The presidency of Donald Trump is still a mystery waiting to be unraveled. It is easy to predict that such an awful person will make an awful president, but it is not yet certain precisely how Trump will be so awful. We already know that Trump will be appointing people with terrible ideas to fulfill his terrible promises. Trump's cabinet seems destined to be the worst in history: a mixture of billionaires and ideologues devoted to destroying the idea of a government that helps the poor, using outsourcing and crony capitalism to build a model of government subservient to corporations and the wealthiest.

By winning the presidential election, Trump has established himself as the greatest con artist in history. He was already one of the great con artists ever: defrauding the suckers who enrolled at Trump "University," using the Trump Foundation to benefit himself in ways big and small, running his companies into bankruptcy and then scamming banks and shareholders to eliminate his personal debts, all while avoiding \$916 million in income taxes because of losses he made other people pay for.

Trump was a buffoonish billionaire posing as the voice of the working class. He won because he simultaneously pretended to be a conservative (attacking Clinton, promising to appoint conservative Supreme Court justices) and a liberal (embracing some left-wing economic goals), all while pushing his populist xenophobia. This combination of positions, along with his bigoted personality, made him widely hated among the American people, more so than anyone else ever elected president in modern times.

Almost no one loves or trusts Trump. But his extraordinary skills as a con artist allowed him to overcome that. Most of all, what Trump offered was hope. For anyone who hoped for some kind of improvement in America, or any type of change in their lives, Trump embraced every false hope possible. He promised jobs, success, wealth, victory in every foreign conflict without having any foreign conflicts, and everything else Americans might dream of. It was the Trump University fraud writ large, a scam on a scale and with a chutzpah unmatched by any presidential candidate in American history.

Trump appealed to the new white nationalism based on a fabricated sense of victimization and grievance. Among Trump voters, forty-five percent think that white people face "a lot of discrimination" in America today. Only forty percent of Trump supporters think that Muslims face a lot of discrimination, and discrimination was one of his campaign planks. A mere twenty-two percent of Trump voters think that black people encounter a lot of discrimination, half of those who believe this about whites. A substantial number of white Americans believe in the delusion that they are an oppressed group, and delusional thinking was at the core of Trump's support.

A successful con artist needs a gullible and ignorant audience willing to believe their lies, and Trump found that in his favorite group of people: whites without a college education. In the election exit polls, college educated whites supported Trump by four points, while non-college educated whites

supported Trump by thirty-nine points. That gap was 2-3 points in the 1990s when Bill Clinton was elected. As Trump famously explained,

"I love the poorly educated."

For a con artist like Trump, his focus will be on giving a public demonstration of small-scale symbolic achievements, while behind the scenes he runs the government the way he wants, to serve himself and the interests of the super-rich.

Trump's policies and his appointees will cause enormous damage. Trump has promised to destroy affordable health care for millions of Americans by repealing Obamacare. He has promised corporate de-regulation of exactly the kind that led to the housing bubble and the Bush Recession in 2008. He has promised massive destruction of the environment because he thinks the overwhelming scientific evidence of global climate change is a Chinese plot against America. No segment of the government—and no part of the world—will be immune from the damage Trump is likely to do.

The Trump Administration will use executive orders and administrative rules to annihilate the few progressive reforms enacted by Barack Obama. The president has enormous power over immigration policy, and Trump is likely to fulfill his promise to ban many Muslims from entering the country, and to launch a crackdown on undocumented people. In education, Trump will undermine public schools with voucher programs and allow for-profit institutions to prevail. In labor, Trump will seek to destroy the right to unionize, and undermine protections for workers. Veterans will see veteran hospitals replaced with insurance vouchers. In trade, Trump will seek to help corporations while pretending to stand up for workers. In the environment, Trump will open up federal lands to oil, gas, and coal companies, and remove many regulations. In discrimination, Trump will make the federal government a barrier to equal rights rather than a defender of it. Trump has already promised to increase American forces fighting in the Middle East, and his inept diplomatic skills, attacks on American alliances, and propensity for personal revenge are likely to cause future wars.

And if Trump, a pathological liar, decides to break his promises to protect entitlements, increase infrastructure investments, and improve child care, his rule will be far worse than even his promises would be if fulfilled.

The damage that Trump and a Republican Congress can do to the budget is even more frightening. For the next four years, Trump's worst enemy will not be ISIS, China, Mexico, disorganized Democrats, disaffected leftists, or disinterested journalists, No. Trump's biggest opponent will be math. Trump ran a con-artist campaign, promising trillions of dollars in tax cuts, trillions of dollars in new spending, a balanced budget, four percent economic growth, jobs for everyone, and every other fantasy a politician can offer to gullible voters. Every politician makes promises they can't fulfill, but no president has ever made more impossible-to-deliver promises than Trump. Math is also the enemy of America under a Trump presidency, because if he can enact even a small proportion of his budgetary promises, the deficit will spiral out of control. The only possible way to keep the deficit under \$1 trillion will be massive cuts in the areas where Trump didn't promise more spending: social services, education, science, the environment, and much more are under dire threat from President Trump and a Republican Congress.

The presidency gives Trump enormous power to wreak havoc and cause massive damage to Americans and people around the world.

