

**Craig Edward Dykers**  
**Founding Partner, Snøhetta**  
**AIA, siv. ark MMAL, NCARB, FRIBA, FRSA, FAAR, LEED AP**

One of the Founding Partners of Snøhetta, Craig Dykers is an American architect who has led the firm's design team for the SFMOMA expansion. Over the years, he has led many of the firm's prominent projects internationally, including the Alexandria Library in Egypt; the Norwegian National Opera and Ballet in Oslo, Norway; the National September 11 Memorial Museum Pavilion in New York City; and the recently completed Ryerson University Student Learning Centre in Toronto, Canada. He is currently leading the design of the Times Square Reconstruction in New York City, now under construction; as well as the Calgary Public Library in Alberta, Canada; the new Penn Station Master Plan in New York; the French Laundry Kitchen Expansion in Yountville, California; and the Willamette Falls Riverwalk in Oregon City. Snøhetta is currently one of the seven finalists in consideration to design the Obama Presidential Center in Chicago.

Dykers's work has led to numerous international awards and recognitions including the Mies van der Rohe European Union Prize for Contemporary Architecture, the World Architecture Award, the Stanford University Prize for Innovation in Research Libraries and the Aga Kahn Award for Architecture, among many others. His interest in design as a promoter of social and physical wellbeing is supported by ongoing observation and development of an innovative design process.

In 2014, Dykers was awarded the William A. Bernoudy Designer in Residence at the American Academy in Rome; he has been recognized as an Honorary Fellow of the Royal Institute of British Architects; and a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts and Manufacturers. Dykers is a LEED-accredited professional and a member of the American Institute of Architects. He has served as a Diploma Adjudicator at the Architectural College in Oslo, Norway, and in recent years has been a Visiting Professor at Cornell University, Syracuse University, Parsons School of Design and Washington University in St. Louis. He is a graduate of the University of Texas, Austin, School of Architecture and a University of Texas Outstanding Ex, 2002.
