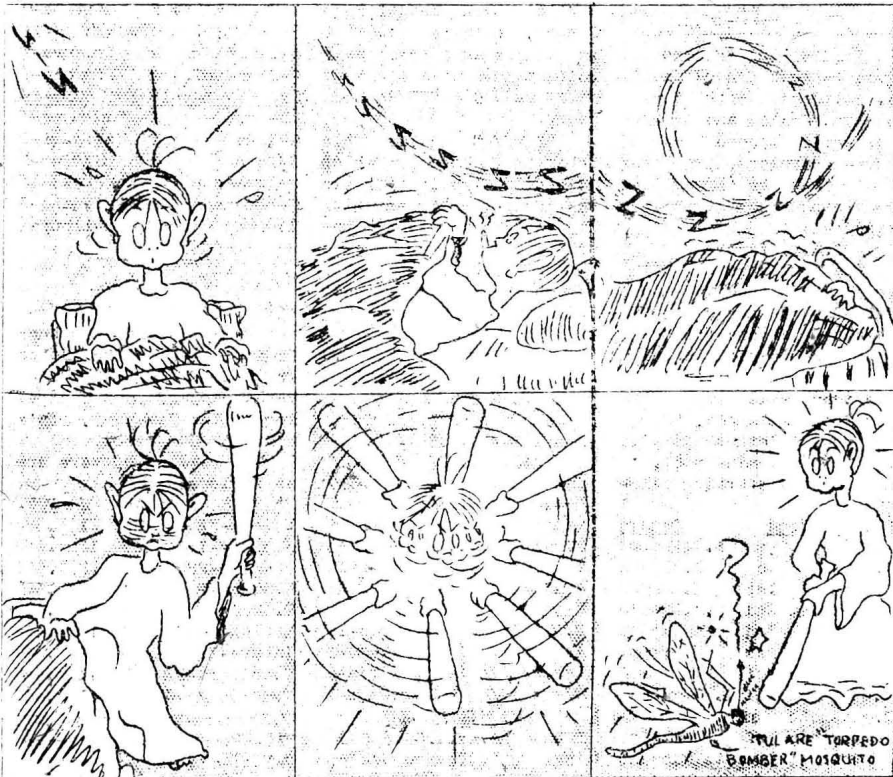

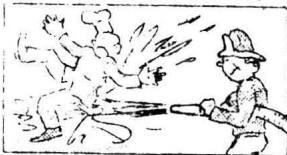