WHAT THE **BUSH YEARS** CAN **TELL** US **ABOUT PRESIDENT TRUMP**

To most of America it seemed impossible that the star of The Apprentice could win the 2016 presidential election. But as Chris Rock noted on SNL, "You ever been around this country?" And while this is definitely new territory, the Trump wildcard is unpredictable, we can still look back on the Bush years to help us understand some of what we can expect. Remember, in those 8 years we invaded a country that didn't attack us, almost lost a major American city to a storm, and we managed to cause the largest global economic meltdown since the **Great Depression.**

> So there will be consequences. Let's mine a little history to see what we might expect and hopefully glean some ideas of how to prepare. Keep in mind that Bush ran on an anti-gay marriage platform in 2004 and less than 10 years later marriage equality became the law of the land. Progress still happens in the face of opposition.

It'll start fast and your head will spin

was as devious and orchestrated as the Trump campaign. Bush's slogan was that he was a compassionate conservative, and he presented himself as not that much different than Gore, except with him we could lose the Clinton baggage. He downplayed his conservative agenda and cloaked it in this we're-pretty-much-the-same rhetoric that became the media's narrative.

Once in office his administration proved to be highly organized, appointing a dizzying array of knownothings and corporate interests to key government positions that amounted to a dramatic reversal of the previous 8 years of policy. Within months we pulled out of the Kyoto Treaty, passed tax cuts for the wealthy that effectively eliminated our surplus, stopped any funding for foreign aid that performed or counseled an abortion, hampered stem cell research. proposed building 38,000 miles of new pipelines, put forth a budget that included a half a billion dollar cut to the EPA and reduced research into renewable energy by 50%. That's the first 180 days short list and that was all before

While Bush pretended to be conservative-light during his campaign, Trump represented himself as a clown that could never possibly win a national election. This implausibility is exactly what allowed him to dominate every news cycle with an endless parade of supposed gaffes. But he's turned out to be surprisingly organized, continuing to dominate the news cycle while choosing a cabinet that could easily make the Bush agenda feel like a walk in the park. Expect a reversal in policy under Trump to be more drastic, and as swift, as the the first 180 days of

Terrorism as opportunity

After 9/11 Bush chose to invade Iraq instead of focusing on who attacked us. Capturing Bin Laden and setting Afghanistan on a NATO-assisted future would have been easy given the good will the U.S. enjoyed back then. But Bush took the opportunity to advance his agenda of invading Iraq and starting a new cold war, the war on terror. These were well-documented positions that Bush and his cabinet were advocating before taking office. Being at war also had the effect of curtailing much of his legislative opposition for a couple of years.

Unfortunately, there will most likely be a terrorist attack on U.S. soil and it won't have to be spectacular for the Trump administration to capitalize on it to justify whatever action it chooses. Likely he'll push for what he campaigned on, like building a wall, creating a registry or mass deportations. It also could be used to support a cozier relationship with Russia as a partner in the war on terror, justifying the end of sanctions and probably the end of a two-state solution to Israel as well. These are the positions Trump has taken that he'll need some more political capital to push through.

Dealing with our fellow citizens

I hate to keep quoting Chris Rock but as he said regarding the American public in the lead up to the Iraq war, "You got a little Nazi on us didn't ya". I was just in a diner in Wisconsin that still refuses to use the term French Fries. When I asked what the "America Fries" on the menu were they said "they're liked deep fried potato sticks". Think about that (if you don't know what I'm talking about just google Freedom Fries). So while Trump supporters are more openly bigoted, we've been dealing with this for a long time. Trump was able to channel the hatred of liberal ideology (and governance in general) that right wing propaganda has

been fostering for decades. People who buy into this aren't going to easily change their tune.

Under Bush we wasted a lot of time thinking that if we could just educate people they would see what a disaster the Bush policies were. It didn't work. We just drove ourselves crazy. Trump supporters are loving that they won, and they will continue loving that they won regardless of any cabinet picks, or a bromance with Putin or any obvious get-rich-quick scheme Trump comes up with for himself. As much as people like to share those kind of things on Facebook, it won't change anyone's mind. Besides everyone's already de-friended each other.

However, eventually, just as it happened with Bush, many people who expected some sort of positive change from Trump will be disappointed and it will be important to find ways to connect when that happens. That's something that never happened with Bush supporters. When everyone started hating Bush, there was no coming together. Partially because many quickly transitioned to unreasonably questioning the legitimacy of the first African American President, and partially because no one really tried. The Left just beat them back for a while and furthered the divide, helping to create the current disparate realities we seem to live in.

We have to focus on creating new models for a better society, and nurturing local economies and communities, but we also have to find ways to include some of those that fall prey to people like Trump. There's no easy answer as to how that can be done and we can't excuse bigotry. But keep in mind, it's not Trump that we should be afraid of. it's that we live in a society that enough people will buy into someone like him. The Trumps of the world will always come around, we somehow have to make sure that not enough of us fall for it.

Winters are very unpredictable in Chicago, but it's guaranteed that this year's will be dark, grey, and last a very long time. Since November, we are amidst one of the bleakest and most chilling inaugural seasons our generation has seen, so here are some tips for coping with the current harsh environment and the frightful, lingering affects ahead.

People will get very down and angry around this time, but remember: it's not your fault (... unless it is, and you know who you are).

Take a vacation!

If you can afford it, taking a break from the Chicago darkness and getting some Vitamin D can feel like a full body cleanse. If not for the sunshine, then

perhaps just being immersed in another country will be refreshing and could put the weight of this winter into perspective. First things first: get your passport. Don't plan to leave the country anytime soon? Still get your passport. The rhetoric during the election season was in the tune of pushing away the U.N. and isolating the U.S. from the entire world. Even though moving to another country is not a solution, there are many reasons to get your legal documents in order. If you want to change your gender marker on your identification and official papers, do it now before Obama's Executive Order, which makes the process easier, is repealed. Be thoughtful about your relationship with the immigration system (like DACA and DAPA) if you are not a citizen or permanent resident. Consult the National Immigration Justice Center, or if you are a citizen, consider joining the NIJC's action team to stay informed about immigration issues and defend immigrants' human rights.

Remain vigilant, informed, and fight misinformation.

His essays for the paper are published in Between Hell and Reason: Essays from the Resistance Newspaper Combat, 1944-1947.

Camus' charge was to guide the Resistance through the months after the surrender, when the fate of those who collaborated with either the Nazi occupation or "free" Vichy France was still in question. At first Camus calls for the execution of collaborators and traitors.

"This effort demands clearsightedness and that prompt vigilance which will keep us from thinking of the individual when we should be thinking of all..." Camus wrote. But as with many reigns of terror, justified as they may seem at first, he soon realizes that the executions are out of control. "Obviously the road to simple justice was difficult to follow, with the screams of hate on one side and the pleadings of bad conscience on the other. In any case, the failure is complete."

Camus helped give me a more studied perspective on the idea of revenge during the weeks following

I had to deal with the fact that about half of the people I encountered during a normal day (some of them people I knew) either voted for Our New President or (I consider this the same thing) did not vote for Hillary Clinton. My disgust and desire to lash out was strong. So strong that I was alternately ravenously hungry and then exhausted. But Camus reminded me of the equally as odious risk of swinging the revenge pendulum in the opposite direction.

Stepping back in years a bit, Lalso read Simone de Beauvoir's Wartime Diary.

The diaries start in 1939, after France has declared war on Germany but before the invasion of Paris. a time known as the Phoney War or Drôle de guerre. Beauvoir's husbandin-all-but-name Jean-Paul Sartre and one of her other lovers have gone to the front, which at that time was in southwest Germany, known as the

There is little danger for them, but de Beauvoir still wrestles with the emotions of both watching a malignant power steamroll over Europe and worrying desperately about her men. "Nothing critical, but a constant threat," she writes.

"There are moments when I consider the state of fear, a crisis, that one has to make allowances for, that one should. however, try to minimize, and there are others when it seems to me the moment of truth, and the rest only a cowardly flight," she writes.

It is this sense in de Beauvoir's writing of seeing impending doom and not knowing what exactly to do about it that strangely comforted me in the weeks after the election. As sickening as it is to watch history repeat, this means people have done this before, and their texts are there for you to search and absorb.

What weighed on me was how daily life continued despite an inevitability that was, for the time, off in the distance (and you, as the reader, have the nausea-inducing knowledge of exactly what de Beauvoir and her friends will be facing). Just as de Beauvoir was able to teach

and visit her cafes regularly to write letters and then attend movies at night, in the days following the election, I had nothing else to do but go to work and go shopping and do the dishes and make the bed. I had expected a turn toward a self-obsessed television personality with a charge from his supporters to Make America Great Again — and away from most of our traditions of how elections are run and how transitions of power are handled — would have resulted in massive strikes, or at least some Occupy-style park camping. I was ready to go. If I lost my job, I was ready. I was trying to stop the collapse of America.

But just as in 1939 Paris, no prolonged work stoppages or occupation of public space occurred. There were protest events, but raising my finger to Our New President's Chicago tower just did not seem worth the train trip into the city. Many of my acquaintances were constantly on the phone with various elected officials, protesting the rise of this white supremacist or that donor who knew nothing about government.


But from other sources, I was hearing that all of these phone calls, while perhaps allowing some to sleep at night, were wasted breath. Even the representatives who supported the sentiments had nothing to do until the man was actually inaugurated. Just like de Beauvoir's men had nothing to do but smoke pipes and write letters in snowy towns until Hitler gave the call for his armies to turn west.

The last quarter of the book is less organized, as by that time the Nazis had invaded Paris and de Beauvoir, along with many Parisians, flees to the French countryside. Despite the frantic escapes, de Beauvoir knows people who can take her in — she is not one of the families with all their possessions tied to cars and carts and scrounging gardens for vegetables. This time for her seems more annoying than frightening, especially since the "escape" for most Parisians lasts only a few weeks. when it is clear the Germans want to inhabit Paris, too, and would appreciate the city's residents coming back to serve them in the famous cafes and bars.

De Beauvoir returns somewhat to her routine but now needs to live with the news Sartre is in prison. Neither De Beauvoir or her lovers are in the same danger as their Jewish friends, and so she is convinced he will be released immanently and can show up at any of the train stations on any day. Yet, once home, many of the cafe and restaurant owners who make up the web of her daily existence are planning to close up and leave Paris once again, for good.

This work of checking and calling in connections, attempting to continue with daily life knowing major changes loom, vague worry about those who might be victims of rumoured abuses, listening to plans made and hatreds percolating — when I read to this point in de Beauvoir's diaries, I was at a similar stage following the election. I had connected with a group of local women who wanted to use their professional and personal connections to keep pressure on the new administration from all points, and to monitor developments and react quickly. I reacted angrily to compromises current leaders were making. And when the word "appeasement" was heavily used in social media, a scornful backlash occurred. We were overdramatizing, reacting too quickly.

I realise many of these comparisons can, at this point, seem overblown and silly, especially comparing what we know about WWII versus what we don't know about Our New Administration. Still, I would ask that listening to the voices speaking from these years is an attempt to do what we are always exhorted to do: learn from history. And oh yes, I do hope I am overreacting.

Last night I got together with an old friend. Inevitably, our talk turned to politics. He is a good man: smart, unflinching. He said that it was no surprise to him that Trump won. He has worked in social services, teaching kids, adults, and inmates. He knows the dark side more intimately than I do. He has seen how the system corners decent people, leaving them no way out. He has seen how the denial of prospects and fairness distorts their decency. He knew there had to be a backlash, and since Trump was the only backlash available, he knew Trump would win. Now he says that he sees no option but to ride out Trump's presidency. It's a blip, he says. Demographics are shifting. In the near future we won't believe we elected someone like Trump.

But here's the thing—and the reason I'm sharing this: after four or eight years, it may be too late to forget that this happened. We may have no viable future in which to operate. As we speak, Trump is foreclosing the future. It is now apparent that Trump can only conceive of one logic for making decisions and managing affairs: the logic of the salesman.

This logic transforms every endeavor into a zero sum game. The sale is a contest. The winner is the one who extracts greater value than he forfeits. Trump's one and only measurement of value is victory. (Thus, his most damning insult: "Loser.") His cabinet appointments reflect this absurdly reduced social Darwinism. His appointees are all "winners." Which is to say, they have engaged life as a contest and have acted with the impunity of the boxer, the gambler, the quarterback. Everything is justified, so long as the game ends with more points on your side of the scoreboard.

The very specific depravity of people like Rex Tillerson, Scott Pruitt, and Andrew Puzder rests in their ability to shut out the effects of their actions on things and people that are not formally engaged in the game they're playing. This depravity has a name: psychopathy ("characterized by persistent antisocial behavior, lack of empathy and remorse, and bold, disinhibited, egotistical traits"). The logic of neoliberalism has invented euphemisms for the harm that the game does outside the confines of the game. In the military: "collateral damage." In legal parlance: "assumed risk." Under Trump, we must all assume that we are collateral in the risky game that this menagerie of winners is playing. Damage is a foregone conclusion. But to these salesmen, this damage is subsidiary to the winning of the game. Exxon and Hardee's are winning. And for the new leaders of our major governmental agencies, that's what counts. Gover-

nance, equity, fairness, justice—none of these are the point anymore. The point is the accumulation of points. So, to my friend, love him though I do, I say: You are wrong. History will not abide your optimism, your patience, or your inaction. We must recognize that we are confronted by a truly existential threat. These men have a loyalty to an ideology without ideology. There is no moral component in their worldview. They are motivated merely by the buttressing of their senses of themselves as winners. They drive by a rudderless engine. Their sudden violent swerves, their unprecedented accelerations are justified, so long as they reach the finish line first. The whole planet and every person now living, or soon to be born, is in their blind and merciless path. To my good, upright friend I can say only this: The logic of Trump cannot go unchecked. The only regulator that might conceivably slow their murderous maraud is us. Each of us, and all of us together, must call upon our decency, our justice, our empathy, and the righteousness that rejects the prefix "self-." We must block the way. We must lay our bodies down to bring their drive to a halt.

So what to do? We're all trying to figure this out right now.

Both the quantity and the quality of the news from natural: "the way things are." Yet, Trump's America conspire to subdue us. Like my friend, many are withdrawing, unable to cope with the daily onslaught of previously inconceivable news. Long-banished ghouls (Bob Dole) are back for revenge. Figures we thought were historical anomalies (Rick Perry) are newly empowered. Antagonistic foreign leaders, straight from central casting (Vladimir Putin) emerge as administrators of our American lives. Day after day, another agency of government's commitments to its citizens is turned over to the most vehement critic of that very agency and the values it represents. Trump has shaken off the yoke of the enlightenment. Reason and facts are discarded as the merely optional constraints of something we might call the "real world." Al Gore's choice of the adjective "inconvenient" for the noun "truth" now seems tragically apt. The salesman cannot abide the inconvenient. On the contrary, the logic of the salesman is the logic of convenience, ease, and



to think that I could answer this question neatly or satisfactorily for myself, never mind anyone else. Yet, a word loops in my head with conviction: RESISTANCE. Gramsci warned us of the seduction of hegemony, the Situationists of the spectacle, Baudrillard of the simulacrum. Recently, Adam Curtis, the BBC documentarian, has warned us of "hypernormalization." The logic of the salesman comes to seem commonplace. It all appears so we are not bound by this pact of least resistance. We are free to choose greater resistance, less convenience, harder work, more stubborn opposition. We can refuse the apparent naturalness of the logic of the salesman. We don't need Marx to recognize that value is not always best measured in dollars. Extraction and accumulation are not ends in themselves. We are free to think of others, the greater good, fairness, and simple kindness. There may even be a moment when I decide that my individual interests are not paramount. Despite what the economists might tell us about ourselves, it is possible to act own obituary.

both rationally, and against one's own self-interests. In fact, there is a name for this kind of thing. It's called "morality."

A dozen years ago, in a bar in Berlin, I was introduced to Benjamin, a well-put together young urbanite of the global cosmopolitan class. Over the course of a few drinks he got around to telling me about his grandfather who, in July of 1944, along with a small group of German officers, planned and participated in what was known as "Operation Valkyrie," an attempt to assassinate Adolf Hitler inside his Wolf's Lair field headquarters near Rastenburg, East Prussia. The attempt was unsuccessful and Benjamin's grandfather, along with many others suspected of being involved, was executed. Benjamin's mother grew up with-

It occurred to me immediately how rare this story was, told from the barstool in the city center of Berlin, at the gravitational center of German political history, surrounded by so many members of so many families with so many stories that most of them would rather not tell. Human beings may serve as executioners, but only history is qualified to judge. So it seems a necessary exercise—always, but especially at times like these—to query the future. What judgment awaits the life I am living? Will my granddaughter, seated at a bar in some city of the future, tell my story proudly? Or will she swallow my story along with her shame? How will my actions be understood when the dust settles and time reveals the graphic, consequential differences between doing one thing or another, between doing something and doing nothing at all? I'm trying to think this way now, as if I am reading my

activist, writer, and host of Who Gives A Shi on Lumpen Radio. With Donald Trump's rise to the pinnacle of American politics, many thinkpieces have been comparing this era to 1930s Germany. But perhaps the better comparison would be 1850s America, when abolitionism moved from the fringe to the center of American politics.

The Missouri Compromise of 1820 allowed many Northerners to accept an armistice with slave states. While abolitionists organized against slavery, for many Northerners, abolition seemed outside the mainstream. They didn't like slavery, but it wasn't in their backyard, so they learned to live with its existence.

Likewise, the New Deal allowed the modern Democratic Party to live with Capitalism. Socialists, communists, and anarchists seemed too extreme to many liberals, as long as people could count on minimum wage laws, workplace safety, strong unions, and social security.

However, the slave power of the 19th century was not content to exist within its borders. The fugitive slave acts, the Dredd Scott decision, Bleeding Kansas, and the Kansas-Nebraska Act made clear that slave owners could exert their power in Northern states, and that, given time, they would, as Marx said, transform "all territories of the republic, present and future, from nurseries of free states into nurseries of slavery."

Then, once they had the voting power in Congress, they would bully their way into expanding slavery across the entire country.

When you actually study history in books like Robin Blackburn's Marx and Lincoln: an Unfinished Revolution, Matt Karps' This Vast Southern Empire, or Philip S. Foner's first volume of the History of the Labor Movement in the United States, you see just how deceptive is the claim that many revisionists make: that slavery's end was inevitable, and that all that activism of abolitionists led to an unnecessary war. History actually shows that it was slavery's expansion that drove abolitionism to the mainstream, and it was Southern states' refusal to accept their political defeat with Lincoln's election that led them to treason and war against the republic.

Likewise we see today that capital, the 1%, Wall Street, etc. are not content with their massive profits and a compromise with labor when they could have even greater profits and no organized labor. The attacks on unions in Wisconsin, Michigan and other so-called "right-to-work" states; the privatization of local, state and federal organizations; corporate globalization's race to the bottom and more are the precondition for the rise of someone like Trump.

The Democratic Party since the New Deal has been like the old Whig party. Just like Stephen Douglas argued that two systems, slave and free, could coexist, the Democrats argue the same for capital and labor.

Lincoln's phrase that a house divided against itself cannot stand is still true. Today our country is divided, between the top 1% of the top 1% who own the means of production, — vast farmlands, huge factories, global supply chains, the fictional wealth of brand names, and speculative financial transactions, and the many millions who labor, or struggle without work, who do not own the wealth that their labor creates. Just as there could be no peace between slave state and free state, there can be no peace so long as private tyrannies of corporate power assault the people's democratic right to control the fruits of their labor. There can be no peace so long as the super-rich have declared war on the 99%. As long as there are the homeless, those who can't afford health care, those whose schools are underfunded, those who must tolerate harassment at work, those who face discrimination, in other words as long as capital oppresses us, we must fight back.

There are two competing systems that we must choose a side of. On one hand is the principle of 1 dollar 1 vote, which is exemplified by how corporations are owned — by those who buy stock, increasingly privatizing our public elections to allow the richest the greatest ability to influence elections through private (sometimes secret) donations and increased media coverage. On the other hand is the principle which civil rights activists have fought for, and how labor unions and community groups are run — the principle of 1 person 1 vote.

As we see the 1% expand corporate power and undermine the protections and guarantees of the New Deal Compromise between labor and capital, we need to work towards a revival of abolitionist politics. We need to make clear that our goal must be abolition of the capitalist hydra so that the major industries, large agriculture, and institutional financial planning shall be in the hands of the people, to control as they see democratically fit to meet the needs of all. We must work to bring these politics from the margins to the political mainstream of American life.

What we need — that the party of compromise with tyranny does not — is a vision of what we stand for: of what we want the future to be. The far right already has theirs — private tyranny and corporate control. We must have our own vision of an economy managed through democratic means for the collective good of all.

The policies a modern abolitionist movement should pursue must include not only nationalization but more importantly, democratization of the major economic institutions.

When the federal government bailed out the auto manufacturers, they were for a time the majority shareholder in those companies. What did they do? They gave ownership of the companies back to the same private interests who have destroyed the industrial midwest, to the same profiteers who would rather send jobs to non-union plants in repressive dictatorships to save a few dollars. Detroit is but the largest example of the destruction left in the wake of the decisions made not by the millions who built the wealth of the auto companies but the executives trying to appease stockholders.

Imagine if when the federal government bailed out the banks, if elections were held to determine the boards of those banks. Imagine if those elections were not limited to those with the money to buy stocks in the company, but to every citizen of the country. Would the people elected to those positions be inclined to adopt policies that evicted homeowners? Would they be inclined to jack up interest rates on homes? Would they leave condos empty when so many need shelter?

Imagine if we required the boards of Fortune 500 companies to be elected through the popular vote. What kind of energy

future would we have? What kind of access to the internet would we have? What kind of media and culture would we have?

Abolitionist Politic

The abolitionists of the 1850s would have thought it absurd to argue that plantation owners deserved their wealth. It was theirs by theft. Likewise we need to emphasize a labor theory of value—that the riches of the wealthy are stolen from those who work to create it. In all cases, the riches of people like Trump belong rightfully to the 99%.

We must also seek to unite abolitionist politics with other progressive movements, and to see how they are all intertwined. The abolition of capital must be wrapped up in the abolition of white nationalism, sexism, homophobia, religious bias, and more. We must reject false narratives which seek to divide the 99%, and work to embrace a democracy with many voices from many backgrounds.

What can we do to make abolitionist politics more mainstream? A lot. We should look to what abolitionists did—organize groups, publish newspapers, run the underground railroad, run for elected office, mobilize religious groups, write novels, and more.

It used to be that socialist politics where a third rail of American politics. But since the great recession we have seen in poll after poll that young people in particular continue to warm to socialism. Bernie Sanders's strength should be seen as a reflection of that. Now when I mention socialist ideas to liberals, even some staffers, elected officials, and small business people, they nod their heads in agreement! Running for local office is essential to building a corps of qualified and experienced activists, and I think there would be a lot more support from unexpected places for anyone running on an abolitionist platform.

We can use direct action. From occupations in public places, to occupying workplaces or banks. We can organize unions, co-operative workplaces, community-run banks, and neighborhood associations. Abolitionists had John Brown. We need to look to people from the Haymarket Anarchists to Chelsea Manning as our own heroes.

We can stand up for our civil liberties and for the civil rights of all. We can build alternative media, counter-culture art, and support "the voices of writers who can see alternatives to how we live now." We can be "realists of a larger reality" as Ursula Le Guin said.

With many groups there will be a process for them to realize that there cannot be a compromise with Capital. That doesn't mean we should give up on them.

Fundamentally there is only one way out of the dilemma of a Trump presidency. We must organize. To organize requires a multifaceted approach. We must energize our own base, win over those who can be won over from the enemy, demobilize those who can not be won over, and take actions based not on "compromise" but on what will bring us objectively and materially closer to abolition. That may be policy that improves people's lives. It may be policy that undercuts our opponents' ability to mobilize. We must listen to those we seek to organize. We must seek truth, but we should not be so haughty as to assume that we already know all of it.

It's a long road, but as Dr. King said, "The arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends towards justice." In our quest to reject government of the corporation, by the CEO, for the profit, and to fight for a government of the people, by the people, and for the people, we should dedicate ourselves to the unfinished work of those who did the same before us. We should put forward the demands to power in ways that the abolitionists of yesteryear would recognize as being a part of the same tradition of struggle for progress and freedom.



The Message Is Now The Message, **Not The** Medium

Trump, like Reagan before him has promised to "hit the ground running" and, for activists especially, that military metaphor should be taken literally. The first theme of Trump's acceptance speech at the Republican National Convention was "law and order," and his cabinet picks prove he meant what he said: a bigot in charge of Justice, a fascist in the Oval Office, a General at Homeland Security, and a creep at CIA. And that fascist in the White House will be aided and abetted by a Republican Congress and a Republican Supreme Court. With no formal check in the state, our only check on the state will be our actions online and in the streets. The good news is that no state has ever defeated an indigenous insurgency, but the bad news is that what we are resisting is counterinsurgency, not the application of authority pursuant to law. So it's time to gear up, and buddy up.

Trump, of all candidates, appreciates disintermediation, the impact of mass access to the means of production and distribution of information. He knows

that knowledge is power, and the ability to control information is therefore essential to his proiect. What we can expect from him is an opaque administration imposing transparency on the citizenry. The Obama Administration bequeathed to Trump a firstclass spying operation, which will henceforth operate without the high-minded pretense of consti-

You have a legal privilege to communicate with your lawyers in confidence. But mediated interactions are inherently insecure, so no electronic signal is safe, and that confronts us with both a problem, and an opportu-

Lock It Down

The problem is signal protection and persistence. Protection requires encryption. That begins with good passwords, and a decent password manager. KeePassX is generally preferred by pros, but Dashlane works fine for those who want something more user-friendly.

Passwords provide some protection for the device or service containing your information, but message encryption is required for information exchange. Thunderbird is the standard for email encryption, although it's somewhat clunky to install and use. For mobile devices, Signal is the standard, and ease of use rec-

But even when you scramble your signals, you can't assume your messages are secure, so communicate accordingly. In the wake of Edward Snowden's revelations, the German secret services reverted to an old-fashioned method for securing the most sensitive conversations—they adjourn to a local café, where background noise scrambles electronic intercep-

Signal persistence becomes paramount when the state restricts access to cellular communication. In such cases, mesh networks, which rely on the WiFi and Bluetooth utilities on your phone to relay signals, are essential. FireChat is popular, but unencrypted and insecure, so use

And don't overlook metatada. Even when you aren't communicating, your phone iswho you're with, and who you're communicating with. So for those secret chats at the coffee shop it's best to drop the phones into a Faraday pouch. And it is wise in any event to use a Faraday wallet to keep the chips in your credit cards from checking in with random devices scattered across the

Mix It Up

Covertly intercepted information is deemed to be inherently reliable. That's your opportunity. When you know you're being spied on you also know the spies will believe any bullshit you share with your trusted associates. The possibilities are limited only by your imagination. You can keep them chasing wild geese down cial problems. Even speaking to blind alleys indefinitely. Metadata is harder to spoof, but that too is something you can use to your advantage, and should in any event be accounted for in any spoofing operation. There is nothing so satisfying as the look on the policeman's face when he realizes, too late, that the Decov Team he read about in his intercepts was really just a ploy to distract him from the Action Team which got fully deployed while he was distracted.

Buddy Lawyer Up Before **You Get Busted**

It's nice to have a lawver in court so nice the constitution guarantees you one in criminal cases. But knowing this, the Executive Branch moves the real action to the streets and lock-ups, so by the time you get to the courthouse, you're already screwed—they've tied you up in a ribbon and handed you on a silver platter to the prosecutor, so most cases result in

You need lawyers where the action is: on the streets, and in the police lock-ups.

The Chicago Chapter of the National Lawyers Guild provides volunteer Legal Observers for street actions. Known on the streets by their bright green hats, Legal Observers keep an eye on

it's transmitting where you are, the cops so you don't have to. And they serve as witnesses in the event of police misconduct—and the cops know this, so they tend to behave better. Requests for Legal Observers can be sent to chicago. lo.program@gmail.com. That initial request will not be encrypted. so account for that—secure channels (preferably via Signal or an in-person meeting) can be established after initial contact if nec-

> In the lock-ups, First Defense Legal Aid provides lawyers for station visits. Only lawyers are allowed to visit people held in police lock-ups, and while everyone knows they have the right to remain silent, protecting that right is another matter entirely. Lawyers help. First Defense runs a 24/7 hotline—1-800-Law-Rep4 (1-800-529-7374).

> Feds present very spe-Feds can be dangerous because their interviews are often periury traps, designed to induce you to lie so they can indict you for lying to them, so they can then pressure you to turn snitch. For that reason, it is never safe to talk to a fed without your lawyer. Ask the agents for their card, and tell them your lawyer will contact them. Then call the 24/7 FBI Hotline of the Chicago Chapter of the National Lawyers Guild for quick access to a volunteer lawyer: (312) 913-0039, press "0" at the prompt for the Hotline. Never talk to a Fed without your lawyer.

Try To Avoid Making The Law **Your Enemy**

The Holocaust was legal. Slavery and segregation were legal. We are living in a time when the law is mostly a tool of oppression, not a force for liberation. The law is unlikely to help you, but you can likelihood or impact of legal intervention. Keep your guard up, keep your lawyers close, and keep Trump's feet to the fire.

Only Connect! Live in fragments no longer.

Alan Moore I've been studying the squatting movement in Europe for nearly ten years. My zine House Magic and two books (all available as free PDFs online) detail the vitality of this tactic and the life and culture it enables. In the U.S. it barely exists — politically. My book tour last year failed. No one seemed interested in hearing about how the social movement of squatting works, how it's been done over decades and generations of activists. I whined, went back to Europe for the summer but could not see a way to crack the indifference in the U.S. Now we see sadly that this bland disinterest, this U.S. disconnect from international radical movements, even floating in the amniotic warmth of the coastal blue bubbles, has consequences.

 At a talk this spring in N.Y.C., folks were more interested in "stealth squatting." Staying out of sight seemed the preferred strategy. Now, in the hard hard winter of '16, as the bios of the dead in the Ghost Ship disaster in Oakland come out, we learn that the late Denalda was a squatter, until she couldn't any longer and had to rent in a firetrap. Right after the fire, city governments nationwide cracked down in a new wave of evictions. And suddenly a network that had hoped to stay out of sight, demographically isolated, "making do" without telling anybody, was revealed. In a bad way, that is: politically unprepared for repression. The network of derelict industrial spaces where creative and active people live and work came into view as it was being blown to pieces by bureaucrats tipped off by Pepe the Frog-loving informers, in an all-out assault on the marginal living people who make up Ghost Ship-type communities nationwide.

More than "having to" is needed to sustain productive creative life in cities now, as well as political engagements. And staying out of sight is no longer an option. But how to become visible? And more, in order to organize, how do we get to see all of each other in any place we are?

I am writing something for Chicagoans now, but I've been living in Milwaukee and Madrid. I am in full addicted subscription to the "technology of separation," since I live online when I am in the Midwest. I need techniques of extension, new modes of reception—ways of meeting and working with people who themselves are isolated, suspended like flickering bulbs in the alienating pseudo-social world of online media.* We are now all apart, and together only in our opinions, occasional insights, and references. Too much of this is simply helpless rancor and outrage. It's making me sick. There is no longer any time for that. Action is necessary. This winter I'll have to follow U.S. events online. But when I'm here in Milwaukee, that reflex action keeps me in my house, away from others. "Personal relations are the important thing for ever and ever and not this outer life of telegrams and anger," wrote E.M. Forster in 1910; I've cribbed his words for the title of this text.

- So here in this Midwestern city, meetups are being organized (MoveOn, Working Families Party) which I'd be in if I stayed. That's how it goes in the privatized sphere of U.S. social life. There's nowhere else to go to meet radical folks unless you want to spend your nights drinking.

As an elder, I can now really only support: sit, talk, react, advise, listen, and when plans are laid, promote and connect. Being present, being engaged. I know a lot, too much, really, but I can't share it effectively in a tavern. And the coffee houses are full of people on their devices—they don't want you should talk so loud. It'd be nice if there was still a radical bookstore. One might be able to start an "anti-university" study/action group. But here they recently lost their lease and folded up after nearly forty years. As you lose your infrastructure due to economic insufficiency—no longer in university, can't "run a business," too poor to subscribe and not rich enough to pay the whole freight—and disuse from organizational bunkering up, what do you do? Maybe drink? Even drink at home and watch TV...

- That's the other side of the failure to squat, that is, to develop a space-based social movement or even to maintain the spaces opened by movements past (or to share them). You can't be present if there's nowhere to go. There is almost no political infrastructure, open to whatever, that could become citizens' assemblies, stepping stones to popular power. That's a stage beyond resistance. Some doors could be opened, y'kno. But the hinges are rusty. You gotta push hard. Risk some middle class privilege (which you've likely got if you're reading Lumpen).

As we await Trump's designs, some slump into paralysis while others crouch in readiness to react. That is not enough. I have to advise self-organization. That can give you nearly everything—energy, economy, spirit. Every place has a proud tradition of it—Chicago especially, still home to the head office of the IWW. Learn that past, commemorate it, re-animate it. Slip loose all controls as best you can. Jump fences-real ones and those in your mind. Then demand the right to live as you want: to live as you can make, not pay.

If you can't manage that, just wait. The black diaper babies are coming.

These are simple pleas: Please encrypt everything, please care about privacy, please make it harder to spy on us.

This means it's exceedingly important to start using private communication channels as . You don't want to change your behavior once people are looking. That's basically a bat signal that says "Look at me, I'm doing something you should be suspicious of!"

OR EMAIL Signal is an open-source app which is the state-of-the-art in text and voice encryption. It has a few advantages over bascally all other implementations:

- It's open source, which means the code is vetted by independent security experts.

– It's as easy to use as texting.

-The only metadata available is whether you use the service or not—no one can tell who you talked to or when. - It's the solution of choice of Laura Poitras, Bruce

Schneier and Edward Snowden

If for some reason you can't use Signal (but seriously, you can), then use another end-to-end encrypted service like WhatsApp. Read about signal at whispersystems.org

Avoid using text messages, Facebook chat/Gchat, or email. Anything you send to these services is basically free game for a gove<u>rnment</u> agency. All they have to do is file a National Security Letter. This gives them free access to any data stored at any company (and that company will be under gag order not to tell you about it). Over 300,000 National Security Letters have been filed.

ENCRYPT OFTEN

Don't just use encryption when you need it. Use it to talk to your friends. Use it to coordinate dinner. Use it to talk to people outside of your social group. Drown the signal in noise.

USE TOR YOUR WEB

Tor will bounce your online traffic around the world, making it effectively anonymous. Tor is easy to do wrong so simply download the Tor browser from torproject. org and use that.

Intelligence cares as much about the things you read as about the things you say. Patternmatching is powerful. Don't leave




> however, it's the least exciting aspects of involvement that are the most important.

The next election in Illinois isn't the presidential or the gubernatorial.


Next we vote on members of the school board.

All over the state, school districts will be voting on the seats of board members whose unpaid, fouryear terms have expired. On April 4, 2017 there will be a general election for the seats of three of the members of the school board for School District U-46 – the district that includes Chicago. The seven members of the school board are elected on a staggered basis every two years. If you're registered, you have a say in this. We don't get to vote on the principals that run the schools or if there will be massive teacher layoffs every year, but we do get to vote on the people who are responsible for the budget, curriculum and textbooks, facility maintenance and construction, and the appointment of the superintendent. This matters.

The incumbents are Veronica Noland, Cody Holt, and Donna Smith. The challengers are Melissa Owens, Enoch Essendrop, and Tracy Smodilla. Local elections like these are where we can participate on a more direct, more micro level. Keep becoming informed and keep getting involved.











